Candidate endorsements due October 21st

PHOENIX - The Western Express has invited a committee to consider political candidates, statewide, and recommend a slate of endorsements for the upcoming election. Co-sponsored by The Committee for Progress, the committee is comprised of representatives from both sponsoring organizations, representatives from both political parties, polsters, current candidates and current and former office-holders.

The endorsements will appear in The Western Express, Issue 179 on Friday, Oc-

tober 21. The General Election will be held on Tuesday, November 8.

The slate of recommended candidates will be bi-partisan, seeking to recognize potential for support and recognition of the gay community and the issues which most directly affect it rather than taking a proparty stance.

Separate reprints of the endorsements will be available at Western Express distributor locations throughout the state in addition to appearing in the newspaper.

Chicago ordinance fails

CHICAGO - After three hours of manic speeches, highlighted by impassioned, eloquent support for civil rights, and biblican theological condemnation of omosexuality, the Chicago Ordinance on aman Rights went down to defeat in the Council September 14 by a vote of 21

Gay and lesbian activists - who had been the main force behind the vote, the chambers anticipat

With two exceptions, all aldermen known concentrations of gays and lesbian in thier wards, and all Hispanie aldermet voted in favor of the ordinance. Opposition came mostly from Black aldermen wh either that they were opposed to dinance on religious grounds, or that their constituents were overwhelmingly agains the measure.

At one point, Ald. Ernest Jones of the 20th ward said he would be very surprised if even one person in his ward wanted him to vote yes. The 300 gay and lesbians jamming the chambers erupted loudly as a singly gay man stood up and frantically waved a rainbow flag. "Well, that's one," said Jones. "and I hazard a guess that he's in

ed by the most dangerous of unsanitary practices.' Ald. Marlene Carter told the Council that she always reminded her three sons she didn't want any "sissies" in the family.

Vocal support of the ordinance came from at least ten aldermen during the three hours of speeches. Ald. Bernie Hansen from the north lakefront's heavily gay 44th ward said, "Some people believe this ordinance is a revolution, an attact on the moral fiber of our city. Well, this is not a revolution. This is evolutionary. It is the next logical step in protecting our individual freedoms...and I know that the majority of the citizens of Chicago want us to do the right thing."

Twenty-sixth ward Ald. Luis Gutierrez said, "The silence must end...I stand proudly to support the Human Rights Ordinance and — understanding very clearly that the ordinance was brought to the City Council primarily by the gay community — support that gay community because it deserves our support."

Gutierrez — who is apparently a former Catholic — and four aldermen who are practicing Catholics all stated that they say no conflict between Catholicism and voting for a gay rights ordinance. "Ultimately," Gutierrez said, "when all our lives are over we're going to be judged on how we treated our fellow human beings."

Ald. Anna Langford, whose ward has no visible gay population, spoke directly to the 100-some fundamentalists seated on the opposite side of the chambers from the gay community "I am very, very sick and tired of people who dare try to force their morality on other people," she said. "Nobody in this chambers has the right to dictate the morality of another person and to tell what should happen in bedraons between consenting adults."

When the roll call was unished and Mayor Eugene Sawyer amounced the 21-26 vote, gay and lesbian activists enupted into a spontaneious chant of "Shame, shame, shame" as Sawyer banged his gavel and called for order.


Gay and lesbian work on the ordinance was coordinated for the past two years by the Gay & Lesbian Town Meeting. Commenting on the vote, GLTM spokesperson Rick Garcia said bigotry, hatred and fear won over justice. "I think it's disgusting," Garcia said, "that some of these aldermen have no intestinal fortitude and blame their consituents for their vote."

Activist Arthur Johnston reminded reporters that "it took 14 years and 12 votes in New York City to get [a gay rights ordinance] passed. This is only our second time," he said. "We're never going away."

Forty-sixth ward Ald. Helen Shiller, whose lakefront "Uptown" ward is a mixture of the very poor, rehabbers, and gays said, "I am concerned — my inclination is to say terrified — about what this Council votge really represents. When Ronald Reagan was first elected, some of us used to talk about a mean spirit in the country. We had an alderman today get up and called half the people in the audience 'animals!"

