Congressman Barney Frank addresses Valley gay community

PHOENIX — Democratic U.S. Congressman Barney Frank, Massachusetts, who openly declared his homosexuality in the press in 1987 during his second term in office, visited Phoenix the weekend of February 10th. Ostensibly to address a Valley Jewish organization on Sunday, the 12th, he also took the opportunity to address a gathering of men and women of the gay community and their friends at a cocktail party in his honor, speak briefly to patrons at Charlie's bar on Saturday night and attend a brunch at Preston's held in his honor the following day. A couple of days in the sun and time by the pool were mentioned as also-rans.

The cocktail gathering, drawing an estimated 350 to the home of Ed Buck, organizer of the effort to recall former Governor Evan Mecham, was a fundraising activity of the Committee for Progress, a political action committee which stated that the funds would be used for efforts in

the forthcoming 1990 Arizona Legislative races.

Disarming on the podium, wary and politically savy off, Frank related reactions he had experienced to his coming out, first to his family, then to his constituents. His description of family response seemed more interesting than that of the public response. In effect the family was supportive and the public not really all that interested either way; 20% negative in attitude, 2 - 3% negative in votes.

His coming out broke down barriers for him in the ability to directly address to his colleagues issues of AIDS legislation, discrimination against homosexuals in immigration laws and homophobia within the country.

For the most part support of him did not wane after his announcement, either within his district or within Congress. Some

Kennedy holds hearings on Federal AIDS response

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The U.S. Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee held the first in a series of hearings on the federal governments's response to AIDS, including government agency plans for implementing drug development, health care and education provisions passed as part of last year's comprehensive AIDS legislation.

The Committee hearings, chaired by Sen. Edward Kennedy (D-MA), featured testimony from key government officials of agencies responsible for enacting federal AIDS law. Last October, Congress passed the Health Programs Extension Act of 1988, which included the nation's first battle plan for fighting AIDS. The bill called for accelerated research, expanded education and prevention, and more humane and cost-effective care for people with AIDS.

Testifying at the kickoff hearing were Frank Young, FDA Commissioner; Gary Noble, Centers for Disease Control AIDS coordinator; Sam Metheny, associate administrator for AIDS at the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA); and Samuel Thier, Institute of Medicine president.

"The hearings are a sign of the high level of priority given to AIDS by Senator Kennedy and his committee," said Carlton

Lee, congressional liaison for the Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF). "The committee clearly does not intend to rest on its laurels after passing last year's landmark AIDS bill. It will closely monitor implementation of the bill by the agencies."

HRCF is assisting the committee in evaluating agency responses to Congressional directives. The hearings will continue throughout this session of Congress.

FDA chief Frank Young, testifying for more than 90 minutes, addressed several recent developments in AIDS treatment. Y:oung discussed the status of promising AIDS drugs, including the recently announced treatment-IND (investigational new drug) status for aerosol pentamidine, shown to help prevent pneumocystis carinii pneumonia (PCP).

Under forceful questioning by Kennedy, Young said he was urging the National Institutes of Health (NIH) to revise more than 30 current AIDS drug-trial protocols to allow participants to use the pentamidine treatment.

Young also reported that 213 AIDS drugs are now in the FDA pipeline. This includes 43 anti-virals, 70 immuno-modulators, 41 treatments for opportunistic

Aerosol pentamidine pricing angers activists

CHICAGO — Members of ACT UP/Chicago say they are outraged that Chicago-based LymphMed, Inc. will charge the same "exorbitatant" price — \$99.45 per 300 mg dose — for its newly approved earosol pentamidine (AP) as for its older injectable pentamidine, and there is some indication that the pricing may violate Food and Drug Administration (FDA) rules.

"LymphoMed is drooling at the thought at amassing millions more from the aerosol monopoly," said ACT UP/Chicago's Paul Adams. "If the AIDS community thought LymphoMed was engaged in profiteering on I.V. pentamidine, they ain't seen nothin' yet."



infections, 4 vaccines and 6 antineoplastic (cancer) agents, all approved for clinical trials.

Young said this was a substantial increase from the number of investigatinal new drugs (INDs) approved when he appeared before the committee last year. However, Young warned that significantly greater resources would be needed to process this dramatic surge in applications for new drugs.

Young's call for additional resources echoed the testimony of all the witnesses that more space, personnel and modern information-processing systems are needed to meet the requirements of the federal AIDS bill.

Senator Orrin Hatch (R-Utah), the ranking minority member and co-sponsor of the Health Programs Act, reiterated the need for expanded resources and higher salaries at the FDA. He suggested that private industry pay some of the cost of computerizing the drug review process. Hatch also provided a chart that revealed the FDA currently has more full-time employees processing Freedom of Information requests than reviewing new AIDS drug applications.

In response to questions, the CDC's Dr. Noble said his agency believes in "appropriate, targeted" AIDS education for groups at high risk of infection, including 'age-appropriate' information for school-based populatins. Noble did not directly address the issue of "promoting or encouraging" sexual activity.

Besides Senators Kennedy and Hatch, other committee members participating in the hearing were Claiborne Pell (D-RI); Christopher Dodd (C-CN); Barbara Mikulski (D-MD); Brock Adams (D-WA); James Jeffords (R-VT); and David Durenberger (R-MN).

ACT UP has staged numerous zaps and civil disobedience actions against the company in the past year.

LymphoMed received "Treatment IND (Investigational New Drug)" approval from the FDA on February 6, to distribute AP, which is believed to prevent pneumocystis carinii pneumonia (PCP) in persons with AIDS and others with damaged immune systems.

The FDA recommended AP for "AIDS virus-infected invididuals who have had at least one episode of the pneumonia or who have a T4 helper cell count of 200 per cubic millimeter or less." The agency also said AP "should be administered...through a Respirgard II nebulizer at the...dosage of 300 mg every four weeks."

Aerosol pentamidine's "Treatment IND" status — a *preliminary* okay to begin distribution of the drug to seriously ill patients — was granted based on data from a comparative dose trial conducted by the San

Francisco Community Consortium (SFCC), a group of doctors experienced in treating PWA's. The study found that PWAs taking more frequent but lower doses of AP were more likely to develop PCP.

FDA Commissioner Frank Young has estinated that 50,000 Americans will qualify for access to AP under the Treatment IND. Dr. Anthony Fauci of the National Institutes of Allergies and Infections Diseases said the data from San Francisco was released "before scientific publication to speed patient access to this state of the art therapy."

In the meantime, many observers say LymphoMed's decision to sell AP for \$99.45 a dose is most likely a violation of FDA Treatment IND regulations, which limit charges on such drugs to what is "necessary to recover costs of manufacture, research, development, and handling."

But FDA spokesperson Don McLearn claims the agency has no history of looking into such matters even though regulations exist. "I guess if someone can show that the charges they're making are more than those costs, then we would examine it," he

said, "although, historically, our main responsibility is to develop drugs. The FDA has never been involved in any discussion of whether a drug is priced too high.

"In this case, it would be very difficult to break down," McLearn continued. "They can't promote or advertise the drug or do what constitutes commercialization...which is [partially] defined as charging more than necessary to recover those costs...but how do we separate the components?"

McLearn added that he was irritated that AIDS activists may use Treatment IND regulations to "get at" issues of drug company profiteering. "To go at it through the back door like this really offends me; it really gets my coat," McLearn said. "The IND program was specifically aimed at helping the AIDS community."

