
Events commence on Friday evening.

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# AIDS groups formally respond to FDA's drug regulations

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF) and other national groups formally responded to recently published FDA regulations for drug development and licensing, saying that they are encouraged by the FDA's "commitment to exploring alternative approaches" to experimental drugs, but adding the real test would be in commitment of resources. The groups also expressed concern about access to experimental drugs.

The new FDA regulations were announced with great fanfare by FDA Director Frank Young last October, soon after widely publicized demonstrations at FDA headquarters. Since then the proposal has been available for public comment and analysis.

The regulations are designed to shorten the time it takes for a new drug to pass current requirements for FDA licensing, principally through greater FDA involvement in the design of clinical trials. A major goal of the proposal is the licensing of drugs at the end of phase two studies, and eliminating the customary phase three.

HRCF submitted the comments jointly with the AIDS Action Council, the Chronic Fatigue Syndrome Information Institute, and the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force, All four organizations participate in National Organizations Responding to AIDS (NORA), a coalition that coordinates policy responses and statements by national groups on AIDS issues.

In their comments, the groups "commend... the FDA's commitment to explore alternative approaches to making investigational drugs more widely available to people with life-threatening illnesses" and "look forward to a continuing dialogue with the agency on this critically important subject."

Steve Smith, HRCF legislative counsel and NORA research project co-chair, said the proposed regulations were generally positive, but that the true test would be in the allocaiton of resources to make them work.

"We expect the FDA to follow through on its commitment to this regulation by requesting appropriations and other resource allocations — including full-time equivalents — sufficient to make this promise a reality," said the NORA comments.

The NORA groups also expressed a need for incentives for drug sponsors to take advantage of new procedures. "Resources to provide such incentives may be beyond the purview of the FDA," said Smith, "but nonetheless must be part of a meaningful solution to the drug access problem."

NORA called attention to the relatively weak response from drug sponsors to the treatment of IND regulations implemented in 1987. Treatment INDs (investigational new drugs) involve the release, before licensing, of drugs to patients not participating in clinical trials.

NORA expressed concern that treatment IND continue to be used earlier in the drug testing process. However, the FDA



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regulation proposes that "the treatment IND...serve as a bridge between phase two trials and the point of *marketing approval*."

"We want it clear that important treatment INDs are not limited to cases where a marketing decision is imminent." explained Smith. "We hope to prevent any backsliding on the FDA's earlier commitment to make drugs available even while clinical trials are still underway."

NORA quotes last year's regulation as providing for treatment INDs during phase three, or even during phase two, studies. "This point is important because more people are likely to benefit from access to drugs during phase threee than from the earlier licensing" anticipated by the recently announced regulations.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The National Lesbian/Gay Health Foundation (NLGHF) — the oldest national lesbian and gay health organization — has published the second edition of *The Sourcebook* on Lesbian/Gay Health Care. The Sourcebook is the only comprehensive directory and resource book for lesbians and gay men. It contains more than 2,000 listings of doctors, clinics, counseling services and research centers that specialize in lesbian and gay health care, as well as 42 articles by leading experts on lesbian and gay health issues. The Sourcebook directory covers every state in the United States as well as Canada, Switzerland and the United Kingdom.

"While *The Sourcebook* includes the most comprehensive information and listing of doctors and clinics treating people with AIDS," said Ellen Ratner, President of the NLGHF, "this publication goes far beyond AIDS. The directory provides information on every conceivable health issue that a lesbian or gay might confront; such as psychotherapy, support groups, chemical dependency and other addictions, rape

counseling, menstrual disorders, holistic treatment, and plain old basic preventive health care."

The articles contained in *The Sourcebook* are written by world renowned health care experts on major health and social issues facing the lesbian and gay community, which makes it one of the richest academic resources on lesbian and gay health issues ever published. 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

#### Community looses leading activist

PHILADELPHIA — The gay community lost one of its leading activists on December 27 with the death in Philadelphia of Joseph Fairchild Beam. The exact cause of his death was not immediately clear. Friends said, however, that he had been in ill health recently and had been extremely depressed for several months.