"I was disgusted by that ['animal' remark]," said Peggy Baker, the City of Chicago's paid coordinator of gay and lesbian issues. "The kinds of things people in the City Council think they can say in public is appalling — the whole tenor of the jokenaking and the digs and the snickers and

"More importantly, though," Baker continued, "is that Black aldermen don't believe that there are Black lesbian and gay people in their wards. That's where we have so much work to do."

The Chicago Ordinance on Human Rights was supported by Mayor Sawyer and by all candidates for next year's special mayoral election (Savyer was chosen to replace Mayor Harold Washington, who died one year ago).

Ald. Hansen told reporters he will rein troduce the measure before the heart of

Chicago's ordinance would have extended protections in housing, employment and public accommodations to those who face discrimination because of perceived or actual sexual orientation. It also included expanded protection;s for the divorced, veterans, and disabled persons, many of whom attended the stormy City Council session in wheelchairs.

In 1986, a gay rights ordinance was defeataed in Chicago by a Council vote of 30 to 18. Two amendments this year were thought to have helped pick up the new yes votes. One amendment exempted religious institution from the ordinance. The other pointed out that the Council was not condoning homosexuality.

NGLTF surveys states on AZT-subsidy

WASHINGTON, D.C. — A one-time Congressional appropriation of \$30 million dollars to subsidize the purchase of AZT by persons otherwise unable to afford the drug expired on September 30th, potentially cutting off thousands of persons with AIDS and HIV now receiving the drug. Senator Lowell Weicker (R-CT), who led the fight for the \$30 million appropriation last year, has pledged to seek additional federal funds to enable those now receiving AZT to continue

to do so. These additional funds will be sought later this month, but may not come in time to help some individuals facing immediate cut-offs.

A 56 state telephone survey conducted by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF), in cooperation with the office of Senator Edward Kennedy (D-MA), revealed that only three states and the District of

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

Columbia have authorized the continuation of the AZT subsidy program with state funds (California, Connecticut, Ohio). Over 4,100 persons nationally are currently receiving AZT under the federally subsidized funding program. According to the NGLTF survey, 638 persons now receiving AZT face termintin by October 1, 1988 and 1620 face termination by January 1, 1989. Only 13 states will be able to enroll new persons into the AZT program after September

The federal program was designed to provide AZT to people who did not have the money to purchase it. Although Medicaid programs in most states (except Colorado and Alabama) allow indigent prsons who meet specific income guidelines tao receive reimbursement for the cost of AZT, te federal subsidy program was aimed at those who were not already indigent. Thus, a nmber of individuals face the prospect of "spending down" to qualify for Medicaid reimbursement if no new state funds are committed.

States around the country have different timetables under which the federal funds authorized last year will expire. The NGLTF survey revealed that funds will expire in 8 states by October 1, 1988. Two

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(Florida and Louisiana) have already run out of federal money. Only 21 states have sufficient federal funds to continue operation of the program past January 1,

tate and local activists are urged to with state health departments, continue the subsidy program. "The federal funds were predicated on the belief that states would pick up the tab over time," said NGLTF Director Jeff Levi, "We have to work out long-term solutions at the statelevel for the thousands of persons with HIV and AIDS who cannot afford to receive the drug or adequate medical cae.'

"The discrimination faced by people with AIDS and HIV infection is virulent and extreme," siad Chai Feldblum, legislative counsel for ACLU's AIDS Project in Washington. "This bill is essential so that individuals with AIDS and

HIV infection will not be wrongfully fired from their jobs or refused service in restaurants or in other public places without legal recourse."

Since 1973, people with disabilities have received anti-discrimination protection under Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act, a statute which applies solely to the federal government and to entities that receive federal funds. People with AIDS and HIV infection have consistently been found by the courts to be covered under Section

504. The Americans with Disabilities Act, which uses the same definition of "handicap" as that of Section 504, will extend similar anti-discrimination protection to the private sector in areas such as employment, public accommodations, transportation and communications.

With the recent passage of the Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988, protection for people with disabilities, including people with AIDS and HIV infection, now exists in the area of private housing. The ACLU worked actively to ensure passage of the Fair Housing Amendments Act. The ACLu also successfully worked to defeat several attempts to remove people infected with HIV from the protection of the Act.

4th Annual Conference of gay/lesbian public officials set for November 17 in San Diego

SAN DIEGO — The Fourth Annual National Conference of Gay/Lesbian Public Officials will be held November 17 - 19 in San Diego at the Town and Country Hotel and Convention Center.

