Multi-thousand mile walk to raise money for AIDS

PHOENIX — It seems there's no limit to what Bill Mole will do to raise money for his causes. Right now he's on a global walk for AIDS research which will take him 25,000 miles, in his Adidas-sponsored shoes, commencing last May and continuing until March 25, 1991.

The forty-one year old man also sat in a bathtub of pork and beans for 200 hours to raise \$200 for the World Health Organization's AIDS research fund. He organized a penny campaign for a food sharing program which netted 1.5 million pennies. He sat on the roof top of a city hall for 28 days to raise funds to feed the hungry. And there's many more.

Sound strange? Not to Mole who is totally serious about doing whatever it takes to support his causes. It all started in 1981 when in that year and the two following he organized the famed annual Terry Fox runs in Toronto. Since then, the organizing hasn't stopped.

Mole was in Phoenix for several days last week pitching his current global walk to local businesses and organizations and left town with an additional \$1,200 toward his goal of ten million dollars to be donated to the World Health Organization's Global Programme on AIDS. Never one to shy away from a dare — and since it was his

birthday — he even allowed forty-one swats on the derier by patrons of The Burn Steer who paid \$5.00 each for the honor.

Additionally he made appearances at Charlie's, Preston's and spoke to the independent Tavernowners Association. From here on to Devner and to four other continents and thirty-five countries. And who knows how many more dares he'll accept to get the attention needed to make his global walk a success.

House names appointments to National AIDS Commission

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Over two months late, the U.S. House of Representatives finally announced their members of the National AIDS Commission, a federally mandated panel which is to take up where the Presidential Commission on the HIV Epidemic left off last summer. With last week's appointments, attention is turning this week to the U.S. Senate and to the Bush White House for the nomination of the remaining panel members.

The National AIDS Commission was created by the Congress last year as part of the federal AIDS omnibus bill which was passed in October. The 15-member panel is to be composed of five members appointed by the House, five members appointed by the Senate and another five appointed by the

White House. According to the bill's language, the appointments should have been made by January, but due to a host of complications, Washington hasn't started moving on this until now.

Last week, the House announced its lineup for the commission, which reads as follows:

Rep. Roy Rowland (D-Dublin, GA): One of two physicians in Congress, Rowland has been very helpful to AIDS lobbyists in fighting off hostile amendments to AIDS legislation from Rep. William Dannemeyer (R-Fullerton, CA) on the floor of the House. He has also been the co-chair of the House Democratic Task Force on AIDS.

AAP schedules 2nd walkathon

PHOENIX — The Second Annual From All Walks Of Life" walkathon is a 6.2 mile/10 kilometer walk to raise funds for the continuation of services to persons who have tested positive to the HIV virus or who have AIDS.

The Arizona AIDS Project (AAP), a 501c3 organization, is organizing the walkathon. Proceeds will support casework services, volunteer support programs and AIDS education. It will be held commencing at 9:00 a.m. Saturday, April 8.

The walkathon will begin at Hoy Field at Phoenix College, 1202 W. Thomas Road in Phoenix. Walkers will cover the 6.2 mile area by walking through the Encanto Park area, where some of the Walley's historic

homes are located.

This year's goal is \$30,000, up from the \$15,000 raised in 1988. The funds will be used for the ongoing work of AAP with AIDS patients, education, services and counseling. Figures from the Centers for Disease Control indicate that 664 Arizona residents have tested positive or have AIDS, and of that number 334 have died. According to local professionals working in the field, that number is the "tip of the iceberg" and represents only 50-75 percent of the actual cases in the state.

Persons interested are requested to obtain a pledge sheet and take part in the walk. For information call the Arizona AIDS Project at 277-1929.


OP celebrates 5th birthday

TUCSON — "One of the really important lessons of the 1980s is that gay and lesbian people have to run for office and be elected. They system isn't going to change in our direction if we're not part of it."