For many years, Beam had worked to create a stronger movement of black les-


bians and gay men. He was the first editor of *Black/Out*, a magazine serving that community, and served three years on the board of directors of the National Coalition for Black Lesbians and Gays.

"Joe was such a positive role model for black gay men and women alike," said Renee McCoy, executive director of the NCBLG. "He had a gentle, frank spirit and was an inspiration to gays and lesbians at all levels, from all walks of life."

In 1985. Beam began work on a collection of writings and artwork by black gay men. It was published eighteen months later, under the title *In the Life*. Although a number of works had already been published by and about black lesbians. Beam's was the first anthology ever to focus on the experiences of black gay men.

Essex Hemphili, a member of NCBLG and a contributor to *In the Life*, also spoke of the inspiration that Beam had provided: "The work that Joe did in the community as a whole — gay and lesbian, black and white — enriched the community in ways that have yet to manifest themselves. His life was a light for many of us. His book opened up an important dialgue among black gay men, and made us aware of the number of us out here."

At the time of his death, Beam was compiling material for a second collection, *Brother to Brother*. According to his publisher, Sasha Alyson, "Joe already had made a great deal of progress on that book,

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
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

The new Trikone (Gay & Lesbian South Asian Support Group) Chapter in Patna, India, reports that a national debate on the proposed law is likely to be held soon. They report that there has been a global outcry against the suggestion made by the learned doctor and they predict that the recommended law will not be passed.

There have been eight deaths recorded in India since April, 1986, which were AIDS related. Approximately 345 people have been identified as testing positive for the AIDS antibody (HIV) test, most during a recent screening program of 90,000 Indians and foreigners. Last year all foreign students were required to be tested for the

In a related development, India's major newspapers and magazines are beginning to open up to gay people. The popular weekly Sunday Magazine, published in Calcutta and read nationwide, featured on August 6 an eight page cover article titled, "The Love That Dare Not Speak It's Name", subtitled "The Secret World Of The Indian Homosexual." This well written cover story includes details of the gay scene in Bombay, New Delhi, Calcutta and throughout India, police extortionist rackets against gays, personal coming out stories, the AIDS scare and India, and news about Trikone, the U.S.A. based support group for lesbian and gay South Asians, which recently started a group in Patna, India. India-wide newsletter project.

CCG reports that they are still looking for some office space so they can establish a permanent office and put down their roots. Up to now they have been meeting in private houses. They are hoping that contributions and shirt sales will help them realize their

On December 4th, CCG held a workshop on "Sexuality and the Lesbian Experience' for women only, workshop the women of CCG went on a surprise excursion to a couple of San Juan's favorite gathering places to socialize.

South African police raided the home of a woman who hosted a private party in honor of the gay anti-apartheid activist, Eseko Simon Nkodi. The raid was part of the Botha government's intensified crackdown on political opposition.

The woman was interrogated and accused of using her home for political meetings, which are now banned under South Africa's emergency regulations.

Simon Nkodi has been on trial, as one of the Vaal 22, for the past three years, on the charges of treason. He spent three years in jail waiting for the trial to start and during the first two years of trial. The verdict after 36 months, South Africa's longest trial, was reached on November 18, 1988, with four of the defendents convicted of treason and seven of terrorism. All are subject to the death penalty. Nkodi was one of the three acquitted. Eight had been acquitted

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Judge Kijkhorst, like all South African judges, a white, ruled that "treason need not be a violent act, but could be something as innocent as ringing a church bell to sound the arlarm for a violent uprising". He said the defendants were tried "not by their conviction, but by their deeds.'

Nkodi, who started the first multi-racial gay and lesbian group in South Africa before his imprisonment, was accused of making speeches at funerals that supposedly triggered riots and he was twice hospitalized due to alleged beatings by prison officials during his three years in jail



#### Dean Goodman: Hollywood's Oldest Starlet

After acting in 400 plays over a 50-year period, Dean Goodman is suddenly hot; and he's loving it. What's made the difference is his first major role in a theatrical film, Francis Ford Coppola's Tucker: The Man and His Dream.