A LymphoMed official, speaking off the record, said the company believes "it would be unfair to charge two different prices [for the aerosol and LV. versions of the drug]. We try to remian ethical," he

LymphoMed has a monopoly on I.V. pentamidine until 1991 under the FDA's Orphan Drug ACt, which encourages companies to develop unpopular drugs with little hope of profit. LymphoMed is aiming for an identical monopoly on aerosol pentamidine, since the availability of the aerosol prophylactic will wipe out the market for the I.V. drug, which is a PCP treatment.

Orphan Drugs seven-year monopolies are routinely available to companies which agree to develop and market substances that will be used by fewer than 200,000 persons in the United States.

Those with questions about the use of pentamidine may call LymphoMed at 1-800-PCP-7003. The Respirgard II nebulizer is manufactured by Marquest, Inc. in Englewood, Colorado.

ACLU files complaint against Alabama judges

NEW YORK — The Civil Liberties Union of Alabama and 13 Alabama organizations filed a complaint on January against three Alabama judges who refus-to allow HIV-infected persons in their

outrageous example of AIDS-hysteria threatening basic constitutional rights," said Olivia Turner, Executive Director of the Civil Liberties Union of Alabama. "Judges have a responsibility to rise above senseless prejudice and we intend to hold them responsible for failing to do so," Turner

The complaint addresses incidences in which the three Birmingham judges Jack Montgomery, O.L. "Pete" Johnson and Mike McCormick — had asked HIV infected defendants to enter pleas and to hear sentences by telephone rather than appear in the courtroom. It also refers to discriminatory statements made by one of the judges about gay people.

The behavior of these judges in the face of public information regarding how the AIDS virus is transmitted has compromised the integrity, independence and public confidence of and in the judiciary and its

proper conduct," the complaint states.

In addition to the Civil Liberties Union of Alabama, the complaint is signed by the AIDS Task Force of Alabama, a number of other Alabama AIDS groups, severl Alabama chapters of the National Organization of Women, and the Unitarian Church.

The charges, which accuse the judges of violating four canons of judicial ethics, have been filed with the Judicial Inquiry ◆ Commission of the State of Alabama. Should the Commission find that the judges acted unethically or that misconduct occurred, the charges will be forwarded to Alabama's Court of Judiciary for a public hearing. The Court has the authority to publicly consure the judges, to suspend them with or without pay, or to remove them from

"We hope that the Commission will act swiftly to vindicate the constitutional rights of the HIV-infected persons involved," said Nan D. Hunter, Director of the ACLU's AIDS Project, "A public re outrageous discrimination will message nationwide that AIDS discrimintion will not be tolerated in the judicial system," Hunter stated.


ACT UP takes over panel, gets answers on AIDS blindness drug

BETHESDA, MD — AIDS activists virtually commandeered a government panel on AIDS and cancer drug approvals last week, extracting an unprecedented admission of guilt from a Food and Drug Administration (FDA) representative that the agency has been partially to blame for the blockage of approval of a promising AIDS blindness drug. Storming the offices of the National Instututes of Health (NIH) hours later, the activists also met with the nation's top AIDS scientist on the blindness drug and enlisted his support in the fight for the

drug's approval.

The drug, DHPG, also known as gancclovir, is widely believed in the medical community to be an effective treatment for CMV retinitis, a form of blindness commonly found in AIDS paitents. The drug has been proven effective in a series of clinical trials. Approval of the drug, however, has been a long, lingering process which is now mired in an 18-month study which, AIDS activists say, is unethical, because half of the patients participating in the study are denied the drug until they show signs of

blindness.

In October, 1987, an FDA outside advisory panel voted 11-2 against the drug's approval. The FDA then concurred with the panel, despite the fact that the two doctors voting for aproval of the AIDS blindness drug were the two opthalmologists on the advisory committee. Since that controversial vote, activists have charged that the FDA is ignoring strong clinical evidence and testimony from the medical community calling for the drug's quick approval.

The National Committee to Review Current Procedures for Approval of New Drugs for Cancer and AIDS, an FDA oversight panel formed last December that will report to President George Bush, comprised of the National Cancer Institute (NCI) and a host of other agencies and officials, met in Bethesda, Wednesday, February 1.

The panel has only met once before. At that meeting, NCI leaders Drs. Stephen Broder, the newly appointed director of the agency, and Bruce Chadner, leveled harsh

criticism at the FDA for holding up drugs to too high a standard before releasing them for wide use. They charged that the FDA usually waits for proof that a drug will increase patients' survival rate, and are unwilling to release drugs that are clearly proven to help AIDS and cancer patients. An example of this would be that the agency would insist on proof that more AIDS patients on a drug actually live longer before releasing it, rather than aproving the same drug when it is clearly shown to, say, strengthen the immune system by boosting T-4 cell counts.

Members of the New York AIDS Coalition To Unleash Power (ACT UP/N.Y.), angered at the FDA's treatment of DHPG and eager to hear the agency's rebuttal to the NCI charges, loaded 49 members on buses and headed for the meeting.

Arriving at the meeting before the others, ACT UP member Bill Bahlman and three others circulated flyers outlining the case for DHPG approval to those attending

the meeting. As the syposium began, the four ACT UP members sat quietly through the testimony, taking notes. They were assured they would be allowed to testify before the committee, although they never did. Not formally, anyway.

Enter 49 AIDS activists off the bus from New York, silently carrying slogans like "See The Light, DHPG Works" and pictures of eyes over the words "FDA To People With AIDS: You Don't Need These."

"Our plan was to sit respectively as the (FDA representatives) presented their case," said Bahlman in an interview. "We were wearing our 'Silence = Death' shirts and we had this East Village look. I guess you could say we were a presence in this small conference room that was built for only 100 people."

Scheduled to defend the FDA from the NCI charges were FDA spokespersons Robert Temple, Ellen Cooper and Paul Parkman.

The activists had agreed earlier to wait until Cooper's testimony to make their statement. Sitting through the testimony of the others, the activists largely remained silent, only clapping or hissing occasionally at statements made.

"Our gripe was with the FDA, not the panel," Bahlman explained. "We didn't know enough about the panel to think about disrupting their meeting."

Then Cooper spoke. Instantly, the activists raised their placards, creating a dramatic silent protest throughout her testimony.

After Cooper sat down, the activists, alarmed that she had not even touched upon the stymied approval of the AIDS blindness drug in her testimony, began shouting out at random: "What about DHPG?" "PWAs are going blind and the FDA isn't moving on this!" "You know it works, why don't you approve it?"



She returned to the podium. Hands shaking and voice quivering, she alluded to the flyer that had been circulated earlier and addrssed the question of DHPG's approval.

She told the history of the drug's approval process, something the activists, at this point, were well versed in. She stated how Syntex, the drug's manufacturer did not seek to conduct control trials on the drug.

"That's because the drug company thought it was not compassionate to deny the drug to patients on a control trial!" shouted Bahlman.

"Excuse me?" she said.

He repeated his statement.

For the next twelve minutes, the activists took over for the panel and grilled Cooper on the DHPG approval process. When the activists heard something that did not jibe with what they knew, they asked for clarification.

Finally, Cooper read a statement which she had hastily put together sitting in the meeting that morning.

"There is no question that the development of ganciclovir presents enormous problems for the FDA, the company (Syntex), physicians and patients with the disease," she said. "And its inexperience we certainly wouldn't want repeated. We hope that the early interactions with the sponsors of these new drugs intended for use in sight- and lifethreatening diseases will help prevent such problems in the future. And I think, from my point of view, that the FDA shares the blame for the inadequate development of the drug."

Then, there was applause.

"So do us a favor," someone shouted, "release it!"

Cooper's comments are the first public statements made by an FDA official admitting even partial guilt for inaction on an AIDS-related drug.