The conference brings together gay and lesbian elected and appointed officials, candidates, prospective candidates and campaign workers from the United States, Canada and Great Britain to discuss public policy issues and campaign strategies.

"The conference will be the first major national gathering of gay and lesbian leadership after the Presidential elections and will undoubtedly include how to deal with the new administration," according to Laguna Beach, California Councilmember Robert Gentry, and St. Paul, Minn. Human Rights Commissioner Sharon Day, the conference co-chairs.

The conference will feature addresses by national leaders and appropriate panels and discussion on topics ranging from AIDS to developing campaign organizatins. Last year's conference in Minneapolis drew 150 people and this year, conference planners are expecting up to 300 participants.

With the large number of gay and lesbian public officials from California and San Diego's warm climate, we hope to be able to host the largest gathering yet," said Neil Good, the San Diego conference coordinator.

"San Diego has a large, hospitable and politically active gay and lesbian community," Good said, adding that a host committee made up of representatives of the region's politically-oriented organizations has been formed. "We plan to give conference participants some of the same treatment that Super Bowl and America's Cup visitors expect."

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Noting that the number of AIDS patients nationally is expected to increase 3 1/2 times, to more than 270,000 by 1991. Senator Alan Cranston said the AIDS epidemic has "brought to the surface and magnified" deficiencies in the current health-care system that have "too often been ignored."

often been ignored."

He warned that "a financial crisis is looming in our health system" if corrective action is not taken.

action is not taken.

Cranston's 'AIDS Health Care Services Act of 1988' authorizes the appropriation of \$250 million a year to develop community-based networks similar to those pioneered in San Francisco.

gresswoman Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) introduced a companion bill in the House.

Cranston also introduced a companion bill to Pelos's "AIDS Health Care Financing Act of 1988" (H.R. 4136) which, among other things, would extend health insurance for AIDS patients for an additional 11 months.

"One of the greatest challenges that will confront the new Congress that will convene next January will be the financing and provision of health-care services for people with AIDS," Cranston said.

"These two bills are intended to start the process of filling the gaps in our current system."

According to NAMES Project executive director Cleve Jones, the Quilt will be displayed as originally planned. "The Quilt will be unfolded at dawn on Saturday, October 8th on the Ellipse, and will be displayed to the public from dawn to dusk on Saturday and Sunday. We know that thousands of Americans contacted the Park Service and their elected representatives to support our permit application. We are very grateful for their concern and support."

NAMES Project general manager Michael Smith noted that hundreds of volunteers in several cities worked throughout the weekend to mobilize Quilt supporters nationwide. "We are overwhelmed by the strong show of support that has come from every part of the country to help resolve this conflict quickly. The efforts paid off and we are ready to go." He added that the greatest need now facing The NAMES Project is for volunteers in Washington. Those wishing to assist with the events of the weekend should call the San Francisco headquartrs of The NAMES Project immediately.

The NAMES Project Quilt was first displayed across the National Mall on October 11, 1987, and covered approximtely two city blocks. Since then the Quilt has increased five times in size, reflecting the continuing toll of the AIDS epidemic in the United States. Over 40,000 Americans have now been killed by AIDS, half of them in the past twelve months.

NAMES Project organizers have called for a National March Against AIDS on Saturday, October 8th following the Quilt display. Several thousand participants are expected in the candlelight march past the White House. Led by mothers whose children were killed by AIDS, the march will conclude with a memorial program at the Lincoln Memorial.



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
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Without Reservations

Crossing Delancey Joyfully chronicles the budding stages of an improbable love affair between an Upper West Side New York literary sophisticate and a Lower East Side New York pickle vendor. This film leaves me in no pickle for a tiein, however, since Tradition's kosher-style sour and half-sour dills are just the tip of their culinary iceberg. Speaking of iceberg tips, we will also just barely touch on two other delightful films, The Year My Voice Broke and Heartbreak Hotel.

TRADITION

Although there are many so called Jewish delis in the Valley, only a very few get beyond such basics as chopped liver and lox and bagels, going into the more ethnic specialties of kishka, kugel or kasha varnishkes, to pick an illiterate trio.