So states an elected public official who has openly identified with gay causes. Steve Schulte, West Hollywood mayor during 1986-87 and five-year member of the city council, adds, "In the '60s, many of us — myself included — stood on the outside and shouted epithets. But one of the things we learned back then was that the impact you can have is limited unless you're in decision-making positions."

Schulte will share insights into the political process at the Old Pueblo Business & Professional Association's (OP) fifth birthday banquet and party April 15 at the Tucson Doubletree Hotel.

"One of the challenges of politics is to find the commonalities, to move toward a common goal," Schulte continues. In West Hollywood, with an estimated 30% gay population, Schulte has forged an alliance for human rights among gays, senior citizens and Jewish emigrees. But Schulte cautions not to broadly compromise one's own values. "While you do want to build coali-

tions because you're often not strong enough on your own, you also don't want to give away your own agenda," he says. "No one



Don Goldman: An attorney, Goldman is the former president of the American Hemophilia Foundation.

Dr. Norman Zimberg: He is a professor of psychiatry at Harvard Medical School.

Diane Ahrens: A county commissioner in St. Paul, Minn., she heads the AIDS Task Force for the National Association of Counties.

Rev. Scott Allen: A Dallas minister, Allen heads up the Texas AIDS Task Force and, according to Human Rights Campaign Fund lobbyist Carlton Lee, has supported sound AIDS policies in the past.

"They're all pretty good people," said HRCF's Lee. "They'll probably all be pretty good on the issue."

Now all eyes turn to the Senate where nominations from such disparate senators as Sens. Edward Kennedy (D-MA) and Jesse Helms (R-NC) will be considered and finally announced.

Although some have hinted that a number of people, including entertainer and AIDS fundraiser Dionne Warwick, are being considered for a spot on the commission, only one Senate nominee appears to be secured a spot on the panel.

Dr. June Osborn, the dean of the School of Public Health at the University of Michigan, is a globally respected AIDS leader and, according to inside Washington sources, is virtually guaranteed a spot on the commission. Osborn is one of the U.S.'s representatives to the World Health Organization's Global Commission on AIDS and is an advisor to the National Institutes for Health and the Food and Drug Administration.

"She is absolutely wonderful," said Ron Benschoter, communications coordinator for the Washington-based AIDS Action Council. "She's been leading the fight against AIDS for a number of years and is the best person I can think of for the seat off the top of my head. She took Dannemeyer on head on, has a good understanding of history and can think on her feet."

As for the White House, the bill mandates that three of the executive bench appointments be the Secretary of Health and Human Services (Dr. Louis Sullivan), the Secretary of Defense and the Administrator of Veteran's Affairs. With Ronald Reagan upping the Veteran's Affairs office to a Cabinet-level position, it is expected that Veteran's Affairs Secretary Edward Dowinski will fill that seat.

With the Senate's approval of Rep. Richard Chaney (R-WY) as Bush's Defense Secretary, it is expected that he will fill that spot on the panel.

Chaney, a staunch conservative who has received a perfect score from the American Conservative Union for the past three years, received a score of 30 out of 100 from the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force in 1988.

Canada releases all AIDS drugs by Rex Wockner

CHICAGO — In a major victory for the HIV-impacted and AIDS activists, the Canadian government has decided that all experimental AIDS drugs will be available to any doctor who wants them.

Health and Welfare Canada's Health Protection Branch and Bureau of Human Prescription Drugs (BHPD) announced the news in early February, acknowledging that AIDS activists and the media had convinced them it was the right thing to do.

Utilizing Canada's Emergency Drug Release Program, a doctor now need merely ask to receive any unmarketed drug being developed or tested by any drug company anywhere in the world. It the company

agrees to provide the substance, it may charge what it wishes.

'We've always said these drugs could be released with just the stroke of a pen. Toronto AIDS doctor Michael Hulton told Xtra!. "It's just that now the Health Protection Branch appears to be exercising their discretionary power in our favor, rather than against us.'

Dr. Michelle Brill-Edwards of the BHPD said the change in Canadian regulations was the result of "evolution" in the past year sparked by complaints of nonaccess to AIDS treatments.