During Parkman's speech, about half of the activists boarded the Metro train and

took it one stop over to the Medical Center station. That's where their next target was: Dr. Anthony Fauci, director of the National Institute on Allergies and Infectious Diseases (NIAID), the government's top AIDS scientist.

Arriving at the NIH building, the 25 ragged activists demanded entrance and a meeting with Fauci. Clearly not appearing to be NIH employees, they were detained by security guards.

But that's when their luck changed. Fauci then phoned downstairs and instructed the guards to allow three ACT UP members to come up to his office for an impromptu meeting.

They did. Soon, ACT UP's Russell Pritchard, Bill Monihan and David Falcone were discussing the approval process for DHPG with NIAID's Fauci and Daniel Hoth

The AIDS scientists read the group's flyer and the conversation began.

"We need a 'white knight' here on the scene who will make our case for us and help us get this drug approved," Monihan reportedly told Fauci.

According to the activists, Fauci was sypathetic to their plea. Fauci reportedly said that he has seen DHPG's results for himself and added that since the FDA does not work in the field with patients, and instead only examines test results on paper, they often do not see dramatic results first-hand.

Taking up the activists' cause, he agreed to meet with FDA commissioner Frank Young to see what could be done to expedite the drug's approval. If Young is to plead that he is hampered by regulations due to the October, 1987 vote against approval, Fauci allegedly has agreed to meet with his friends on Capitol Hill to see what could be done to eliminate the legislative roadblocks.

Late last week, Monihan and Pritchard received calls from Fauci informing them that he had spoken with Young about the drug and would be meeting him again later this month

Federal agency says AIDS not handicap; denies housing subsidy for people with AIDS

SAN FRANCISCO — On February 9, National Gay Rights Advocates filed a formal administrative complaint against the U.S. Departmenta of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for denying a federal housing subsidy to people with AIDS and ARC. The complaint was filed on behalf of Housing for Independent People (HIP), a non-profit housing agency in San Jose, which applied for a low-interest loan to develop housing for people with AIDS and ARC under a HUD program which subsidizes housing for the handicapped. HUD denied the loan last October, arguing that people with AIDS do not qualify as handicaffed under their program because their illness is not "expected to be of long-continued and indefinite duration."

In their complaint, NGRA and HIP charge HUD with violating the Federal Rehabilitation Act by basing their policy on the erroneous stereotype that all people with AIDS and ARC face imminent death. NGRA further threatened to file suit in federal court if the issue is not promptly resolved in their favor.

"HUD's apparent position — that people with AIDS and ARC don't live long enough to benefit from their program — demonstrates their ignorance about both medicine and the law," said Benjamin Schatz, Director of NGRA's AIDS Civil Rights Project. "HUD is no more permitted to formulate policy on the basis of er-

roneous stereotypes than is any employer, school, or hospital governed by the Federal Rehabilitation Act."

Al DiLudovico, Executive Director of HIP, noted that, "For people with AIDS, access to housing may make the difference between life and death. It is outrageous for a federal agency such as HUD to block efforts to help them out."

NGRA Executive Director Jean O'Leary commented that "this dispute provides the Bush administration with a perfect opportunity to demonstrate that it truly wants a kinder, gentler nation." There is nothing more unkind than telling homeless people with AIDS who are struggling to survive that they must also fight discrimination by their own government."

HIP is a non-profit housing agency

HIP is a non-profit housing agency which developes low-cost housing for special populations. Their proposed housing program for people with AIDS, "Casa de los Amigos", was coordinated with ARIS Project, the major AIDS service organization in California's Santa Clara County.

NGRA's cooperating attorney on the lawsuit is Charles Freiber of the prestigious San Francisco law firm Heller, Ehrman, White & McAuliffe. Also working on the legal effort is Dave Kroot of Goldfarb & Lipman, a San Francisco firm specializing in housing law. The AIDS Action Council in Washington, D.C. has also requested a reversal of HUD's position.

Campaign launched to challenge anti-gay/lesbian bias in entertainment industry

WASHINGTON, D.C. — In response to the pervasive anti-gay/lesbian bias in the entertainment industry, three national gay rights and feminist organizations have launched a long-term campaign to challenge bigotry within the industry. The "Campaign For Fairness In Entertainment" was laun-

ched by the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF), the Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD) and the New York Chapter of the National Organization For Women (NY-NOW).

The Campaign has three goals: 1. to make it unacceptable both economically and

morally for the entertainment industry to subsidize and promote homophobia, sexism and racism; 2. to support equal opportunity for openly gay and lesbian workers and artists in the entertainment industry; and 3. to challenge the entertainment industry to take creative action to counter bigotry and intolerance by donating money to fund community based programs that fight racism, sexism and homophobia.

The Campaign For Fairness In Entertainment will utilize a range of tactics from lobbying, negotiation, letter writing, and corporate education, to demonstrations, boycotts, direct action andother media

The Campaign grew out of two recent entertainment industry actions: the release by Warner Bros. Records of an anti-gay comedy albumn by Sam Kinison; and the broadcast by Lorimar/NBC of an extremely AIDS-phobic script on the show Midnight Caller. Both of these events precipitated extensive national protests by AIDS activist groups like ACT UP (AIDS Coalition To Unleash Power). In each instance eoncessions were made by Warner Bros. and Lorimar Pictures as a result of the protests.

'These two actions by entertainment industry leaders alarmed us deeply and made us committed to convincing the industry that such hate mongering is not only morally wrong but also, in the long run, financially unprofitable," explained GLAAD Director Craig Davidson.

The immediate target of the campaign is a comedy routine by Sam Kinison recorded and distributed by Warner Brothers Records, and recently broadcast by Home Box Office. The record, entitled "Have You Seen Me Lately?" reinforces prejudices against gay men, lesbians and people with AIDS. The record is also extremely sexist.

Comedian Kinison's record drew complaints from AIDS activist organizations immediately upon its release in November of 1988. The Los Angeles chapter of the AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power (ACT UP) retained the services of prominent feminist attorney Gloria Allred to negotiate with Warner Brothers Records. Warner Brothers quickly greed to insert safer sex educational material in the Kinison records.

'We are drawing attention to this record again because Kinison will soon be appearing in communities around the country on a concert tour. The Warner Label continues to promote this hate mongerer shamelessly," said Davidson. "No apology by Kinison was ever issued, and he continues in his routines and public interviews

Added NGLTF Media Director Urvashi Vaid, "Hollywood and the entertainment industry remain extremely homophobic. Very few artists and workers in the industry are openly gay or lesbian. The industry mouths concern for AIDS education, while doing little to fight the underlying anti-gay prejudice that has inhibited the fight against AIDS for eight years

Congressmen were openly supportive of his move, others quietly so, but most have continued to work with him just as before.

His principal message appeared to be that the country in its leadership is probably less homophobic than gay and lesbian individuals and communities fear. He pointed out the concerted effort on the part of Presidential candidates not to let gay and lesbian lifestyles become issues of their campaigns. Further he related that AIDS legislation has much more support in Washington than most might think.

Political activism on the part of gays and lesbians was his closing demand of his audience. He noted the great amount which has been accomplished in the gay communities of the country but that it has only started and that there is much more to be done. "If you find out someone's stealing \$100 a week from you and you get that down to \$20, that's not enough."

driver Gerald Simons, 52, on a Ft. Lauder-dale beach. According to a taped confession secured by Ft. Lauderdale police, Van Den Borre sought to kill as many gay men as he could in order to seek revenge against his former male lover. The two had shared an apartment in Washington D.C.'s predominantly gay Dupont Circle district.