On the night the picture opened in San Francisco, Goodman was presented with a replica of a Oscar at a dinner/movie which party started with a handful of friends and grew to more than 80, including State Senator Milton Marks and gay community leaders Pat Norman and John Wahl.

Goodman only gets 14th billing

in *Tucker*, but aside from Jeff Bridges' Preston Tucker and the car he invents, Goodman's character, Bennington, may be the only one you remember an hour after seeing the film.

Bennington is a venerable Detroiter engaged to chair the board of directors of the company that will produce Tucker's revolutionary new auto in the late 1940s. Hired as window dressing to attract stockholders, Bennington develops a mind of his own and opposes all of Tucker's innovations from within the corporation while politicians manipulated by the Big Three automakers are working from without to shut Tucker down

"I was really very fortunate," Goodman says, "in that nearly everything I did was used in the final cut." In fact, after shooting was completed he was called back to do some auditional scenes. "I happened to be very lucky, very lucky to get a role they wanted to build."

Actually he got two roles. Co-producer Fred Roos also picked han to do the voice of Drew Pearson for a radio broadcast. It was Roos who first asked Goodman ticipate in a reading of the film's script ear ly in 1987. No casting had been done at that point, Warren Beatty and Jack Nicholson were under consideration for the lead, and Coppola just wanted some local actors to give him an idea of what the dialogue would sound like. Kathy Baker (Clean and Sober) read Tucker's wife that day. Goodman showed up in a three-piece suit and Coppola, who had never met him before, said, "You look like this man [Bennington]." The actor thinks that may be when he clinched the part, although he didn't know about it until months later.

Francis is wonderful with actors," Goodman says. "He tells you what he wants and then lets you go." He also gave them rehearsal time, which doesn't always happen in the movies and which eased Goodman's transition from stage to screen. He says he'd do anything Coppola or Roos asked him to if they want him for future projects.

Goodman moved to Hollywood from Seattle in the early '40s and was kept busy working in radio, although agents predicted a screen career for him. (They were right — they just didn't say when.) Among his teachers was noted Russian character actress Maria Ouspenskaya. "I was her protege and secretary for three years," he says, denying rumors that he was anything else to her.

"She liked young men and was very flirtatious," he says, "but she never made any sexual overtures to me." When Good-

man became engaged to Maria Seiber, the rumors about him reached her mother, Marlene Dietrich, before he met her, and made her approval harder to obtain.

Dietrich was the subject of enough rumors herself that she should have known better than to listen to any, but not all of hers were false. Goodman confirms the liklihood of his ex-mother-in-law's lesbian activity. "If you have to categorize," he says, indicating his distaste for labels, "I guess you could say Marlene was bisexual. From what Maria told me, her mother never liked having sex, but had a strong maternal instinct and enjoyed mothering men."

Goodman's sex life has been equally diverse but now he says, "At this point my sexuality isn't something I'm much concerned with." More important to him is the fact that he's "surrounded by very good friends." He's still friendly, he says, with "the kid I made mud pies with when I was five. He lives in Portland now."

Although he's distressed by the difficulty Marshall Mason and Jerry Wheeler have had to casting *The Front Runner*, Goodman sees other signs that homophobia is easing in Hollywood. On a recent trip there to talk to agents, he relates, one spoke of actors bringing their boyfriends to a party while another mentioned, in the course of a tour, the predominance of gays in West Hollywood. Neither sounded judgemental, Goodman insists.

He says he's no more concerned about playing gay roles in films than he has been in the theater. "People can think what they want." While appearing in a production of My Fat Friend about ten years age, Goodman says he was "criticized for making [his gay character] too flamboyant and nellic. The fact is, some gay people are like that. I patterned him largely after Don McLean and Charles Pierce, and approached it the way I do any part."

