## ADHS compiles preliminary data from HIV prevalence study

PHOENIX - The Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS) has compiled preliminary results of a study designed to measure the prevalence of HIV infection in patients visiting the Maricopa County Sexually Transmitted Disease (STD) Clinic. The data will help public health officials track the spread of the human immunodeficiency virus, or HIV, the virus which causes AIDS.

HIV antibody tests were conducted on blood samples that had already been drawn for syphilis screening tests at the STD clinic. All identifiers, such as names and addresses of patients, were removed. This procedure called "blinding", allows researchers to gather data for statistical purposes without means of identifying individuals being

Initial results from the STD Clinic show that of 204 men tested who reported having sex with other men (homosexual acitivity), 64, or 31.37 percent were HIV positive. Of 532 men tested who did not report sex with other men (heterosexual activity only), six, or 1.13 percent were HIV positive. Of 424 women tested, two, or 0.47 percent were positive.

According to Dr. Steven Englender, Assistant Director of the Division of Disease Prevention, the data should not be interpreted to mean that 31 percent of all gay or bisexual men in Phoenix are infected with

"The data from this study show that approximately 31 percent of men who report having sex with other men and who are seeking treatment for other

STDs in public clinics are HIV positive. This in no way measures the antibody status of an entire community," he said. "The fact that these men continue to become infected with STDs, necessitating a visit to the clinic, implies that they are continuing to practice unsafe sex, and are probably the group at greatest risk for HIV infection in the community.

"Though the group tested is a small subset of all men participating in homosexual or bisexual activity, the results of the study are important. It clearly shows that men participating in unsafe sexual activity with other men in the Phoenix area are taking a significant risk," he noted. "HIV infection is well-established in a subgroup of the gay and bisexual community. Just as important, the study shows that most men in this highest risk group are still uninfected, so there remains the opportunity for them to protect themselves by practicing safer sex," he said.

The study, which began in June, 1988, is part of the "Family of Surveys", a fiveyear nationwide research project funded by the federal Centers for Disease Control (CDC). Phoenix is one of 30 metropolitan areas chosen to participte in the project.

Other studies in the Family of Surveys for which data are not yet available include: women of childbearing age, patients with active tuberculosis, clients in treatment for intravenous drug use, and all newborns delivered in medical facilities across

## Belgian National charged with Ft Lauderdale gay executions

FT. LAUDERDALE - A Belgian Arcorporal turned himself into Ft. Lauder-e police in the early morning, of Thursday, January 12, confessing to the execution-style murders of two local gay men which he committed several days earlier as an act of revenge against his former male lover.

Rudy Van den Borre, 25, a Washington, D.C. Belgian embassy elerk and driver, is currently being held without bond at the Broward County Jail on two counts of firstdegree murder.

A jogger discovered the body of Ft. Lauderdale TWA flight reservationist Michael Eagan, 36, dead from a bullet sho to the head on a secluded beach in the 1800 block of N. Atlantic Boulevard in Ft. Lauderdale at approximately 7:00 a.m. Sunday, January 8.

At 7:25 a.m. the next morning, the body of a man later identified as Hollywood, Florida cab driver Gerald Simons, 52, was found dead from two shots to the head by a security guard on a secluded strip of beach several miles north, behind the Sea Ranch Condominiums in the 5000 block of N. Atlantic Boulevard.

Both men were found with their money and jewelry which ruled out robbery as a motive, police stated. After learning that Eagan was gay and Simons was found with his pants unbuttoned, police began questioning members of the local gay community for leads in the similar cases.

Police began receiving tips over the next two days, including some from Van den Borre himself who gave police ambiguous leads and pleads for help. Telling detectives here he had abandoned Eagan's car, Van den Borre tipped off police that he was the murderer. Later providing them with

## Frank pushes 'pro-gay' rules changes through House

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Two rules changes in the U.S. House of Representatives, authored and pushed by openly gay Rep. Barney Frank (D-MA), could significantly dampen the impact of future anti-gay parliamentary ploys by Congressional homophobes. The changes were accepted by the House on January 4.

The first change allows the Speaker of the House to postpone by 24 hours the debate and vote on motions that the House accept Senate amendments to legislation. In recent years, anti-gay Senators have often been able to pass their amendments through the House by having House Homophobes call 'surprise' votes. Now, pro-gay House members have gained a day to rally against

accepting Senate amendments.

The second change requires that th time for debate on such Motions be equally divided between the maker of the Motion and those opposed to it.

"While this is complicated, it is very significant," said Robert Bray of the Human Rights Campaign Fund, a gay political action committee. "Often these Motions happen so fast that members of the House can't analyze and debate them. With these changes, the House leadership will have time to react and the Democratic leadership will have a chance to work with the Appropriations Committee — the all important funding committee - to devise alternatives.'

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## Belgian National charged with gay executions

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Simons' name, which had not been released pending the notification of next of kin, he confirmed their suspicions.

When asked where he was by police, he at one point said, "Come and find me." He urged the police to catch him before he killed again.

At approximately 2:30 a.m., Thursday morning, January 12, after admittedly planning a third murder, Van den Borre flagged down Ft. Lauderdale patrolman Kevin Shultz in the 200 block of S. Atlantic Boulevard and confessed to the killings, showing the officer a travel bag which contained what he said was the murder weapon.