According to embasy sources in Atlanta, the European nation is strongly against the death penalty and has not sentenced anyone to death since 1919. With the state of Florida waiving the death penalty, Van Den Borre could face a maximum two consecutive life terms, meaning he would have to serve two back-to-back 25 year terms before being eligible for parole.

Belgian officials threatened to invoke Van Den Borre's diplomatic immunity, as a worker in the nation's Washington, D.C. embassy, should the state insist on pursuing the death penalty against Van Den Borre.

Due to prison overcrowding and Florida's controversial "gain time" policy, several people have expressed concern that by waiving the death penalty, Van Den Borre would serve a lesser sentence in Florida than he would in his home country.

But according to Jaques deBaenst, consul general of the Belgian embassy in Atlanta, if he were to go back to Belgium, his sentence, in all likelihood would be shorter.

The embassy's deBaenst states that in Belgium, even a serial killer who has raped and murdered dozens of people is only charged with one count of murder, most likely the most heinous of the sum total of crimes. And even then, deBaenst states, the defendant would only serve up to two-thirds of his or her jail time. Although prison overcrowding is a problem in Belgium, he states, it is not as severe as it is in the U.S.

According to Napoleonic code, Van Den Borre would serve 20-30 years in jail would he have been sent back to Belgium and found guilty.

"It's more likely he will receive a longer sentence in the U.S.," said de Baenst.

Harry Gulkin, Van Den Borre's defense attorney in Ft. Lauderdale, confirmed the Belgian government's waiver of immunity and the grand jury indictment.

A court date is not expected for six to eight weeks.

'89 Northwest Gay/Lesbian Sports Festival July 4 in Seattle


SEATTLE — Gay and lesbian athletes from around the country and the world will gather in Seattle this summer for a multisport extravaganza that will serve as a tuneup for Gay Games III in 1990. The 1989 Northwest Gay/Lesbian Sports Festival, offering opportunities in at least ten sports, is schedled for the four-day July 1 - 4 holiday weekend.

For the third year in a row, K & L Distributors of Bellevue, Washington, is the primary sponsor of the Sports Festival with a grant of \$7,500. K & L disbributes Perrier, Soho Soda and Anheuser-Busch products in Western Washington.

The Northwest Gay/Lesbian Sports Festival is the second largest multi-sport event for lesbian and gay athletes. Only Gay Games attracts more athletes. In 1987, the Sports Festival's first year, 900 athletes participated. By 1988 the number had increased to 1,200.

Seventy percent of the participants are from out of Washington. The Run With Pride, organized by Seattle Frontrunner, was last year's largest event with 400 entrants. Swimming attracted 150.

This year competition is scheduled in sports such as swimming, diving, women's softball, tennis, bowling, croquet,



volleyball, running, water polo and golf. Other sports tentatively scheduled include darts, soccer track and field, rugby, martial arts, women's basketball and flag

Team Seattle, organizers of the Festival, plans several Festival-wide events during the course of the weekend.

The 1989 Northwest Gay/Lesbian Sports Festival occurs just 13 months before Gay Games II in Vancouver, B.C., Canada.

Seattle is just a short hop from Vancouver, and Festival organizers have worked closely with Games officials to help promote the Gay Games.



Mildred Dickemann — Lesbian Scholar Offers First College Course on Anthropology and Homosexuality by Arthur Lazere



are stacks of papers and books and scholarly journals on every table, ledge nd shelf of Mildred Dickemann's rambling old house in Berkeley. Some of these tools of the professional academician are for research, some are for preparation of

at Sonoma State University, is currently teaching what she believes to be the first college course ever offered on anthropology and homosexuality. In a fitting deliberate — act of assertion, she drafted the outline for the course on the backs of fliers announcing National Coming Out Day at UC Berkeley. Her students will be learning about berdaches among American Indians, homosexual behaviors in New Guinea and Africa and ancient Greece, female impersonators in Chicago.

The 1985 summer issue of the Journal of Homosexuality was devoted to the subject of anthropology and homosexual behavior. Dr. John Carrier wrote in the foreword to that volume, "Most of the importanta data on human sexuality has been gathered by social scientists who have been heavily influenced by a Western heterosexual model of sexual activity that deems homosexual behavior both inappropriate and dysfunctional...Many anthropologists have collected imperical data on homosexual behavior while doing fieldwork on other topics, but have never published it, partly because of the fear of being stigmatized and partly because anthropological journals have rarely accepted articles dealing with homosexuality."

Documented change to that dismal state of affairs began with a resolution introduced by Clark Taylor to the American Anthropological Association in 1970 — the year after Stonewall. In the resolution, the AAA recognized the legitimacy and immediate importance of research on homosexual behavior. The resolution was "barely passed" by the general membership, but pass

Fifteen years later, John De Cecco could write in the Preface to the Journal that "within the Association there is now a wellorganized group of anthropologists who meet to discuss research on the topic, sponsor papers and symposia, and publish a richly informative newsletter.'

Now, two decades after Stonewall, Dickemann's course breaks new ground made fertile by the work of a generation of liberated scholars. Reflecting on the changes that have occurred, she points out that there was a broad toaboo on the discussion of all sexuality in the nineteenth century.

"The taboo on homosexuality was an extreme, a greater version of the general tendency," Dickemann says, "For years the nost widely read translation of Plato's Symposium was Jowett's, which was published in the late nineteenth century. You can't even tell that it's about men and boys from this bowdlerized version!"

On the state of research on homosex-

uality by anthropologists today, Dickemann avy, 'It's wierd It's a very equivocal kind f status. On the one hand, it's almost a fad. Maybe that's because there are a lot of gay anthropologists who now feel, 'God! At last i can do gay research. So a i are rushing into print and I have to say that sometimes I don't think it is very good work. We're seeing work published that is of very uneven quality.

'On the other hand, although I haven't felt it myself, many people report that the subject is still stigmatized. I suspect that's true because one doesn't see many straight people dealing with the subject. One does hear regular reports about problems with Ph.D. committee chairs.

"We sometimes do get overly paranoid and we do sometimes attribute to victimization what might really be our own scholarly inadequacies. One has to be very carfeful about that. But, nonetheless, there is certainly homophobia in the universities. How can one doubt it? The inaction of university administrations about homophobia among students surely indicates that the administrators themselves are homophobic."

As a lesbian anthropologist, Dickemann follows in the tradition of the legendary Margaret Mead whose long term female lover was another well known anthropologist, Ruth Benedict. Dickemann's interest in the field grew out of a childhood fascination with American Indians with whom she identified as oppressed people. "I wanted to grow up to be a male Indian," she recalls, "That was my fantasy. I was very interested in plains Indians because of their war whoops and headdresses and their macho quality. I grew out of that particular fantasy, but I continued to see other societies as utopias, as escapes. I think a great many anthropologists become interested in other societies because of their unhappiness about how they fit into their own society, whether they are gay or not"

Although she wasn't conscious of being gay at the time, Dickemann, now 59, says photographs tell her that she had a gender disorder by the time she was three. "By the time I was six or seven," she says, "I was having dreams in which I was playing male roles and embracing women." Obtaining her doctorate at Berkeley,

Obtaining her doctorate at Berkeley, Dickemann has lived and worked in the area continuously ever since, with the exception of a short period on the faculty at the University of Kansas. "Most of my adult life, I was part of a very small circle of lesbians and gay men who were for all practical purposes closeted, here in Berkeley," she says, "All of our social life was in living rooms. I went to the bars for a brief period in the 1950's, but I stopped going when there was a series of raids. I got scared and that was the end of that."

She has been at Sonoma State since 1968 and she has found there 'a very benign atmosphere...I became more and more visible over the time I worked there. I was about the last woman on campus to dress in slacks when they became acceptable for professional women. After that, I became more and more masculine in my dress and I'm now extremely obvious, almost completely cross-dressing."