Although he's in no way pretentious about it, it's impossible for Goodman to discuss his career without name-dropping. John Carradine gave his his first Equity role in 1943, touring in Shakespearean repertory. "All I knew about him," Carradine has been quoted as saying, "was that he could read verse and he had terrific legs for wearing tights." Moving to San Francisco in the '50s, Goodman taught Keir Dullea at San Francisco State and gave Katharine Ross her first role in a verse play he directed in 1962. He can rattle off an impressive list of stars he's performed with, perhaps the least of whom is former San Francisco mayor Diane

Feinstein, with whom he appeared in Ibsen's *The Master Builder* in 1959.

Goodman, who wrote the book on San Francisco theater (*San Francisco Stages: A Concise History, 1849-1986*), feels his talents have been underutilized in recent years. Age

discrimination could be a factor, as he cites roles that have gone instead to younger, less well suited actors. "We have to change a lot of society's concepts about aging and growing older," Goodman says.

Blessed with good health and working in a business with no mandatory retirement, he feels he's got at least a dozen good years left, but he expresses concern for people in other fields who are forced to retire when they're not prepared for it. He cites a survey

that found the average man lives only 36 months after retiring. "If you have enough varied interests you can go from one to another at any age," he advises. It's not necessary to leave a job and become a vegetable.

Having taught younger actors himself,
Goodman is critical of the training many of
them receive. "Actors today are not taught
to speak." he says in his perfectly-modulated
way. "I'm a 'Method' actor, but I'm in the
Stanislavsky Method, not the Strasberg
Method. Stanislavsky emphasized voice and
diction." It was Lee Strasberg's distortion
of that teaching, he indicates that gave us

On the other hand, the *Tucker* experience brought Goodman insight into the difficult mechanics of movie acting. "My respect for film actors went up a great deal," he admits. A lesson Ouspenskaya taught him.

came back when he had to become Bennington at an emotional peak with no chance to build to it: "You don't need two hours' preparation. All you have to do is ask yourself three questions — Who am I?, Where am I? What am I doing?"

Dean Goodman is on his way to Hollywood, but without giving up his San Francisco apartment. Four agents have asked to represent him since seeing his performance in *Tucker*. "My only worry now is that I'm going to be typed as playing shits," he jokes

He's wise enough to know this could all blow over in a short time. "This may just be my 12 minutes — Andy Warhol overestimated," he says. But whether it's 12 minutes. 12 years or whatever, he's going to enjoy it while it lasts. It's not every 68-year-old man who gets to be Hollywood's newest starlet.


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



The idea behind this disgusting idea is money of course. You put a quarter into a

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

#### Without Reservations

In this week's column we will discuss a potpourri of films of which three share a common thread: reactions based on a cultivated heritage of prejudice - stirring the bubbling pot of hatred, so to speak. The theme of **The Cauldron**, the subject of our restaurant review, is also predicated upon a bubbling pot, but fortunately this one is filled with a range of delightfully delectable fondues. The Celluloid counterpart trio consists of Alan Parker's Mississippi Burning, featuring Gene Hackman and Willem Dafoe, Talk Radio, another statement by Oliver Stone, this time with Eric Bogosian, Alec Baldwin and Ellen Greene; and finally Tony Award winning Torch Song Trilogy, with Anne Bancroft joining a trinity of the original Broadway cast members including Harvey Fierstein (who won a Tony for Best Actor and wrote this screenplay), Brian Kerwin and Matthew Broderick (albeit in a role more suited to his current age). We will also touch on Garry Marshall's Beaches with Bette Midler and Barbara Hershey and Things Change, David Mamet's latest film starring Don Ameche and Joe Mantegna.