The Ft. Lauderdale's State Attorney's Office and the U.S. State Department have filed a request for a waiver of diplomatic immunity with the Belgian embassy which has been forwarded to officials in Belgium.

According to police sources, the embassy is willing to let Van den Borre be tried by the American system, although embassy officials have not offered comment.

Embassy officials state that Van den Borre was reported to American agents as missing from his job Tuesday, January 3. According to his taped confession to Ft. Lauderdale police, after suffering an emotional and violent break up with his male lover in Washington, Van den Borre packed his 9 mm pistol in a travel bag and boarded a Greyhound bus to Ft. Lauderdale to escape the cold and seek "revenge" against his former partner on as many gay men as he could find.

After arriving in Ft. Lauderdale Wednesday, January 4, according to police, he stayed on the beach and streets for several days.

According to his taped confession and police records, the killings progressed as follows:

On Saturday night, January 7, Van den
Borre went to the Cathode Ray, a Ft.
Lauderdale gay video bar on Las Olas
Boulevard where he met Eagan. After bar
hopping, the two rode in Eagan's car to the
beach to presumedly have sex. There, in the
early morning hours of Sunday, January 8,
Van den Borre shot Eagan in the head at
close range.

At approximately 4:30 p.m. the same day, Van den Borre encountered Simons at the Marlin Beach Hotel, a Ft. Lauderdale gay resort. After dinner and a stop at the Cathode Ray, the two rode north in Simons' cab and walked to the secluded stretch of beach. There, the two men laid down in the sand. Van den Borre then rose on the pretense that he needed to urinate, took the gun out of his travel bag and shot Simons in the head once at close range.

After waiting 30 seconds, he rolled Simons on his side and fired another bullet into the back of his skull.

Van den Borre went before a magistrate hearing Friday, January 13 where a public defender was named for him.

Belgian officials have granted Van den Borre a limited waiver of immunity pending further governmental review so that American proceedings may begin.

## **Health Services Releases AIDS Data**

On January 23 the Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS) called a meeting open to interested members of the gay community to discuss results from AIDS studies they have been conducting.

Due to the need to provide this information immediately to the state Legislature, little time was afforded to inform the public. Nineteen were in attendance at the meeting addressed by Dr. Steven Englender, Assistant Director of the Division of Disease Prevention.

This was a prime concern of organizers of the meeting. It was originally hoped to have community-wide participation, however, the scheduled public release of the information coincided too closely with finalization of the study itself. It had been clearly stated that it is the desire of the department to bring the gay community into these meetings both now and in the future. They were not wholly responsible for the low turnout.

Concerns of some organizational leaders both before and after that the contacts could and possibly should have been made by one or more local organizations were perhaps correct, however difficult due to the lack of an up-to-date index in the community of those and other organizations and businesses. This perhaps is a matter which could be dealt with with beneficial results by the new Council of Central Arizona and/or another or affiliate group in Tucson.

Also of concern was that due to the

complex nature of the subject and rampant discussion, misconception and outright rumor that exists around the subject of voluntary and mandatory HIV testing, as to what the difference is between a positive result to HIV testing and AIDS diagnosis, would they be correctly reported. Whether that occurred is questionable due to statments on news broadcasts and carried in the press on following days. It was evident that those reporting were not fully informed on the subject of AIDS.

In a discussion on Wednesday, January 25, at the department, it was agreed that at least there is a benchmark providing a basis from which to work. Whether the meeting itself was effective, whether the results of the testing are definitive and whether there is resulting beneficial or negative impact overall will be analyzed.

That the effort to make contact on the part of the State with the gay community, that the issue has already raised considerable interest, that more have become aware of the immense proportions of the AIDS epidemic, are good points.

Agree or not with the holding of a meeting, with the results of the testing, or with the fast release of its results, at least it's a start. This has proven that our community needs better methods of providing contact with it by agencies and that there's need for more education on the subjects of AIDS testing and what HIV-positive and AIDS diagnoses are, not only by the public in general, but by the media that interprets and reports it.

Bray said that, "in essence, what Frank has accomplished is a clever method of preventing surprise attacks. Sometimes we know they're coming and sometimes we don't," he said. "Congressmen will now be spared voting on the spot on the floor. The net result will be rewordings of homophobic amendments or time to rally the vote against them."

Frank's "clever" rules changes caught Washington gay activists by surprise, Bray said, and "are a very good way to kick off the lolst Congress. Right from the beginning, we are setting the rules in favor of justice and logic and reason. Barney is an excellent legislator to even have thought this up. And it shows just how savvy the gay

movement has become in Congress. We can play hardball just like [anti-gay Sen. Jesse] Helms (R-NC) and [anti-gay Rep. William] Dannemeyer (R-CA)," Bray said.

Frank said his rules changes should "head off these crazy things of Helms" which are worded to scare people. Congressmen are afraid to vote against these things because they're worded to prevent things that were never going to happen, like forceable education in cross-dressing," Frank explained. "Virtually everything else that comes up before us has to wait a day. Now we have a chance to come up with alternatives. And when you look at the bad stuff around AIDS, it's always been the same pattern — a bad amendment in the Senate and a quick Motion to Accept in the House."

The rules changes, Frank says, won't work for the gay community every time, but "it will be better."