At a time when campus politics called for a very strong individual in the position, Dickemann was elected chair of the academic senate in 1972. "I think that was an incredible statement of confidence in somebody who was so obviously a butch diesel-dyke. But maybe that is, in fact, just what they needed!"

In her research, too, Dickemann has gravitated over time to the subject of gender. Her work in issues of population management and control led to an interet in marriage systems. She became an authority on infanticide. More recently, she has focused on developing a theory of third genders. Animal behaviorists, she points out, have observed a flexibility of behavior in various species in which gender actually changes — male to female as well as female to male.

The biologists have looked at flexibility, but, paradoxically, human scientists haven't,' she points out, "If you take the standard treatment of gender in a sociology or anthropology textbook, it's as though your gender is given to you at birth and you follow it throughout your life. We know that it isn't like that in our species. Look at the number of lesbians who become lesbians in their forties. It's staggering. Look at the number of men who equivocate for half their lives in a bisexual marriage and then finally change. Human beings are flexible..."

fler own life has been, in a way, a search for gender identity. "I was a terrible male chauvinist pig," Dickemann confesses, "After six years of intensive therapy I accepted the fact that I am a woman. Only then could I see myself as a lesbian. Now I'm 'coming in', becoming part of gay life outside of my own living room. The film festival, the March on Washington, the book stores, the organizations—I've only been doing this for the last three years."

She is deeply, visibly moved as she concludes, "There are no words to express how liberating that is. It is so wonderful so wonderful to find one's people."



Arizona Opera Presents Puccine Double Bill





Without Reservations

Understatedly billed as "Trans-Continental Cuisine," RoxSand and Spyro Scocos' remarkably imaginative restaurant really serves food that also spans both time and space — although not quite in the same way that Bill and Ted did in Chris Matheson & Ed Solomon's conception of their Excellent Adventure. But, dieters beware. Although We might call their cuis-

ing **The Living** end (**Pelle the Conqueror** surely would have been a **True Believer!**), as you will find in most great restaurants, some of their dishes are quite calorie laden. I certainly would be remiss in believing that the wonderful meals I have eaten there haven't increased the ratio of fat to **Lean on Me!**

ROXSAND

RoxSand Scocos is a chef Extraordenaire! RoxSand is a restaurant Extraordenaire! She is an adventure in fine dining that is influenced by cuisines and cultures from around the world. Her tables are impeccably dressed in white linen and white napery to match, with minature bonzai pots holding sculptures of metal or artistically formed branches. Her charming mezzanine balcony and walls adorned in paintings and graphics by the likes of Dawson, Davis and Linderman make her a perfect study in casual elegance. No longer the Scottsdale girl, RoxSand is now a cultured Phoenician lady of the highest station in her aerie situated in the chic new wing at Biltmore Fashion Park.

The servers (there were three of them aiding my waiter, Steve) were all very at tentive and personable without having an overbearance of presence. I was terribly impressed with Steve's knowledge of every dish on the menu that I asked about (and there were plenty of inquiries from this quarter) and his eagerness to talk about the most intimate details of each. The pacing of every meal was pure perfection, whether I was in a relative hurry (as I was on my last visit) or enjoying the leisurely two-anda-half hour lunch that I shared with an old friend the week prior. We were never without rolls or butter, water, coffee or anything else, and the staff seemed to anticipate all our needs before they even arose - signs of true professionals. There were even little details above and beyond the call of duty, like my napkin being refolded when I returned to the table from the dessert selection. There are the kinds of things (in addition to the food itself, of course!) that elevate a restaurant from the good into the great

Usually when talking about a luncheon or dinner, the bread is given little more tha

a few concise words. At *RoxSand* they specialize in baked goods (surprisingly, they can make both sweet desserts and savory breads with equal perfection — an extremely rare talent for a local bakery). Their accompanying wonderfully chewy rolls, both light sour dough and dark rye, escorted by slabs of sweet butter, were among the best I've ever had! I tried to find out from the girl who brought them around in a large basket what the secret ingredient was that made them so incredibly good, but she remained loyal to her employer and feigned ignorance.

My first taste of RoxSand's talents at her new establishment (after being hyped up by those remarkable rolls) was the Gravlox appetizer with mascarpone and deep-fried spinach. The home-cured, thinly sliced salmon, of a beautiful terra-cotta hue, rested on a bed of shaved lemon. As with almost all the food here, the taste was light and clean, although I would have preferred it just a tad sweeter, one of the main differences between Nova lox and gravalox. The mascarpone, however, a wonderfully buttery triple creme cheese, made up for that lack quite admirably, while the intensely green crunchy translucent spinach was a delightful contrast. Another levely presentation wa the Lamb Carpaccio, a palette of faultless-ly lean, transparently thin uncooked meat made glistening by minted olive oil and dotted with capers and a tangle of mild Bermuda onion rings as thin as angel hair pasta. A coarse textured Sonoma chevre cheese and housemade Melba toast were provided for do-it-yourself canape making.

I guess it's no secret to my readers that I go quackers over duck, so I couldn't possibly pass up the Confit of Duck salad. The process, an old French one, was used to preserve meat (usually fowl) by first cooking it in its own fat, then immersing

it in a container full of fat to prevent it from coming in contact with any air, thereby keeping it for some time without refrigeration. *RoxSand* most probably skipped the immersion part, preferring to use a fresh bird instead; nevertheless the skin on the hindquarter was beautifully browned to a slight crispness and th meat was mouthwateringly moist. A salad of ultra-fresh mixed greens with a seattering of bittersweet caramelized pecan halves was dressed in an exceptional light but flavorful peach vinaigrette that I could swear had nuances of mirrin (a Japanese rice wine) and walnut oil. A fan of half a fresh nectarine was a breezy accomplice. Another salad had an abundance of stout, sweet sauteed sizzling sea scallops tucked under a mound of nicely dressed mixed greens framed with leaves of pretty red radiccio.

I was delightfully surprised by the Sable (a buttery tasting, mild white fish) with Szechuan blackbean sauce, in that it was lightly battered and sauteed — which in no way hindered its exceptionally clean flavor. Actually it was a pleasing contrast to the piquancy of the sauce and the rather tame version of the Korean staple, kim chee (spicy-hot pickled vegetables) that tagged along. My partner's Cipolle Capellini (a thin herb-infused spaghetti) was rich with the hearty livers that had been bathed in a porat wine reduction sauce, aided by slowly braised, sweet golden onions.

B'astilla, of Moroccan origin, is a huge flaky pastry *barquette*-shaped "roll" stuffed with a mixture of chicken and pistachio nuts seasoned with cinnamon and allspice. Though it had a distinct influence of baklava, this version was juicy, crisp, sweet and salty all at once. Here it is paired with baba ghanoush (a salad of eggplant and sesame paste), hummus (a ground, seasoned chick pea puree), cream friache (a thick, sweet, sour cream) and a field salad.

Pizza au Canard, "a RoxSand tradition", now has a new twist and, correspondingly, a new name. The crust of the Rye Game Pizza, which formerly was reminiscent of a crusty brioche, is now an even more flavorful rye version. It is still topped with a great herb-laden tomato sauceand a blend of smooth and slightly tangy cheeses, chunks of roast duck, slices of Italian salami and artichoke hearts with a lightly coddled

egg hiding in the center. The secret to its enormous success lies in its perfect balance. The crust is crisp but moist, the tomato sauce has just the right amount of many herbs (often, at other places, the oregano masks everything else), and both the ratio of crust to fillings and that of sauce to cheese could not be improved upon. This is probably as close to a perfect pizza as is to be found anywhere in the Southwest. Other outstanding pies include their Niihau Kiawi Grilled Japanese Eggplant Pizza with delicate baby eggplant thinly sliced and sauteed in olive oil atop a foundation of sweet sauteed onions laced with a light marinara sauce just plentiful enough to impart a herby tomato flavor and bound with blend of melted cheeses and their Koukla Pizza with tender, flavorful bits fo homemade lamb sausage, braised onions and piquant feta cheese topped with several delightfully salty calamata olives.