She also said BHPD was embarrassed by a news report on Canadian Broadcasting Corporation TV "in which it appeared that a request for dextran sulphate was refused by one of our staff persons out of hand...It was most disconcerting for us to see [this] report on the CBC journal," Brill-Edwards

For AIDS Action Now! (AAN!), a Toronto ACT UP-style group which has fought for access to drugs, the February announcement is a significant victory. But AAN! chair Tim McCaskell says there is still much to be done.

'They've unlocked a door but there's

still no proactive government agency facilitating the wider use of AIDS treatments," McCaskell said in a phone interview. "They have a bureaucracy for research, one for stopping the spread, but nobody to see that the best possible treatments are available to people. So, if you're aware of something and if your doctor understands it, then, yes, the government will no longer block that for you, but that's a long way from doctors across the country

being aware of what's out there."

McCaskell added that as far as he understands the Canadian socilized health care system, there is nothing to stop Americans from accessing the experimen-

tal drugs through Canadian doctors.
"You'll have to pay to go to the doctor, which we don't," McCaskell said, "but the doctor only has to provide a patient initials, birthdate and diagnosis to Ottawa. There's nothing to stop a PWA in Detroit from going to Windsor.

McCaskell says Canadian activists will now focus their energy on improved coordination of AIDS treatments, while continuing their opposition to placebo studie "Although," McCaskell added, would participate in a placebo study any

cytomegalovirus (CMV) retinitis, a form of blindness commonly found in AIDS

Members of the AIDS community appeared poised for the approval of the drug in November of 1987 when, instead, an FDA outside advisory panel voted 11-2 against approval of the drug as a treatment for CMV retinitis. Since the controversial vote, which saw the panel's two ophthalmologists casting the sole votes for approval, little action has been taken toward the drug's approval by the FDA and only patients who had been receiving the drug previously, or those with "sight threatening" CMV retinitis could continue to receive it through the FDA's compassionate use protocol. Other patients with a specified form of the illness could only get the drug as part of a study where half received the drug and half received nothing, unless they started to show signs of blindness, at which point the drug would be administered. That, AIDS activists charged, was unethical and hypocritical, since to administer the drug upon evidence of blindness, indicated the agency knew the drug could prevent the onset of the blindness.

With this announcement, all patients with CMV retinitis whose doctors opt to treat them with the drug may receive it via the FDA's open label protocol.

What Happened

Since the controversial 1987 vote, AIDS activists and medical experts nationwide for-mulated strategies to goad the FDA into approving the drug. Meanwhile, members of the New York AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power (ACT UP/N.Y.) perused reams of medical studies and met with several medical authorities to find out what exact ly was happening with what appeared to be a promising drug which was stymied in a controversial study.

What they found was that the physicians

almost unanimously believed the drug worked. After careful strategizing, last month over fifty members of the group then commandeered a federal government panel on the approval of AIDS and cancer drugs to demand specific answers from FDA spokesperson Ellen Cooper as to why there was no action on the drug.

After extracting an unprecedented admission of partial guilt from Cooper for the drug's delay, a handful of ACT UP members met with National Institutes for Allergies and Infectious Diseases head Dr. Anthony Fauci to express their concerns about the drug's approval.

According to the activists who met with Fauci, at the meeting, the top government AIDS researcher pledged to lobby FDA commissioner Frank Young for immediate action on the drug, adding that he had seen the drug's results himself. Since that time, Fauci has called ACT UP member Bill Monaghan three times to report on his meetings with Young.

It is the lobbying of Fauci and U.S. Representative Nancy Pelosi (D-San Francisco) which has been directly credited for shifting the position of the FDA on the drug.

During the announcement, the FDA stated that it would hold hearings on aerosol pentamidine, a prophylactic treatment for AIDS-related pneumonia, on May 1 and hearings on DHPG on May 2. There, the FDA will hear testimony on the drugs. AIDS activists expect that the FDA will then grant full approval status to the two drugs at, or soon after, the hearings.