## Gay man elected president of San Francisco Board of Supervisors

SAN FRANCISCO — On January 9th, Harry G. Britt became the first openly gay man to be elected as President of the San Francisco Board of Supervisors. Supervisor Britt is one of the most prominent elected gay officials in the country. In January, 1979, he succeeded the late Harvey Milk who was slain along with Mayor George Moscone by

former Supervisor Dan White. Harry Britt was a close political associate and personal friend of Supervisor Milk. Elected to a full term in December,

Elected to a full term in December, 1979, Harry Britt was the only challenged incumbent to retain a sear on the Board of Supervisors. Supervisor Britt has been re-

elected in November of 1980, 1984, and by an overwhelming margin, in 1988, in citywide races. In the 1988 election, Britt placed first in a field of twenty-five candidates. Harry Britt has emerged as one of the strongest progressive voices in San Francisco politics. While effectively advocating the rights of gay people, he has also been a strong proponent of the rights and welfare of working people, seniors, women, minorities and the disabled. Britt has also authored landmark legislation responding to the AIDS epidemic.

## NYNEX agrees to create new social and human services listings

NEW YORK — The State Consumer Protection Board (CPB), NYNEX Information Resources Company and the Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation, Inc. (GLADD) announced an agreement to enhance the "Social and Human Services" heading in the NYNEX Yellow Pages.

Within that category, public and private agencies will be listed under interest-specific sub-headings such as "gay and lesbian organizations", "charitable organizations",

"crisis intervention", "children's services" and "suicide prevention & counseling".

"The new 'Social and Human Services' headings is one of the first of its type in the country that separates public and private groups by the services offered in the Yellow Pages," said Richard M. Kessel, Executive Director of the Consumer Protection Board (CPB). "I hope that other directory publishers will follow NYNEX's lead."

Previously, NYNEX listed various

groups in alphabetaical order under the general heading "Social Service Organizations", which did not provide group specific sub-headings

The new headings policy covers all major Yellow Pages directories throughout NYNEX's service territories in New England and New York. NYNEX will be contacting the organizations now listed to determine the specific sub-heading under which they should be listed.

"Our re-designed Social and Human Services heading will better serve the needs of our customers," said Donald B. Reed, President of Information Resources. "The new sub-headings enhance the value of the NYNEX Yellow Pages for both advertisers and users."

The agreement emerged from mid-December meetings between CPB Deputy Executive Director Virginia M. Apuzzo and officials from NYNEX and GLAAD. For over a year GLAAD had sought a separate heading for "Gay & Lesbian Organizations" and asked the CPB to intervene. Rather than a separate heading, NYNEX proposed enhancing its social service heading. The CPB recognized that these

listings could be further expanded to include a wide range of interest-specific social services.

NYNEX also has added two cross-references to its directories. Consumers who look up "Gay Organizations" or "Lesbian Organizations" are referred to the enhanced "Social and Human Services" heading.

Apuzzo said, "People need to quickly identify and locate an organization that can help them. The new Social and Human Services sub-headings will make it easier to access the proper agency. I am delighted that the CPB was able to help secure this agreement."

GLAAD Assistant Director Karin Schwartz, who first requested a "Gay and Lesbian Organizations" heading on behalf of Heritage of Pride (the organizers of New York's annual gay and lesbian pride march and rally), hailed the decision as an "important step for our organization. Future gay and lesbian Yellow Pages users will be able to locate the services they need with greater ease." GLAAD Executive Director Craig Davidson noted that "the benefits of the agreement will extend well beyond the gay and lesbian community."

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
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## Basile to leave HRCF after 5 years of service

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Victor J. Basile announced his resignation as executive director of the Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF) after six years of lobbying, fundraising, strategizing and organizing for the nation's gay and lesbian

Basile, named HRCF's executive director in 1983, helped transform the gay rights group into the largest and most powerful lesbian and gay political action committee (PAC) and lobbying force in the U.S.

In December 1985, Basile managed the merger of HRCF and the Gay Rights National Lobby (GRNL) — the first national congressional gay and lesbian lobbying group. HRCF continued to grow, merging with the Fairness Fund constituent mobilization group in February, 1988.

Under his directorship, fundraising and fiscal growth for the gay PAC expanded in unprecedented amounts. HRCF's budget grew from \$300,000 in 1983 to \$2 million this year. HRCF staff has grown from three dedicated activists in 1983 to 15 today.

Last spring, the Federal Elections Commission ranked HRCF the ninth largest independent PAC in the United States and the 24th largest PAC overall (out of more than 4,000). HRCF gave more than \$400,000 in political contributions to some 111 candidates for federal office during the last election cycle.

During Basile's tenure, HRCF has spearheaded the massive lobbying effort to pass legislation mandating federal policy for fighting AIDS. This effort resulted in the passage of the landmark Health Programs Extension Act last October, which authorized comprehensive AIDS research, care and education programs, and grants for anonymous HIV testing and counseling. Basile played a key role in drafting the legislation and guiding it to adoption.

Basile repeatedly locked horns with notorious Capitol Hill homophobes Jesse Helms (R-NC) and William Dannemeyer CA). Basile initiated several highure actions in response to anti-gay legislation, including a series of hard-hitting anti-Helms advertisements in the New York Times, Washington Post, Los Angeles Times and other mainstream press. The actions resulted in the defeat or weakening of many stile' amendments.