Dessert time came, and something light as the order of the day after such a filling eal. We took a trip to the pastry counter and drooled at the animated descriptions by our knowledgeable wateress of the more than fifteen confections competing for our attention. Amazingly, we agreed in record time on a puffy looking creation called a Scham, composed of a nut-enhanced meringue base covered with a thin layer of extra-ric chocolate, fresh raspberries and whipped cream blended with a tad of respherry juice for a delightful pink color. It tasted every bit as luscious as it looked. I might mention here that all the desserts are delivered to your table on a handsome rectangular plate atop a swirl of light custard and bittersweet chocolate and share this artfully rranged plate with slices of kiwi and strawberries, in season.

Another time, when endowed with a heartier appetite, I chose a super-chocolate indulgence with the unpoetic name of "The B-52". Ceratainly no bomb, this combinationof Amaretto, Bailley's and *ganache* (semi-sweet sheet) chocolates was more intense than any other chocolage confection I have ever had. A topping of additional rich chocolate completely studded with chopped pistachio nuts made it ambrosial. The Passion Fruit Torte was as pretty as it was delicious (and it certainly was that!). A disk of ganache was topped with a thin layer of

soft cake crumbs which in turn was surmounted with a thick layer of rich but tart passion fruit custard. A ring of luscious ripe strawberries and passion fruit glaze crowned this glorious ensemble.

Maybe I should have warned you to diet before reading this section, but I will continue anyway.

An incredibly Whiskey Torte had a hazelnut meringue-type base nesting under layers of raspberries and flourless chocolate cake (sweetened with essence of raisins and flavored with whiskey) veiled by a rich ganache coating topped with a crown of cocoa balls and light chocolate curls. Then thee was the one with a multitude of fresh raspberries, pecan bits and shreds of coconut atop an almond flavored pastry. Although not as pretty as some of the other selections, it was a taste sensation! Of course I can't forget the multi-layered hazelnut cake, either. It was quite nutty and covered with a thick layer of ganache chocolate topped with a ring of hazelnuts.

A rich, freshly ground French roast coffee was a perfect companion to these ultra-rich concoctions, our cups being refilled often, but without intrusion. There is also a couple of fresh squeezed juices, natural lemonade, mint, black and Japanese green teas (by the potful, complete with individual drip-proof strainers), as well as espresso and cappucino. All the hot drinks are served with crisp, homemade anise-flavored biscotti for dipping.

The menu, which changes several times a year at the whim of Chef RoxSand and her maitre d'husband Spyro, is refreshingly eclectic (as you hopefully have noticed). I like the fact that they have enough regard for their customers (and enough backbone) to state "no pines cigars, or those sill cloves


cigarettes permitted in smoking areas" right below the food listings. Everything on their entrees start at about \$7.50, with \$8.95 bably being the median price, de average about \$5.50 (sweet heaven is doubtedly more expensive than savory entrees, their cost remaining the same, even in their new category and time slot. Only for special occasions.

Of course, in the public part of the restaurant, every meal hee can't help but be a special occasion!

At lunch, appetizers average from \$6 to \$8, heaven). At dinner the appetizers are the same price as they were earlier in the day, but are augmented by many of the luncheon four of the pizzas and a Norman Burger, however, slip under our arbitrary \$10 price limin in the entrees after sundown. 

Their salvation comes in the form of a very specially powered phone booth (a wonderful repro of Ma Bell's finest, circa 1988), piloted by Rufus (George Carlin, who describes his character as "the embodiment of 700 years of elapsed rock-and-roll cool"), a man from the far distant future (the 27th century, to be precise). Rufus has been sent by his ruling council, "The Three Most Important People in the World" (portrayed by rock stars Clarence Clemons, Martha Davis and Fee Waybill), to make sure that Bill and Ted remain together to fulfill their cosmic destiny as the rock stars of the 2600's. This guide teaches them how to use a unique historical version of The Yellow Pages to bridge the "circuits of time" and put "history at (their) fingertips."

A test drive takes them back to the time and land of the "short, dead dude", an incarnation of the very same circumstance that began their predicament. Rufus had wanted them to learn history by being there, but their phone booth had landed in the middle

of a battlefield and they beat a hasty retreat inadvertently bringing the little general with them back to the future, so to speak. Thrilled with the idea of having someone famous to help them with their report, they wasted no time to "let their fingers do the walking" and begin their "excellent adventure" to collect prominent personages of the past.

A lot of the fun of this film comes in the brief period when this diverse group has arrived back in San Dimas and they are assembling to present the report. Imagine Napoleon, Billy The Kid, Socrates (pronounced so' crates), Sigmund Freud (rhymes with dude), Genghis Khan, Joan of Arc, Abraham Lincoln and Ludwig van Beethoven roaming a large urban mall? One of the funniest non-slap scenes was the distinguished looking Dr. Freud holding a big corndog-on-a-stick in front of him while trying to pick up on two adolescent chicks. Another howler was when the group is in a tight spot (not refering to the nine of them crammed into a regulation-sized phone

booth) and touch-toning the digits for home they get the recording "I'm sorry. The number you have dialed is not in service."

There are some rather clever time warp bits, too, the most wily coming right after the "recording" scene when they have inadvertently dialed up one day too soon, and meet themselves in a Circle K parking lot. The Bill and Ted returning give the departing pair some sage advice, which, of course, they promptly forget. Several of the time bending japes that follow are funny as well, until they repeat the same type of gag ad nauseam (no pun intended).

B. & T.E.A. was filmed mostly in Phoenix, and the audience certainly reacted most vociferously when the familiar locations of Metrocenter (a social center for this age group) and Coronado High School (where, undoubtedly, many of them are still in attendance) popped up on the screen. Steve Schemmel, founder of Phoenix' own beloved Janus Theatre, did much of the

casting in the Valley for this flick. Unfortunately, many of our local actors and extras, including Greg Lutz, Anne McNulty, Anthony Aiken and others who had to get up before the crack of dawn for their shooting schedule, were either cut, or, at the very least, not able to be spotted by this reviewer in the crowded auditorium scenes.

There is no question that this movie was made to appeal to the high school set, but that's no reason why those who are as much as a decade or three older couldn't enjoy it by loosening up a little bit. You can't "party on, dude" if you're gonna be uptight. And some of the dialogue and visuals even went way over the heads of its intended targets - though most did not have that

Of course, Bill and Ted are really the strength of the whole film. So, how would I describe Alex and Keanu? "Excellent,

This difference somehow manifests itself down the line, making Stand a positive, compassionate experience and Lean just an interesting approach to education.



TRUE BELIEVER

Eddie Dodd (James Wood) is a twenty vear old dinosaur. A 60's hippie lawyer who is still brilliant enough to free hoards of guil-

ty drug pushers, but who's too stubborn to live in the present, he is suddenly sent (from heaven, no doubt) one Roger Baron (Robert

Downey, Jr.), an idealistic young lawyer-intraining to be his assistant in still another who had been framed.

Producer Lawrence Lasker sums up this story perfectly: "When Eddie...finds himself defending a truly innocent man, it really makes him examine what he's been doing for the past 20 years, and he realizes he's been afraid of believing in something as strongly as he believed back in the '60s.'