Functional is the key word when describing the interior with its white formica tables and white walls that sport a few framed posters of scenes of New York. An enormous deli counter takes up all but the entire south wall. Over it a sign reads something to the effect of "Protect your bagels...use our lox." Both day and night get the same unflatteringly bright lighting - no fumbling for your food here. The bustling but friendly waitresses go perfectly with the sterile, casual atmosphere.

The potage, a thick mushroom, beef and barley, attained its richness from the use of the more flavorful dried black mushrooms and its robustness from the bounty of barley. It wasn't at all lacking in the beef department, either. The cup (which most establishments would be proud to call a bowl) costs \$2.85 and was worth every penny. A bowl (\$3.35) would have to be an entire meal for the average appetite. Also, at the same prices, is Grandma Lilly's sweet and sour cabbage soup made with bits of beautifully browned brisket in a tomato infused beef broth loaded with so many tender pieces of cabbage tht it became a pottage (a thick potage). On the other side of the Grandma competition, for a mere \$2.35 a cup (\$2.85 a bowl), Grandma Molly's


On being seated you are greated by a bowl full of the aforementioned pickles, pickled green to hate quarters and glistening, cherry-red pieces of the sweetest pimento you ever sank a took into (refills are 75¢) A basket, set alongside, beasted a variety of breads that included tye, basel chips and slices of *challah* (light-textured traditional Jewish egg bread).

I wouldn't be at all surprised if I w to ascertain that grazing, the currently fashionable trend of trying smaller portions of many different foods, was begun in Jewish deli. Their lists of appetizers usual ly are quite intriguing (and lengthy), and Tradition is no exception. In fact, on my first visit there my entire meal consisted of a soup, followed solely by starters and sides.

flavorful chicken soup with carrots can also include a matzo ball was so light and delicate that I was afraid it would float away.

Chopped liver can be made in a number of ways, and I find it to be a reliable gauge of the authenticity of the chef's recipes. This one (\$3.50 for a large portion) was creamy without being pasty. It had just ingly texture to indicate that it was genamely chopped, not ground, and the proper amount of schmaltz (chicken fat) to make it taste like the homey version bubee ised to make. An inferior stuffed cabbage roll (\$1.95 each), however, lost in both the taste and toughness departments. It had an altogether too-viscid one-dimensional

tomato sauce covering a meat-stuffed cabbage leaf that fought back with a vengeance!

Tender and savory chicken (wing parts) fricassee and tiny meat balls rested on a stratum of ethereally light egg barley studded with mushrooms, the whole covered with a well-flavored brown sauce (\$1.95). The only caveat here is that there were a few cold spots indicating that the dish had been nuked without being properly revolved.

Potatoes play an important role in Jewish cookery. A simple presentation of mashed real potatoes (you know, the kind

onion and the exteriors influenced by the schmaltz that they were fried in, were exemplary (\$1.35). They were augmented with a cool spot of apple sauce.

Kasha (toasted buckwheat groats) varnishkes (sauteed with onions and bow-tie noodles) filled a huge bowl with their unique flavor for a measly \$1.25. Kishka (\$1.75 per slice) is probably one of the unhealthiest items anybody can eat, therefore it is undeniably, unqualifiedly one of the most delicious (but,, then again, aren't most things that are bad for you). In kishka, as

that have some taste to them - yes, even complete with a few small lumps for added realism) made with schmaltz and topped with savory gribenes (chicken cracklin's) under of slick of chicken-flavored gravy (\$1.75) became a mighty impressive (not to mention palatable) component of this festival dedicated to the God of cholesterol. A pair of wonderfully crispy potato pancakes (latkes), the fluffy but sturdy interiors imbued with the subtle flavor of grated

in hot dogs, you really don't want to know all of the ingredients, but its alternate name of stuffed derma might give you Latinophyles a clue to part of the mystery. Suffice to say that the end really does justify the means. Tradition's version omits the crisp casing, which is a share indeed, for the contrast in textures between the inside and the outside has always, in my opinion, been an integral part of this dish.