Basile helped shape HRCF's Fairness

Fund, now called the Field Division, into a hugely successful constituent mobilization effort. The Field Division generated an estimated 45,000 to 50,000 pieces of mail to Capitol Hill during the 100th Congress on AIDS or gay and lesbian civil rights the mailgram campaign as one of the key elements in sensitizing Congress to gay

"Serving HRCF and the lesbian and gay community has been one of the most exhilarating and fulfilling experiences in my life," said Basile. "But now the time is right

"HRCF has provided me with opportunities I never knew possible," said Basile. "I've worked with and hopefully influenced the inner circle of political Washington. I've watched the men and women of our movement grow and mature. Today we are proud and powerful political players. We are part of a movement with an even bigger

"Most of all," said Basile, "I've worked with a top staff, a dynamic board, and some of the most talented, hardest working activists in America."

Following his resignation, Basile plans to spend time with his lover of six years, George Graupera, and undertake various personal and business opportunities. Basile said he looks forward to remaining close to HRCF and being active in the gay and lesbian movement.

"Vic Basile will continue to be an important voice in our community," said Hilary Rosen, co-chair of the HRCF board of directors. "We're sorry to see him go and we wish him the best. We're grateful for his skillful management of HRCF and his leadership on tough issues on Capitol Hill. Vic has built a strong foundation upon which the organization will grow and continue to serve gays, lesbians and people with

"Vic helped bring gay and lesbian issues into the mainstream American political process," added Chuck Forester, HRCF board co-chair. "He's not only educated our policy makers in the Congress, but brought many dedicated gays and lesbians into the movement."

Before joining HRCF, Basile was involved in the labor movement and worked for VISTA and the Peace Corps. In the early 1980s he was vice president of the Gay and Lesbian Activist Alliance of D.C. and a leading local activist on the Washington scene. Also at that time he was the Gertrude Stein Democratic Club's liaison to the labor movement. Basile's efforts on behalf of the Stein Club in 1982 resulted in the American Federation of State and County Municipal Employees passing an initiative that committed the union to supporting gay and lesbian civil rights.






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
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

## White House AIDS budget termed misleading by NGLTF

WASHINGTON, D.C. — President Reagan's final AIDS budget request, submitted to Congress as part of the Administration's FY 1990 budget package, was described as "inadequate in meeting the needs of the Public Health Service agencies" by National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) Executive Director Jeffrey Levi. "Once again, the Reagan Administration is playing politics with numbers and the public health."

"Levi criticized the "maniuplation of statistics" by the Administration which claims it seeks a \$2.5 billion FY 1990 spending level for AIDS by combining research and prevention dollars with Medicaid entitlement spending. "Medicaid costs are not included in the accounting expenditures for other diseases, such as cancer or heart disease," Levi said, "neither should it be included for AIDS simply to give the impression that this Administration is doing more than it actually is."

NGLTF said the Public Health Service agencies had requested approximately \$2 billion in funding for AIDS-related activities but had only received \$1.6 billion after Office of Budget and Management review of the requests. Levi called on Congress to appropriate the full level of funding requested by the agencies "so the war on AIDS can be waged with the resources health professionals feel are needed."

Among the specific areas identified by NGLTF as deficient in the Reagan budget request for FY 1990 are:

• The President's request does not include funds to implement programs authorized by Congress in S. 2889, the omnibus AIDS bill passed by Congress in 1988. Among S. 2889's requirements that may not be included in the President's budget are: additional beds for AIDS at NIH, expanded AIDS outpatient capacity at the NIH Clinical Center, creation of several information hotlines, expanded anonymous HIV testing, creation of several databanks regarding treatments and clinical trials, and ex-

panded education activities for certain targeted groups.

• The budget still fails to address the critical primary care problems associated with AIDS. "The health care system may well collapse because of AIDS and yet the agency responsible for shoring up that system, the Health Resourses and Services Administration, is not given resources to initiate major new programs, even ones authorized by Congress," Levi said.

• The National Institutes of Health have received practically no funds for new projects. "In a rapidly changing scientific arena, it boggles the mind that resources have not been provided to allow for new areas of research and investigation," said Levi.

• The Centers for Disease Control has received only a modest increase in prevention funds, so small that funding of more community-based organizations for AIDS prevention activities will not be possible. Levi declared that "community-based organizations have been at the heart of our fight to prevent the spread of HIV. To deny the opportunity to expand their capacities around the nation is a guarantee that more cases of AIDS will occur in future years."

NGLTF also raised concerns about the rest of the health budget presented by the President. "While we seek additional funding for AIDS," "Levi said, "we are also concerned that the President's budget does not adequately address broader research and disease control needs. For example, NIH will have to reduce the number of projects it funds in 1990 compared to 1989. The CDC's immunization and sexually-transmitted disease programs are also underfunded."

NGLTF plans to lead the fight in Congress for adequate funding. Levi expressed the hope that the Bush Administration would reassess the AIDS budget request and "bring it in line with what the health professionals say is needed."

Often, the volunteers provide a 'listening ear' to many who call to be reassured that being gay is OK or to those who are troubled in other ways. The Switchboard is often the first contact for the many visitors to the Valley or new residents," Barnes stated in

Survivors include his partner in life, David McDowell, his mother Jennie, two sisters, Mary Jane and Margie, a brother, Bernie; a son Michael and daughter Michelle. He was preceded in death by his father, Bernard.

A memorial service was held in Philadelphia on January 11th at the First Unitarian Church. Another memorial service will be held in Dallas, Texas on February 11th.