It is reported that the AIDS/HIV Report, a respected bi-weekly summary on the epidemic produced by Biodata Publishers, has largely credited ACT UP's efforts for jump-starting the approval process on the drug in their current edition.


FDA removes roadblocks for AIDS blindness drug by Cliff O'Neill

BETHESDA, MD — The Food and Drug Administration recently announced the broad availability of a drug which is widely seen as an effective treatment against AIDS-related blindness, thus eliminating several roadblocks for people seeking treatment. Until two weeks ago, the approval process of the drug was mired in a controversial trial study, which, AIDS activists charged, allowed half of the participants to go blind before being offered treatment.


Ganciclovir, also known as DHPG, is manufactured by the Syntex Corporation and, according to a broad spectrum of medical professionals and AIDS experts, is a highly effective treatment against

What To Expect

ACT UP/N.Y. member Bill Bahlman, a central figure in the DHPG actions, suggests that at the May 2 meeting, the FDA will attempt to save face by making it seem that the approval process for the drug has been restarted due to some new data that has come to light. "What they'll do is replace the old data to make it look like new data," he said. "They'll try to put a new face on it...This is a major blunder and the FDA thought they could get away with it. It's not just ACT UP, but groups all across the country that stood up and said they weren't going to stand for these new clinical trials. A number of people had resigned themselves to these trials, but others were willing to

ACT UP's Monaghan, who was one of the three that met with Fauci, now is con-

cerned that the drug be also approved for CMV colitis, and AIDS-related diarrheal condition commonly known as "wasting", blamed for much of the decimation of AIDS patients' bodies.

But he sees the May 2 hearings as an important first step, regardless. If the intravenous treatment drug is approved then, as he and others expect, then the FDA and Syntex can move towards getting the drug approved for CMV colitis and take action on developing an oral form of the drug which would be easier and less risky to administer to patients.

"We would be sorely disappointed if it were not approved May 2," Monaghan statead. "Especially after all the conflict of the past several months.

"We're still trying to convince the FDA that we are patients, not subjects," he added. "We're still trying to get it into the heads of scientists that access is what is most important to us. As long as the drugs have gone through Phase One trials for toxicity, they should be accessible. No one with a terminal disease, be it cancer or AIDS, should

be prevented from getting the drug."

Portland FDA closed for ACT UP protest by Rex Wockner

PORTLAND, OR — The Portland, Oregon regional office of the Food and Drug Administration didn't open February 27, the day of a planned civil disobedience action by ACT UP groups from Portland, Seattle and San Francisco.

"We got up there and started knocking on the door and no one was home," said ACT UP/Portland founder Michael Petrelis. "They closed the office for the entire day."

More than 150 activists took part in the demonstration and twelve were eventually arrested for refusing to vacate the hallway outside the FDA office.

"We had to laugh," said Petrelis. "The police claimed we were obstructing business but there was no business going on. Not a single employee showed up. 


red paint on the entrances to Portland's federal building. As the protest got underway, the building was covered with "The Government Has Blood On Its Hands" stickers.

"Fifty-two will die today; what does the FDA have to say," demonstrators chantead.

After 20 minutes, Petrelis said, "a member of ACT UP/Seattle just threw aside a police barricade and we crowded into an elevator and went upstairs. The media crowded into a second elevator and met us on the sixth floor. We managed to stay there for about 45 minutes. The sixth floor was plastered with stickers — the elevators, the bathrooms, everywhere."

Petrelis said ACT UP protests at FDA regional offices are important "to keep the pressure on...What we began on October II, 1988, when we shut down FDA head-quarters in Maryland, was just the beginning," he said. "We must be active in smaller places that are not hotbeds of gay or AIDS activism, places where they don't expect us to act up."

ACT UP/Portland's Lori Kohler agreed, saying "the effect on the FDA is cumulative. We want people to know that even in a small town in the Pacific Northwest, we are not going to tolerate inaction"

Kohler said scores of people she's never seen before participated in the FDA protest, making it a watershed event in the local community. "People here are frustrated and there hasn't been an outlet. Now we have the momentum," she said.