#### THE CAULDRON

Although it doesn't exactly look like a cozy Swiss chalet, diners at *The Cauldron* do get to have a sense of privacy because all the booths in this dining room are semienclosed with wooden partitions and cafe curtains. The resulting sense of intimacy is an important factor here, for eating fondue should really also be a social experience and uninhibited congenial interaction among the consumers (those who consume) can make dining into a truly special occasion. The servers of this recently opened establishment go out of their way to ensure that your meal here is more than just the sum of its parts. I guess it should be noted at this point that although the menu would suggest that this eatery is beyond our arbitrary price range of \$10, I would suggest that one may have a quite rewarding meal by sharing both an appetizer and an entree fondu (or, perhaps, an entree and a dessert fondu) with a friend, thus each diner having more than a sufficient amount of food at a cost of about \$10 per person. Sneaky, but practical — besides, the portions are huge and fondue is not the most practical thing to take home in a doggy bag!

The menu boasts two appetizer foundues, one of Cheddar and Emmenthaler Swiss in a beer base, seasoned by the waiter with pepper and nutmeg (\$8.50), could serve up to four), the other of white wine,

Greyere and Emmenthaler Swiss, also with personalized seasonings (\$9.50, of ditto proportions). Dipping objects include cubes of light and dark breads (which are just a little on the soft side), crisp veggies including cauliflower, carrots and celery, plus wedges of apples, a super combination with both the cheese fondues. A word of caution is in order here. These cheese pots are very rich and filling, so go easy or you won't have room for your main course.

The garden salad, which is included with all entrees, is a nice mix of crips greens and purples, tomatoes and bits of other goodies. It comes with a wonderfully true flavored, slightly sweet and puckery raspberry vinaigrette. A mushroom salad with a mild-Florentine Italian dressing is also available at \$3.00.

For our main dishes the waiter, a peronable and knowledgeable young man, places a bowl of hot oil on the little stand provided on our table. When the oil is ready for cooking in he brings out nicely arranged dishes of the main ingredients along with a variety of dipping sauces.

The Seafood Fondue (\$13.50 generous collection of shrimp and scallops with half slices of zucchini and some fluf-fy mushroom caps is augmented with a sesame butter to coat any or all of the above. The results are not that dissimilar

Japanese tempura, although the coating is a little heavier. The other two fondues have chunks of their namesakes (chicken [\$10.50] and beef [\$11.50]) with the same accompaniments as the seafood versions. The dipping sauces include a very sweet and tangy mustard (similar to a Swedish mustard), horseradish, red cocktail sauce, tartar sauce, a decent bottled BBQ sauce, and some other kind of white sauce which is interesting but not spectacular. The fun is in the dipping and cooking and dipping and eating...and watching your friends doing the same thing, (all of us with varying degrees of success). One friend loves the beef the best by far (but, I must admit, he is a meat and potatoes man), while the other two agree with me in favoring the fish. We all concur that the chicken version is too bland.

The plates and serving pieces, incidentally, are very handsome. The cast aluminum fondue pots are big and fat and round with a short, stubby handle. The salad and dinner plates are also of the same material, the latter having sections to put each of the dipping sauces on without them getting too friendly with each other.

The dessert tray contains some nice

looking pastries (\$3.75 each) imported from Ceres Market in Mesa, which would still have been entirely superfluous for us after such a filling meal, even if they had been reasonable priced. Who in their right mind, anyway, would choose storebought pastries over a chocolate fondue (\$6.50, serves four) with chunks of pineapple, apple, banana, strawberries, angel food cake and marshmellows to dip into this bubbling designer chocolate sauce?

Imported wines and beers are available, as well as a variety of domestic ones.

It may not be elegant, but putting the pots on the table makes for a fun meal that you'll enjoy for more than just its good taste.

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


Critics all over are praising Gene (The French Connection, Hoosiers, No Way Out) Hackman for his portrayal of a crusty old Southern sheriff turned FBI man in Alan (Fame, Pink Floyd — The Wall, Birdy, Angel Heart) Parker's hard hitting look at the deep seated prejudices in the rural South that kept making black and white integration so elusive during the '60s. The film is full of superlatives, but I would put my highest stamp of approval on the brilliant performance of Willem (Platoon, The Last Temptation of Christ) Dafoe as the button-down FBI special agent, who reveals the depth of his character with finesse and subtlety one layer at a time. Other notable depictions are presented by Brad (One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest, Blue Velvet) Dourif and Frances (Blood Simple, Raisin' Arizona) McDormand as the pivotal characters of the deputy sheriff and his wife.