### Frank Pieri, M.C. speaks at OP meeting

TUCSON - "Impairment among professionals isn't only manifested by alcohol or drug abuse," Frank Pieri, M.D. told the Old Pueblo Business and Professional Association (OP) January 19th audience at the Park Plaza International Hotel. "Earliest signs are problems at home, that may eventually lead to indifference, isolation, or deterioration of performance in the workplace," the psychiatrist said.

One avenue for treating occupational stress and impairment, Pieri said, is through assertiveness training and giving ourselves rights. "We have the right to make mistakes, the right to our individual opinions, the right

to be the final judge of our own feelings, the right to change our minds, and we have the right to say no," Pieri stated.

Piere is on staff in psychiatry at Tucson's Palo Verde Hospital.







## **AIDS Professionals** by Arthur Lazere

"Once upon a time...," Mark Freeman begins with the traditional opening. Then he shares stories of millers and monsters set in imaginary lands of long ago and far away. A nurse practitioner and a physician's assistant, Freeman has gone beyond the traditional duties of his profession. "I am a storyteller," he announces with conviction.

As the AIDS epidemic continues its devastation, men and women from the many diverse parts of the gay and the non-gay communities have come forward to assist the afflicted, to work in prevention and education, to participate in the political process on AIDS issues. While many volunteer, others serve in paid positions, bringing with them their particular professional skills, interests and experience.

Freeman, 39, worked some years back in a locked pediatric psychiatric unit of a hospital. "I was not real pleased with the way they were treating the kids there," he recalls. "The kids, between five and twelveyears-old, got fifty minutes of therapy a week. About half of them were characterizhyperactive. Kids like that, you measure their attention span in terms of— Can they watch a half-hour television show? Or just a cartoon? Or is their attention span only the length of a commercial? At lunch time, I started reading them fairy tales. I found that these kids would sit in complete

Later, Freeman worked in a medical hospital with kids before and after they had surgery. He started to look at what kinds of stories were useful for each particular kid. He came to understand that the kids were using television "to escape from an unbearable situation — emotionally unbearable, physically unbearable, their

world turned upside down...Their parents' message was, 'Don't worry, honey. No matter what happens, come to me. I'll fix it.' But now, the parents have fear in their eyes and the kid recognizes it and knows the parent is scared, too. All the security in the world is upset.''



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



leukemia and sicle cell anemia. In contrast to the surgery patients, he says, "these were kids who were already used to dealing wtih mortality. They were told constantly, 'You ould die any time.' Even if they weren't id, they knew it."

Freeman tells stories with themes that include heroism, getting wounded and surviving, being tortured, being separated from parents. He draws on traditional stories, folk tales, literary short stories — wherever he finds materials that work to meet the specialized needs of his patients. "I don't just read to them," he points out, "It's not straight from the book. It begins as a conversation. I set up as much two way communication as possible. That's what doesn't happen with television..."

He launches into another example, utilizing images that reflect feelings of helplessness, isolation, anger. Although he has had no acting training, he uses his voice with theatrical flair. The enthusiasm and charm with which he spins his tale capture and hold the attention of the listener.

Freeman's skills were acknowledged by a grant from the California Arts Council which enabled him to be a storyteller-inresidence at a facility for children with cancer. He has also moved into writing professionally, a natural extension of his storytelling ability.

The application of Freeman's technilies in the AIDS health crisis is a natural
progression. He has conducted hospital and
hospice trainings for storytelling and always
includes the special needs of people with
AIDS. For three years now, he has participated in the annual Day of Remembrance, a program at San Francisco's
Episcopal Grace Cathedral memorializing
those lost to AIDS. He has told stories to
a bereavement group of thirty men, each of
whom had lost a lover to AIDS. "That was
an overwhelming experience for me," he
says, "I felt very honored to be there, but
luckily that didn't shut me up."

Now Freeman is developing a series of 13 half-hour radio programs of stories geared to PWAs. One story he uses is *Beowulf*, the first story in the English language. "It's about dealing with monsters and confronting death. And, in a story like that, it's *safe* to deal with it." Another in his series is an eleventh century Italian-Jewish story about Alexander the Great searching for the waters of eternal life.

A radio station in San Francisco has expressed interest in running the series. Grant requests are out to several foundations to fund production. Freeman points out that tapes of the programs will be made available to AIDS facilities in hospitals, hospices and day care centers, so that with a very small investment, a great deal of comfort will be provided to PWAs.

"The whole purpose of storytelling," Freeman says, "is to affirm the listener... Hearing a good story gives you access to the place inside yourself, the place where reality and fantasy mix. In that half fantasy area, you can try to work out things that are too frightening to deal with directly."

Reggie Williams is another health professional, a radiology technician and hospital administrator, who has gone beyond his original vocation in response to the AIDS epidemic. Williams, 37, is a long time member of Black and White Men Together (BWMT). Working at the University of California Medical Center, he observed growing numbers of patients with AIDS coming in for medical care. In 1984, recognizing the need for special educational outreach to minority gay men, he founded and co-chaired an AIDS task force for the San Francisco chapter of BWMT.

"A lot fo minority men — of all races — do not have the same educational level that most gay white males have," he observes, "A lot of people can't read. Literature aimed at these men has to be basic, in simple words, specific, and stated in street terms that will be understood... Many gay black men do not frequent white gay bars and neighborhoods. They have their own terminology, their own subculture, and it takes a special effort to get AIDS information to them."