I'm afraid, once again as of late, that Wood is better than the vehicle he is appear-

WE THE LIVING

This motion picture embodies a beautiful, poignant story line based on Ayn Rand's first novel, a loosely veiled autobiography of the same title, published in 1936. In 1942, without her knowledge, the Fascist government of Italy sponsored this production to expose the evils of Lenin's communism. Unfortunately for them, the film, which developed a wide following among the masses, actually revealed more of a picture of a heartless totalitarian government acutely out of touch with the needs of its citizens — in other words, it mirrored Mussolini's Fascist regime. Five months after its release, it was banned by the government, with all prints and negatives confiscated.

This black and white production has an obsolescent (if not totally antiquated) appearance, abetted by distracting effects (the snow, a frequent visitor, looks as if they put a pillow factory through a blender and blew out the bits of feathers). Additionally, the movie is still too long, even when pared down to its current 2 hours, 50 minutes, plus a twenty minute intermission. Furthermore, it's in Italian with stilted and flowery subtitles that tend to wane our interest, though they eventually become so commo to be unobtrusive.

The acting, however, is as fresh done yesterday. Young Rosanno Brazzi very handsome, in an almost pretty sort of way, which suits his aristocratic background and allows him to get away with some of the less desirable aspects of his personality. Rugged Fosco Giachetti is able to portray Brazzi's antithesis with a dignity that betrays his human side with warrented subtlety. But Alida Valli as the woman who uses the latter to aid the former (her true love), does the most splendid job here, with facial expressions far more telling than the

Although the messages come out loud and clear, We the Living is obviously done with a strong sense of love and tenderness for the subject matter. The tragic ending especially makes it reminiscent of a Puccini opera — only without music. This version has much to offer, but I would personally love to see a contemporary remake to bring it up to the technical standards we have learned to take for granted.



River Phoenix, as Little Nikita, wondered why FBI agent Sidney Poitier was hanging around him so much and asked point blank if he was gay, like "a waiter I once bussed for." Poitier: "Can't say as I am." River's waiter could have been the one who cruised Daniel Day-Lewis in Stars and Bars, or the one in Vibes who made Cyndi Lauper quip to Jeff Goldblum, "The waiter's in love with you.'

When The Good Mother, Diane Keaton, met Liam Neeson, her best friend dvised her to go for it: "Do you know how few guys are out there who aren't either gay married?" Later hetero stud Neeson planted a few campy kisses on a junkman. In Arthur 2 on the Rocks heterosexual Dudley Moore flirted teasingly with his butler, and later grabbed one of a pair of obviously gay decorators.

obviously gay decorators.

Bull Durham was about hetero sex and baseball, but had fun with macho hangups as well. "I love macho male bonding," Susan Sarandon quipped, "even if it is probably latent homosexuality rechanneled."

In A New Life, freshly divorced Alan Alda went to a singles bar and emerged with straight transvestite mugger Alec Mapa. Later Alda fell for a woman whose best friend. Bill Irwin, was probably gay.

friend, Bill Irwin, was probably gay Another neglected gay character was a man in Michael Keaton's therapy group in *Clean* and *Sober*, where when they said "straight" they meant free of alcohol and drugs.

In Bright Lights, Big City, straight arrow coke freak Michael J. Fox declined offers to dance with transvestite Zette and to "join the party" with two women he caught kissing in a bathroom. At his office a gay man stayed in the background, but Fox said of their spinsterish (euphemism) boss, "It's not my fault she never got married."

Appointment with Death teemed with lesbian buzzwords. Piper Laurie played a former prison matron while Lauren Bacall and Hayley Mills were traveling companions. A lesbian jealousy motive would have been more interesting and believable than the one that finally emerged.

The Unbearable Lightness of Being hinted at a potential lesbian relationship between Juliette Binoche and Lena Olin, when they weren't making it with Daniel Day-Lewis. Some people read a lesbian attraction into the bonding that occurred at the end of Sorceress between the forest healer and the teenager who became her apprentice; but director Suzanne Schiffman assured me it hadn't occurred to her.

The sex lives of Gertrude Stein and Alice B. Toklas were never mentioned in Alan Rudolph's The Moderns, but it was assumed that any woman Keith Carradine didn't sleep with was a lesbian.

The Kiss was a big lesbian tease, with aunt Joanna Pacula pursuing her niece, Meredith Salenger. The desired kiss was the family way out of passing on a demon. Pacula serewed Salenger's father to get at his daughter, almost the reverse of the situation in Burning Secret, where Baron Klaus Maria Brandauer behaved seductively toward a 12-year-old when he was after the boy's mother, Faye Dunaway.

In She's Having a Baby it wasn't always clear whether Alec Baldwin wanted to hump Kevin Bacon or Elizabeth McGovern after being best man at their wedding. The two men expressed their love for each other so seriously that they had to laugh it off, macho-style.

In A Month in the Country Colin Firth didn't seem to mind that his friend Kenneth Branagh "[sat] out the last six months of [WWI] in a glass house for buggering his batman." James Wilby followed Maurice with A Summer Story, in which his travels with a friend made a local farmer think they

Blake Edwards spiced up Sunset with kinky sex. Of Jennifer Edwards and her lover Joe Dallesandro it was said, "She likes women and he likes to watch." At the local whorehouse Mariel Hemingway, in butch haircut and tux, was rumored to be the lover of the murdered madam.

In Aria Derek Jarman brought his gay sensibility to heterosexual material, for once; Julian Temple was outrageous with a campy farce about unfaithful spouses Buck Henry and Beverly D'Angelo; Jean-Luc Godard presented a parade of musclemen, with a waitress fantasizing about them while another waitress appeared to be more interested in her; and Theresa Russell played a "trouser role" for Nicholas Roeg.

The drag queens of the year were Harvey Fierstein, Charles Pierce, Axel Vera and Ken Page in Torch Song Trilogy, which featured Harriet C. Leider in male drag as the Maitre D'; but there was gratuitous transvestism by Val Kilmer in Willow, Marc Price in The Rescue, Jim Varney in Ernest Saves Christmas, Rob Lowe in Illegally Yours, Arsenio Hall in Coming to America and Richard Dreyfuss in Moon over

A Nightmare on Elm Street 4: The Dream Master gave Freddy Krueger an opportunity to do drag, in a dream cameo as the school nurse. In Hellbound: Hellraiser II, Claire Higgins had some female bodies among her sexual souvenirs in the attic. There was also strong female bonding between Ashley Laurence and Imogen Boorman, who looked like younger versions of Kelly McGillis and Jodie Foster in their frequent embraces.

Kristy McNichol played a lesbian in Two Moon Junction, and Variety commented that her "subtle bisexual scenes dancing with (star Sherilyn) Fenn have more electricity than Fenn's...heterosexual encounters..." In Bellman and True, proritule Frances Tomelty amused herself with a visit from her lesbian lover.

Patty Hearst contained numerous references to lesbianism but stopped short of extending them to the heroine during her 19 months as prisoner and then member of the Symbionese Liberation Army.

Perhaps the year's major lesbian icon was Asta Cadell, played by Deborra-L Furness in the Australian feminist drama Shame. Supposedly not gay, she rode a motorcycle, wore a leather jacket, beat up men and formed close relationships with a woman and a teenage girl.

In Testimony Ben Kingsley cited "Tchaikovsky's homosexuality" as one of the things Soviet musicians discussed in lieu of politics. Of course there was no mention of John's alleged affair with Brian Epstein in Imagine: John Lennon, but Lennon was seen dancing playfully with a drag queen as Elton John took pictures.