Chris Gerolmo's screenplay is light years beyond Miles From Home, his clunker of last year, and Peter (9 1/2 Weeks, Another Country, The Life of Brian) Biziou's consistently remarkable photography leaves us

with some unforgettable images. Most importantly, however, Alan Parker successfully walks the directing tightrope, never stray ing too far toward either the perils of overkill or those of understatement. One Kurosawa inspired scene that he engineered is particularly memorable because a softening technique makes it all the more powerful: the KKK is beating up the Negro congregation of a church and the sound effects of the brutality — the pommeling noises and the screaming of the victims — is gradually drowned out by a hauntingly beautiful hymn sung by the clear solo voice of Lanny Spann McBride and the sight of a small boy from the congregation praying in front of the church.

I don't know how much education can be derived from a film like this. Probably the people who need to learn its lessons the most will be the least likely to see it. Others might feel "well, that's another time another place." Perhaps it is, but don't bet that similar things don't happen today. Maybe right here in Arizona. Maybe to another minority. Maybe you!

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

As the show progresses over the years, Barry loses the playfulness of his "controversy for ratings" scheme and begins to take his show and himself far too seriously as he becomes more and more caught up in the dark side that his audience has legitimized by public hearing. Eventually, by constantly talking down to his callers, he has learned to hate everyone — himself very much included.

Even those that saw the end of this film in the beginning of Betrayed last year will still be shocked by the lengths some extremists will go to protect their irrational little worlds. It's chilling, to say the least, and that's exactly what Oscar winning director Oliver (Platoon, Salvador, Wall Street) Stone and Eric Bogosian had in mind when they co-authored this powerhouse of a screenplay, based on Stephen Singular's Talked to Death: The Life and Murder of Alan Berg", based on the life and demise of an actual Denver radio talk show

Since most of this story takes place in a radio station, it is heavily dependent on an exceptional writer and a highly imaginative cinematographer to keep it from becoming a static bore. Director of photography Robert (Platoon, Salvador, Wall Street [sound familiar?]) Richardson employs a bagful of devices such as extreme close-ups, sliding focus two-shots, double reflections in the studio windows (often with sliding focus for additional variety and emphasis), and 360 degree process shots that are totally awesome, but never distracting from the mood of the scenes. Deft acting on the parts of Alec Baldwin, Ellen Green and especially Michael Wincott (for his creation of a drug-crazed hippie) make this statement all the more powerful.

Talk Radio is a compelling refutation of the old aphorism "Sticks and stones will break my bones, but words will never harm me." Of course you never believed that one

Some plays, no matter how triumphant in their stage version, do not translate well into films, and Harvey Fierstein's Broadway success surely would have been one of them. Mr. Fierstein, however, was employed by the seasoned production team of director Paul (Skin Game and for TV "Mark Twain Tonight" and "All In The Family" for four seasons) Bogart and producer Howard (Network, Altered States) Gottfried, under the aegis of New Line Cinema studios, to completely rewrite the show into a feature length film, adding and deleting as he saw fit. The results are even better than the Tony award winning original, although it's doubtful that the basically homophobic Academy will see it so honored.


Of the actors portraying the four major characters, only Anne Bancroft was not in the play, and I felt her film role to be just a little too stereotypical of a Jewish mother to suit me, although she was totally brilliant in many scenes. Her confrontation with Arnold in the cemetary over who has the right to grieve the loss of a spouse was one of the highlights of the film. Brian Kerwin was surprisingly effective as Arnold's off-again,

on-again confused bisexual lover, a difficult part to play where the actor has to have the confidence that his character lacks. Arnold's second lover, Alan, is skillfully and sensitively portrayed by Matthew Broderick, who grew out of the part of their adopted son during the five year hiatus between the Broadway and Hollywood vehicles. His youth translates into an appealing innocence, which makes his death an even more powerful statement and puts some of the ensuing scenes on a far firmer foundation. Fierstein's Arnold, naturally, pulls all the characters together and he appears in nearly every scene. Being that this story is basically the author's autobiography, that is quite fitting. And, he does a bang-up job. Kudos must also be bestowed upon Eddie Castrodad for his rendition of David, Arnold's loveable adopted punk son. Another treat is the reapearance on the screen of Charles Pierce, this time as a drag named Bertha Venation.