One problem in dealing with the issue, Williams points out, is homophobia in the black community. "The religious right in the black community doesn't want to acknowledge that bisexuals and homosexuals are an integral part of the black culture," he says, "It's an unspoken thing."

At the same time, mainstream AIDS organizations initially did not recognize the needs of minority gay communities. "Black gay men were falling through the cracks," Williams says, "in terms of receiving the information they need to save their lives."



Williams has worked to sensitize such institutions as the San Francisco AIDS Foundation and the city's Department of Public Health to minority needs. "It was difficult at the beginning," he says, "but the AIDS Foundation heard what we were saying. We had to picket and demonstrate at the Department of Health. Now there are good relationships between the minority groups and all the mainstream AIDS organizations. People here are aware of the differences and they are trying to assure that education happens in every part of the com-

BWMT, which has 24 chapters encompassing some 1,000 members, has now created a National Task Force on AIDS. Last September, with funding from the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta, the National Task Force hired Williams as project director. Under his leadership, the most successful local AIDS programs of several BWMT chapters are now brought together for national implementation. Included are efforts around advocacy and outreach, issues of AIDS discrimination, racially specific brochures, and a risk reduction workshop called "Hot, Horny, and Healthy."

"Education does work," Williams says, "We know that it works. We've seen it work in the gay white community. Now we are extending the effort into minority communities."

In addition to his BWMT post and numerous other community organization positions, Williams, who was diagnosed with HIV disease in 1986, somehow finds the time to work as a volunteer with San Francisco's Wedge Project. The Wedge Project carries AIDS education into tenth grade classrooms of San Francisco's high schools. Part of the program calls for a PWA to speak to the class about his or her personal experience with the disease.

"I tell them what it was like for me when I was initially diagnosed," Williams says, "I tell them about the fear that runs through your body, knowing that this disease will probably kill you. I tell them what it was like at my sickest point when I didn't want to live anymore...I tell them what it was like growing up as a gay man in a project in a black community...I share with them that they don't have to get this disease. I got it because I didn't know. I didn't get it because I am gay. I didn't get it because I am black. I got it because I didn't have the information."

While most letters from his students show that the message gets across, the saddest letter of all is the one that reads, "Dear Reggie, My parents do not let me go to programs on sex, so I couldn't meet you."

"The education is where I find my joy," Williams says, "I don't know how long I'm going to be around to continue this, but right now this is what is important to me. Every day that I get up and get to work on the program, that's what is important to me. That's what I live for."

That's what I live lot.



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## **Travel News Update**

THE FIRST AMERICAN Express automated teller machines in the Soviet Union are now on-line at Amexco's travel services office and Mezhdunarodnaya Hotel in Moscow. The units dispense U.S. dollars and Russian rubles.

MIDWAY AIRLINES PLANS to install seatback "airphones" in all 41 of its planes. The phones are already in 30 of the planes, Midway officials said.

THE 180-ROOM Ramada West Hollywood is seeduled to open in March. Room rates will start at \$79.

BRANIFF INC. ANNOUNCED a bold move to climb into the airline big leagues, saying it will acquire 50 Airbus Industrie A320 planes and has options to get another 50 in a deal valued at up to \$3.5 billion.

The deal represents one of the largest single orders for jets produced by Airbus, a European aircraft consortium that has emerged as a major competitor against the U.S. giants of the industry, Boeing Co. and McDonnell Douglas Corp. It also could nearly triple the fleet size of Braniff, a regional carrier.

AIR JAMAICA IS selling six-night winter packages to Jamaica starting at \$554, including round-trip air from Los Angeles, accommodations, transfers and U.S. departure tax.



This week's column is dedicated to all those who relish in dissentient reporting. And, as an added bonus, I give you The January Man. Take it -I certainly don't want it. For those who like to dwell in the positive, skip the beginning 90% of this review and go directly to the last part of the TidBits section (passing GO is optional, but do not collect \$200). Meanwhile, if all you pessimists are ready, follow me!

THE JANUARY MAN

In this motion picture Patrick (Moonstruck, Five Corners) Shanley's screenplay delineates Kevin Kostner as a Renaissance Man — a man for all seasons. The movie itself is written as a film for all seasons, Pat (Cal, A Month In the Country, Stars and Bars) O'Connor compounds the confusion by directing it as a film for all seasons, and, for all (those) reasons, it misses every mark. How O'Connor could allow Kostner to play his role kind of tongue-in-cheek, Susan Sarandon to play hers straight from the hip and Rod Steiger to do a complete farce (at times, all together in the same scene!) is beyond this reviewer's comprehension. No wonder this film can't make it. It's very premise and it's execution dictate it's failure.

Producers Norman Jewison and Ezra Swerdlow have assembled not only a wonderfully talented cast, including Kline, Sarandon and Steiger, as well as Mary Elizabeth Mastrantonio, Haravey Keitel, Danny Aiello and Alan Rickman, but also have brought together a top-notch crew with Production Designer Philip (Moonstruck, All That Jazz, The Wiz) Rosenberg, Costume Designer Ann (Midnight Cowboy, Places in the Heart, Day of the Locust) Roth, Editor Lou (Moonstruck, All the President's Men, The Wild Bunch) Lombardo and famed Musical Director Marvin (The Sting, The Way We Were, A Chorus Line) Hamlisch.