Another drag queen was good for a few cheap laughs in Without a Clue. Doug Howes body-doubled Salome for the Dance of the Seven Veils in Salome's Last Dance.

Of the hundreds of gags in The Naked Gun: From the Files of Police Squad! only three had gay elements. Even the G-rated Little Dorrit featured perennial stereotype

Helms sputtered about their use of procedure to defeat him but there was nothing he could do. The amendment passed — after extensive discussion on the need for effective AIDS educational materials.

AIDS Treatment & Research

The federal government has been appropriating money for AIDS treatment, research and education since the AIDS epidemic came to the attention of Congress in 1981. This is somewhat unusual since ordinarily appropriation of the attention of Congress in 1981. dinarily money is appropriated to a program after a bill to create the program has been passed. While general institutions, such as the National Institutes of Health and the Centers for Disease Control have been purposized for years specific AIDS program. authorized for years, specific AIDS programs within those institutions had never received separate authorizations. Although money for treatment and research had not been challenged because of that lack of authorization, lobbyists did not want to count on Congressional or Administration goodwill in the future. Senate bill 2889 was passed and authorized a series of AIDS research and education programs, through the leadership of Senator Kennedy and Congressman Henry Waxman (D-CA). It is a major victory that the bill includes the nonhomophobic wording of the Cranston-Kennedy provision of the FY89 Appropriations Bill, and offers some assurance of future funding.

Each year Congress increases the spending budget for AIDS treatment and research. This year it stands at nearly \$1.6 billion, but in the forecast Bush administration cuts, there may be a fight to maintain that budget.

Civil Rights

There are currently two federal laws in effect that protect the rights of people with AIDS and HIV infection. The major one is Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Section 504 only covers entities ("programs and activities") that rerceive federal funds, and offers no protection in the private sector for people with disabilities or AIDS. Last year Congress was considering the Civil Rights Restoration Act — a bill to overturn the Supreme Court decision that gave a restrictive definition to the term 'program' or 'activity' - and Section 504 was brought out into the open.

Homophobic members of Congress like Senators Gordon Humphrey (R-NH) and William Armstrong (R-COL) proposed a provision to exclude people with AIDS and HIV infection from Section 504. Fortunately, the disability community was monitoring civil rights legislation.

With the help of the Disability Rights Education and Defense Fund (DREDF) and a coalition of disability rights groups called the Consortium of Citizens with Developmental Disabilities, a counterprovision that affirmed protection for people who posed no health threat to others was drafted. People with AIDS or HIV infection pose no health threat to others, according to current medical evidence, and therefore remain included under the provision. The amendment passed as part of the Civil Rights Restoration Act, and even served as a basis for a memo from the Department of Justice asserting that people with AIDS and HIV infection are protected under Section 504.

But Section 504 only protects AIDS and HIV carriers and people with disabilities in the public sector. The Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988 was the first bill that extended non-discrimination protections to these gorups in the the private sector — prohibiting discrimination on the part of those that rent or sell private dwellings. This bill also protects those who assocate with people with AIDS, HIV infection or other disabilities so that landlords and owners cannont discriminate against a person because her or his lover or friends have AIDS or HIV infection — and its passage was a considerable victory in the

When the bill was being considered by the House Judiciary Committee last April, Congressman Bil Dannemeyer (R-CA) tried to get in an amendment that would exclude people with AIDS and HIV infection. DREDF, the ACLU and AIDS Action Counsel formulated a counter-amendment that Congressman Barney Frank (D-MA) offered. It passed in the committee by a vote of 22 to 13 and then served as the basis for defeating similar efforts on the House floor.

Inside The Washington Lobby

by Chai Feldblum and Laura Markowitz

AIDS has been the spotlight gay issue in the media for most of the '80s, provoking homophobia from the general public, but also bringing gay men, lesbians and straight people together in shared pain and loss. AIDS and gay rights are often inextricably linked, especially in the mind of Congress. Last year's Congress passed legislation that not only limited the type of language used in AIDS educational materials, but that was based on blatantly homophobic attitudes. At the same time, during this past Congress lobbyists have sometimes been able to convince Members to pass some AIDS legislation that is unencumbered by anti-homosexual provisions.

Lesbians and gays need to stay informed. But keeping track of different bills and amendments as they bounce back and forth in committees, the House and the Senate can be dry reading. We are going to take you inside the Washington lobby and introuduce you to the AIDS and gay rights legislation that will be voted on in 1989, tell you who the key players are — our allies and our obstacles to freedom and security under the law. For instance, few realize that many of the AIDS lobbyists are lesbians, or that the watchdog of our civil rights protection has been the disability community. Our first column will give a brief recap of the 100th Congress and a preview of the upcoming one. Subsequent columns will have the insiders' report on the status of the AIDS and gay rights legislation — the ins and outs not covered by the mainstream press.

AIDS Education and the **Helms Amendment**

No funds may be used to provide AIDS educational materials that "promote or encourage homosexual sexual activities and all such materials must emphasize abstinence from homosexual sexual activities," read the infamous Helms Amendment that became law under the Fiscal Year 1988 (FY88) Appropriations Bill — a yearly enactment that governs how the federal government spends money in that particular fiscal year. It was a short-term victory for Helms, and the Senator began working on ways to make it a permanent law of the United States.

In April, 1988 it looked as if Helms would succeed. The Senate passed the Helms Amendment as part of S.1220, the AIDS Research and Education Bill, championed by Senator Edward Kennedy (D-MA). Although Kennedy succeeded in getting an additional provision added that somewhat reduced the impact of the Helms amendment, the entire Helms language was in the legislation — a three year authoriza-

But then the tides turned. Debate on the FY89 Appropriations Bill came around in the Senate while the counterpart to \$.1220 was still being argued in a House committee (bills must be approved in committee before they go "to the floor" for a general vote). Helms was poised on the Senate floor, ready to offer the same amendment that the Senate had now passed for him twice before. But something was different. During the previous week, lobbyists had been talking to Kennedy and Senator Alan Cranston (D-CA), urging them to make a "pre-emptive strike" and offer a non-homophobic amendment before Helms could offer his.

"AIDS educational programs...shall not be designed to promote or encourage, directly sexual activity, homosexual or heterosexual...but shall be designed to reduce transmission of [HIV]," read the alternate amendment, drafted by lobbyists from the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), AIDS Action Council, National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) and the Human Rights Campaign Fund. It was hoped that once this amendment was passed, the original Helms amendment could actually be defeated, even if it were offered once again.







Intense negotiations beforehand ensured that no AIDS amendment was even offered in the Senate

The Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988 will become effective March 12, 1989. While this is a major victory for people with AIDS, HIV infection and their loved ones, we still face opposition to gay and lesbian civil rights protection.

Legislation for 1989

We consistently win when we work in coalition with the disability community because the oppositaion is then forced to take an affirmative step to exclude people with AIDS and HIV infection from other people with disabilities, and such attempts are easier to defeat. The lobbying efforts will join forces again this year to push for the passage of the Americans With Disabilities Act that calls for protection of people with disabilities, including people with AIDS and HIV infection in employment, transporta-

tion, communication, local and state government activities and public accommodations.

MLS

Confidentially is another vital issue that Congress will decide policy on this year. Lobbyists are once again developing a bill providing that HIV test reslts may not be disclosed to outsiders by those who administer the test or by health care providers who are informed by the infected person. A major concern is that such a bill should add to, and not supplant, the protections that currently exist in some states.

A financing package that will finally address private insurance coverage and government programs, and that will create a system to provide treatment and health care to people with AIDS and HIV infections is another priority for this year's AIDS lobby.