On a second visit my two companions and I hit the entrees with gusto (and choice of soup, Claremont salad [shredded cabbage, carrot, onion and cucumber in a vinaigrette dressing], and another choice of waffle fries, potato pancakes or mashed as described above). I had a hankering for the sauteed chicken livers with onions (\$6.50), but, alas, they had sold the last of them just moments earlier. I inquired about the oven roasted brisket of beef, and, to my surprise, was offered a small sample. I ordered the roasted 1/2 chicken (not that the brisket wasn't good - it just wasn't inspired!). The demi-bird was terrific. Succulently moist meat was only kept from falling off the bones by a tegumen of almost crisp, herb and spice imbued skin tht the rotisserie had colored a handsome shade of mahogany.

Chicken pancakes had never been a tradition in my family (actually, I had never even heard of them before!), but I hope they will be in the future. At two per order, these

giant discs were an amalgamation of bresized chunks of whitemeat, muslar coms, onions and *matzoh brei* browned to a turn in chicken schmaltz (what else?) and topped with a gravy that was real close to that of chicken a la king. Truly delicious!

Two chubby, plump boiled 1/4 pound "special" knockwursts, which went begging for a Gulden's-type mustard (they offered a choice of a yellow [hot dog] or a Swedish style instead), came with the requisite beans, in this case *Heinz* vegetarian baked beans, and a very creamy coleslaw (at \$6.75 they were not exactly the bargain of the month).

Tradition's hefty, overstuffed sandwiches (\$3.25 to \$5.25, with combos running up to \$5.95) seem to be popular at any hour. There are also three meal in one pots; a half-chicken or a beef flanken (short ribs) with kreplach (the Jewish equivalent of wontons), matzoh ball and noodles or kasha in a chicken soup (\$8.25 for either one) or flanken with mushrooms and barley soup (\$7.95). All come in enormous vessels, with leftovers almost being a certainty.

I must state here and now (especially since she reads this rag) that nobody—no, nobody—makes nodle kugel (a baked budding) as delicious as my mother does! *Tradition*, admittedly, makes one that is a close second. Mon's is to be used more like a side dish than a dessert, its sweetness depending on the raisins and apricot bits it contains rather than on the sugar. Her's has enough body to stand up to a roast, and it always comes out with a wonderfully crunchy top. Their 'killer kugel'' (\$1.45) for a generous slice) was light, rich and oustardy—definitely a dessert. It tasted like it was made with sour gream, lots of eggs, brown sugar, cinnamon, nutnag, vanilla, raisins and either cottage or ricotta cheese. It also had a sweet, soft crumb-like topping for a nice color contrast. An accompanying side of sour cream is a perfect example of glding the lily. It went virtually untoushed by the five of us—all of whom left not a crumb of the kugel. Other desserts, most of which are made on the premises, include apple or cheese strudel, sour cream crunch

wonderful chocolate cake, brownies, rice pudding, *mandel bread* and *rugelach* (75¢ to \$2.50). A bowlful of smooth and sumptuous chocolae soft frozen yogurt was \$1.75. Rich tasting *Maxwell House* coffee is served either with our without caffeine, and, on the cold side, they feature Dr. Brown's sodas, N.Y. Seltzer and egg creams.

If this place hasn't yet become a tradition for you, what are you waiting for? Go! Enjoy!

CROSSING DELANCEY

Do I see this as a beginning of a trend in films that deal with the Jewish culture? Last week I passed a drive-in theatre where the marquee proudly announced the showing of Rober Rabbi (honestly, it did!) A few days later I previewed this delightful movie, much of which takes place in New York's colorful Jewish ghetto, the Lower East Side. Next, I followed this with a viewing of The Year My Voice Broke (reviewed below), fully expecting it to complete the trilogy by being the story of a boy having a Bar Mitzvah. Well, I sure was wrong about that one! Perhaps the third movie in the trend is yet to be released.

The line "Stick to your own kind" sung by Rita Moreno in Leonard Bernstein's West Side Story admirably explains the dilemma of Isabelle Grossman, our heroine. She, however, is perplexed as to whether a snobbish poet or a down-to-earth pickle vendor is her own kind. Eventually the real Izzy will stand up! Audiendes still crave a happy ending.