That incredible assemblage makes the end product all the more shameful. What a waste of talent! But, like the photos in a calendar, some months are just more appealing than others. Thankfully for Valley cinema audiences (and calendar aficionados), The February Man is just a few days away.

### **TidBits**

Two restaurants that I was gleefully set to pan, The Keynote Club (a relatively new jazz club) and China Smorgasbord, saved me the effort by halting their food service and going out of business, respectively, before I could get them in print. The former was ridiculously pretentious, especially for the poor quality of food preparation, and the latter, which closed after only a few months of operation, I had noted as "simply the worst ever!!", which, on reflection, might even have been an understatement.

Josie's Mexican Food is housed in a little shack, which has seen better days, plopped right in the middle of a sleepy residential neighborhood on North 55th Avenue (between Maryland and Glendale) in the city of Glendale. Although the food is sold mostly to go, they do have two relatively inviting picnic tables shaded by small mulberry trees in the middle of a lawn area. This apparently authentic setting lured me in, though I accidentally happened upon on the way to another eatery (which I nally got to sample several weeks later).

Judging by the name (it was called the Ranch Grande Tamale Shop at that time, and has recently changed monikers but still has the same owners, menu and cooks) tamales were their obvious specialty and I ordered one of pork and a green corn version (79¢ each) — plus a medium order of a chorizo and eggs burrito (\$1.69) just for good measure. I ate them in the reverse order, starting with one of the greasiest burros I have yet to sample anywhere. Unfortunately, greasiness was its predominant feature, for aside from a surplus of chili powder and salt, it was virtually tasteless. The tortilla it was wrapped in, however, was lovely - soft and fresh.

Well, I thought, tamales are really their specialty so I can forgive them for one oleaginous disaster. Onward! Upon unhusking the pork-filled bundle, I noticed many kernels of white corn studding the masa. A good sign, I felt. At leat it is homemade. Anticipating the sweet, lightly roasted flavor of corn contrasting against the savory pork filling, I couldn't have been more disap-



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pointed. Sawdust has to be tastier (although, I must admit, it's probably less nourishing). Perhaps, I still optimistically hoped, the green corn tamale will be their salvation (though, at this point, I was not salivating in expectancy). No such luck. Did they use government surplus corn that had spent the better part of a decade in storage? If not, why not? It would have given the same effect for a mere fraction of the money. And where were the green chile strips or the cheese that customarily repose at the center? I never found so much as a hint of either.

As I was eating my meal outside, a number of Hispanic people pulled up in heir cars and returned with little bundles. A handful of the neighborhood children walked in and did the same as well. I didn't feel that bad for the grownups - they should have known their own heritage sufficiently enough to be able to discern this garbage from some of the fine food that is served at a place like La Perla, which is only about a half-dozen blocks away. I do worry for the little ones, however, because if they use places like this as their standard for Mexican fare, we could likely loose a whole ethnic culinary tradition in one short


Fat, fennelly homemade Italian sausage is always a joy to come upon when your thoughts are of food from that area of the sunny Mediterranean. At Nicoli's Deli, on Lincoln at 32nd Street, their mildly hot representation was far too generous a portion for the niggardly sized but delicious Italian roll, from their own bakery, which housed this sandwich (\$4.50). A pretty decent herby tomato sauce oozed out all over the place in addition to lubricating the sausage missiles so that they were able to leap record distances. As messy as it was,

The Market Cafe at the Westcourt in is a coffee shop of dubious quality arting. One wall is an enortrickling waterfall in the propagation with Actually, the crust was by far the best

This disaster begins with a Cream of Scallop Soup — boy, that's a laugh — lumpy wallpaper paste potage would have been a better appellation for this bowlful that contained more potatoes than any other ingredient (except, perhaps, the globs of unincorporated flour thickener) - and served only lukewarm to boot. Their version of a shrimp salad sandwich is made with tiny, tasteless bay shrimp and lots of celery on the greasiest croissant anyone has ever had the gall to serve me in a restaurant. The squiggly fries are not at all crisp, which defeats their entire concept. A commercial dill pickle is the best part of this meal! The \$5.25, which would have been a fair price had the food been well prepared, is obviously exorbitant. Continued on page 26


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

Tu Do II Vietnamese restaurant on Camelback Road at 17th Avenue has a submarine-style sandwich that has got to be one of the best values I have come upon this year. Imagine a fresh and chewy, crusty French roll big enough to fill a basket, cradling slices of Vietnamese ham (this one could give prosciutto a run for the money), a rich homemade pate, a soft white sausage (somewhat similar to a pale Braunschweiger, but of a little coarser texture), and (to gild the lily) two other kinds of meat. (We're not finished yet — I just had to take a breath!) Then this variety of exceptional meats is topped with shredded carrots, shredded turnips, thinly shaved onion rings (don't give up yet, we're almost done), ovals of jalapenos, batons of cucumber, and (last, but not least) sprigs of pungent cilantro. Believe it or not, the piddling price they ask for this extgravaganza is a mere \$1.49.

No, this is not a misprint! The owners modestly make no to-do about something here, because this sandwich is not even on the printed menu (it is, however, on the takeout menu, listed as Banh Mi Thit Nguoi, and there is also a fatter version available at \$1.99 — for those with expense accounts, no doubt).

Tu do means freedom in Vietnamese and, if nothing else, a steady diet of these subs could keep you forever free from financial pressures.