Actually the film is, for the most part, totally believable. Of course the idea that two extremely handsome men, on separate occasions, fall head over heels for plain old

taken by the writer. The movie's biggest parting from reality, however, is a scene where there is a giant parking space awaing Ed and Arnold right smack in front of the house in Brooklyn! Pure fantasy!

Torch Song Trilogy, the movie, will make you laugh — hard and often — and it will may you cry (yes, grown-ups are allowed to cry, as long as they don't make a habit of it). It is an honest outpouring of a man's heart, unabashedly claiming his fair share in life. It is to be expected that peo-

ple of various backgrounds will react quite differently to the numerous ideas set forth here. (Undoubtedly some with narrow vision will leave at the first kiss between two men.) Quite possibly Broderick sums it all up best: "...more than about being gay, it's about having a family and understanding what a family is...in that sense, it really is an old-fashioned story." It certainly is one you should take your family to see.

#### **BEACHES**



Director Gary Marshall, who previously directed "Nothing in Common" and "The Flamingo Kid", brings his unique flair for combining both drama and comedy to "Beaches", a new serio-comic musical drama starring Bette Midler and Barbara Hershey as two strikingly different women who share a remarkable friendship. They say opposites attract, and you would be hard pressed to find two people more different from each other than CC Bloom (Bette Midler) and Hillary Whitney Essex (Barbara Hershey) in Garry (Nothing in Common, The Flamingo Kid and a slew of the most successful TV sitcoms you could imagine) Marshall's latest feature film, Beaches.

A flashback reveals the roots of their thirty year friendship which all begins when they are eleven and young Hillary (Marcie Leeds), on the beach at Atlantic City (this, you must remember, takes place when this resort town was in the waning days of its golden years), can't remember the name of the posh hotel her family is staying in. Distraught, she runs into young CC (Mayim Bialik, an amazing look-alike casting job), a "showgirl" who is catching a smoke under the boardwalk in her outlandishly gaudy production outfit. These are certainly not two peas from the same pod!


Nevertheless, a lifelong friendship sprouts, to be nurtured only through correspondence for the next decade or so (which, consummated on Celluloid in about a minute or so, contains the line "I got to sing at my father's dry cleaning convention. I was great!"), until one day Hillary decides to chuck her aristocratic way of life and visit her old pal CC, a struggling singer. She moves in with CC in her one bedroom flat, and the girls have a great time being poor

together. Money, it seems, will be one of the roller-coaster influences on the durability of their friendship. Men will be one of the others.

Although this is a comedrama, the first hour and a half is actually as funny as any of Midler's made for laughs comedies, with a lot more poignancy thrown in for balance. Then it gets serious — dead serious — with very little comic relief. It's not that this part isn't done well, it's just that you can't expect life to be a continual bowl of cherries. But, it (life, that is) does go on, and the end is at least a little uplifting. All in all, it has more than just a little affinity to Terms of Endearment. Of course, Beaches has the distinct advantage of Midler singing a few fine numbers. And, in my opinion, the possibility of Hershey getting a nomination nod from the Academy. John Heard, Spalding Gray and Lainie Kazan certainly hold up their ends, acting wise, and the three youngsters (the two mentioned above plus eight year-old Grace Johnston in her film debut as Hillary's daughter, Victoria) all put in impressive performances as well.

Naturally, somewhere in reviewerland, we inevitably will find a joker who can't resist making humor out of the obvious title for a sequel to this film — one centering around male progeny. But, after that ending, you can be sure it certainly won't be