This is another of those shows in which the characterizations are all important (although the screenplay by Susan Sandler, based on her original off-Broadway his play, is brilliant). Amy Irving does the pivotal role of Izzy, including all the necessary subleties demanded of it, with a captivating sense of grace. She (at various times) both pursues and is pursued by a duo of eligible bachelors. Sam Posner (Peter Riegert), who lives a simple life but is far from being simpleminded, is her Bbbie's (grandmoter's) favorite for marriagematerial, while she waits in vain, aggressive Anton Maes (Jeroen Krabbe) has the edge with Izzy (in her own mind, anyway) at the moment. And Bbbie Kantor? This difficult part is sensitively played by Reizl Bozyk with an incredible range fgrom doting sweetness to



THERE IS NEW hope for skiers who suffer repeated episodes of painful cold sores that occur when they ski, doctors say. Reporting recently in the *Journal of the American Medical Association*, a research team led by Dr. Spotswood Spruance, professor of medicine at the University of Utah, said cold sores triggered by the sun were less likely to occur if skiers took the drug acyclovir prior to hitting the slopes.

Doctors believe exposure to high levels of ultraviolet light during alpine sports may

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rigger the sores caused by the Herpes simplex labialis virus.

Spruance stressed use of the prescription drug should only be considered after other measures have failed.

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A Guide To Painless Packing

Next to flight delays, packing is probably the least pleasant part of vacation travel. Samsonite has provided the following tips designed to save you time and effort packing, unpacking and keeping clothes neat.

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
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

 Roll T-shirts, undergarments, sleepwear, pantyhose, socks and sweaters.
 Place these items in any available space to keep contents from shifting.

• If you're buying a new bag, look for features specifically designed to make packing easier. For suits and dresses, consider garment bags that hang open like a book so you can easily see what you've packed. You can even live out of the bag without unpacking. Other helpful features are a telescoping hanger rod that accepts any hanger and lets you easily access clothes packed in the back of the bag, and a reverse-fold design that helps prevent wrinkles where they would be most visible — up front, on sleeves, cuffs and lapels.

Before packing, find out if your hotel offers hair dryers, irons and amenities such as shampoo. If it does, don't pack them. If not, use simple sizes of cosmetics and toiletries or fill up small plastic bottles.

• Check your airline's carry-on bag policy. New regulations limit the number of carry-on bags to one or two. Pack so that valuables and important documents including money, passports, visas, jewelry, keys, medication and cameras make it on board with you.

 Packed too much to carry? The piggy-back, a new suitcase with a built-in luggage cart, allows you to 'piggyback' up to three of your other bags on top of it, then tilt and pull. It lets you pack as much as you want without worrying about how to carry it.

• When selecting outfits to pack, consider your destination, length of stay and travel activities carefully. Will you need both formal and informal clothes? Can certain items — like tennis shorts — double for other occasions? To keep clothes packed to a minimum, choose one basic color and build your wardrobe around it, varying the outfit with a different blouse, scarf, or tie.

 If you expect to travel often, keep a prepacked cosmetics case or shaving kit in your bag, ready to go.

 Make a list of what you'll need. It will speed up packing and let you know what you might be missing on your way back. Keep it in your carry-on bag. If checked bags are lost, the list of contents can help identify them.

Mexican Tourist Office & Emergency Hotline Open To Assist Travelers

The Mexican Government Tourism Oflice has opened regional offices in five U.S. cities to assist travelers to Mexico.

The regional offices are located in New York City, Washington, D.C., Chicago,

Houston and Los Angeles. They can be reached by calling the local office, or by calling their nationwide toll-free number: 1-800-262-8900.

The offices will provide information on hotels, restaurants, travel conditions, destinations, travel documentation and answer questions.

The regional offices are open Monday thru Friday, 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The toll-free number is answered 7:00 a.m. to 12 midnight, Monday through Friday.

An emergency hotline has also been established for travelers who need assistance while in Mexico. The staff answers the phone 24 hours a day and will refer visitors to the nearest local government official. They will accept collect phone calls from a visitor still in Mexico or from one who calls after returning from a trip.

In either case, one may call collect ("por cobrar" in Spanish) or dial direct. Within Mexico, the area code is (915); from the United States dial 011 (County code) 525 (Area code) and then one of the following local exchanges: 250-0123, 250-0493, 250-0151 or 250-0589.

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Each group will be limited to 20 gentlemen, and the list will be closed at this point. A tour director will accompany the group from Los Angeles as long as there are ten participants. If the group is less than ten, prospective participants will be offered the choice of unescorted arrangements (with local guides to meet the group upon arrival in Bangkok), or priority inclusion in alternative groups.