If you recently went to Mmmm...-Mmmm...Barbeque With A Touch of Class and found someone else occupying their space, don't despair. They are now ensconced in a slightly larger, slightly more inconvenient location at 3433 West Thomas Road - and dishing out pecan smoked Barbeque that is even better than ever, if that's possible.

set in Catholic school, sexuality is one of the things repressed. Could Brother Leon be a latent homosexual? "Oh, he's got the hankerings," Glover laughs. "After a screening last night a man came up to me and said, 'You gave a marvelous performance, but did I detect a slight note of effeminacy about Brother Leon?" I just said 'Did you?" and got my cheese and moved on.

"How can you do a story about a boys' Catholic school without thinking about that?" he asks rhetorically. Director Gordon agrees: "Gay issues are intrinsic to the film. You can't not deal with sexuality in this situation." Although only one sequence refers specifically to gay sexuality, he says he discussed it extensively with the actors because they all know it would be on their characters minds. "I didn't go to Catholic school, but when I talk to people who have gone through that, at 15 or 16 nobody knows yet what they are. Some of them say, "I'm around guys all the time and I think I'm attracted to them, but I can't be gay because that would be a sin.'. It's hard enough to figure out what the hell you are when you're an adolescent without being in that at mosphere. That's such a strangely repressed world."

The protagonist of *The Chocolate War* is Jerry Renault, played by Ilan Mitchell-Smith of *Weird Science*. A confused freshman, he's tapped by a powerful secret society, the Vigils, and as part of the initiation process has to decline for ten days to participate in Brother Leon's pet project, the school's annual candy sale. After pretending to be a rebel for the required period, Jerry becomes a genuine rebel and refuses even the Vigils' order to sell chocolates.

As the pressure on him intensifies, Jerry is subjected to a fag-bashing. Emile Janza (Brent Fraser), a tough kid being blackmailed by sadistic Vigil leader Archie (Wally Ward), taunts Jerry in the street: "You're a fag, you're a fairy, hidin' away n the closet...Trinity has a way of weedin' out the homos." "I'm not a fairy," Jerry replies; but at Emile's signal a number of children run up and attack him in a scene that looks like Sebastian Venable's death in Suddenly Last Summer (which Gordon has never seen). "I've seen [The Chocolate War] three times," Glover says, "and that scene knocks my guts out every time."

Afterward, reporting to Archie on the phone, Emile asks, "He isn't queer, is he?" and Archie snaps, "Of course not. Don't be stupid." For a moment I thought I sensed a hint of longing in Emile's voice, as though he might be interested in Jerry if he were 'queer'. "I didn't discuss it with the actors," director Gordon says, "but it's interesting that you picked up on that. I think Emile has a confused sexuality. Somewhere in all his taunting I think he's a little bit tortured — 'How do I know I'm not gay?'!!

The dialogue between Emile and Archie might have been intended — if it were

in a more commercial film — to assure the audience that Jerry's straight so they won't think he got what he deserved. "No — God, that's interesting," Gordon responds, "I don't know what Jerry is, and I don't think he does at this point... Having grown up in the New York theatre world where half the people I know are gay, I'd never want to do anything that could be taken as homophobic."

The character who probably is gay, Gordon goes on, is Archie. That works to his advantage because "anybody who has defined his sexuality in Catholic school where sex is so repressed is ahead of the game." As for using homophobia as a tactic in "the chocolate war," "That's part of his Machiavelli-ness," Gordon explains. "The most efficient way to attack a 15-year-old is to call him a 'fag." Emphasizing any kind of different-ness creates ostracism in this setting where "anybody who's different gets weeded out."

Trinity Shool is, of course, a microcosm of American society. As Gordon declares adamantly, "Anyplace sexuality is used to judge anybody is a repressive place."

In the opening scene Brother Leon struts around the classroom poking boys with the pointer he uses as a substitute penis Glover is amused by this image, but says it hadn't occurred to him. "I was very sick the day we shot that and didn't have a lot in mind, but I guess a lot of stuff came out when I wasn't thinking."

Gordon, who says "You give [Glover] a piece of material and he'll do something

Gordon, who says "You give [Glover] a piece of material and he'll do something wonderful," goes into more detail about that day: "John was deathly sick, with a 103-degree fever. He was told by his doctor he couldn't work. But it was the last day of shooting — there was nothing we could shoot instead — and he said 'I'll do it.' And he did such a great job, even though he was barely able to stand un."

barely able to stand up.

Of the Emmy-nominated role in An Early Frost that proved to be his career breakthrough, Glover speaks as enthusiastically as if it were yesterday. 'Talk about passion on a project! Everybody — Gena [Rowlands], Aidan [Quinn], Ben Gazzara — all worked with such commitment because we knew what it meant, that it was going to open so many people's minds in the country — and all over the world. It was shown in England and France. . . I was just in Yugoslavia and it was on there.

"The writers told me a story they heard about a young man who told his mother he was gay and she stopped speaking to him, stopped communicating with him. The night the show was on, at one minute past 11, the phone rang and it was his mother calling him up. There are so many stories like that, and we knew that kind of thing would happen."

As for the Hollywood myth that playing gay sounds a death knell for an actor's career, "That didn't happen to me," Glover says. "I've actually played many kinds of parts since *An Early Frost*. I haven't been typed as gay."





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