The Portland protest focused on four specific drugs that activists say the FDA should have released by now — CD4, dextran sulfate, DTC/Imuthiol and Foscarnet. "There is irrefutable evidence that there are promising AIDS treatments which are stalled in the FDA drug approval process due to inexcusable and continuing bureaucratic delays," Kohler said.

In the last year, FDA officials in Washington have both defended the agency and admitted its errors, dependent on how interviewers have phrased questions.





Puerto Rico Group Expanding by John Hubert

The Colectivo de Concientizacion Gay (CCG), the "Collective for Gay Awareness", the four-year-old group in San Juan, Puerto Rico, is now looking for a fixed site where they can hold their meetings and an office where people can come to when they wish.

At present the CCG doesn't have sufficient income to rent a meeting place and office, so they are looking for someone in San Juan who would donate a small office space. Readers from the U.S. mainland, who might be in a position to help out financially, can write in English or Spanish to CCG, Apartado 1003, Estacion Viejo San Juan, San Juan, Puerto Rico 00902, U.S.A.

The CCG has a two-page newsletter in Spanish which you can get by sending \$1.00 to the above address. Also they now have their own T-shirt with "Estamos En Todas Partes" and the CCG Lambda Logo. Send \$8.50, postage included, telling them your size (S,M,L,XL).

The CCG reports that some residents in the popular gay area of Condado in San Juan have been making complaints about gays and lesbians who frequent the clubs and "guest houses" of the area. In particular, they want lesbians and gays to express their affection less openly! In other words, no more touching, hugging and kissing! The complaints claim that gays and lesbians are converting the area into a center of AIDS, and these irrational complaints have caused some guest house owners to reject guests of the same sex.

CCG celebrated the re-opening of the Caimito bar, disco and game room. It also has a swimming pool. Caimito, like many other San Juan lesbian and gay establishments, had sufered harassment from the authorities and homophobic members of the populous. It's nice to have one come back and CCG hopes that others will follow the Caimito example. CCG now has a regular column in the *Wisconsin Light* of Milwaukee and will be happy to send articles to any publication that is interested.

The Second All-Japan JILGA Conference was held in Inuyama in the Aichi Government Palace August 20-21, 1988.

III GA, the Japanese International Lesbian and Gay Association, is an independent Japanese organization which was founded four years ago at the ILGA World Conference in Toronto, Canada. IILGA publishes a Japanese language newsletter WIN and Asian Wind in English. They also do a lot of work with AIDS related projects in Japan and they are very involved with international efforts to support new groups n Asia.

In November, 1988 they held the important Second Gay & Lesbian Asian Conference, which centered its focus on AIDS

topics and goals for gay liberation throughout Asia and the means to encourage more organizations to form.

The Second All-Japan Conference adopted several new projects, including the publication of an AIDS pamphlet, establishing a Gay Library in Tokyo (books, magazines and newspaper contributions appreciated) and an International Project aimed at furthering the development of the lesbian and gay liberation movement in Asia.

Without Reservations

Our featured film this week is **Jacknife**, a story of two childhood buddies who fought in the Vietnam war and how they overcome the mental scars of that experience, with varying degrees of success, many years later. Obviously, that war (or any other, for that matter) was no tea party. Those who are interested in a tea party, however, should read on as we will discuss **The Spicery**, in Glendale, and Mesa's **Third's Old Fashioned Tea Room & Dessert Parlour**. Also on the list of dissectables is the new surrealistic thriller **Paperhouse**.

T-BIRD'S OLD FASHIONED TEA ROOM & DESSERT PARLOUR

The interior of *T-Bird's* is done up in the style of a Victorian house with wainscoting and a little rose-bud patterned wallpaper so popular in the parlours of years gone by, even though it is, in all actuality, located in a storefront smack dab in the middle of a brand new handsome upscale shopping center. With cloth napery and silk flowers on each table, the use of dainty mismatched pieces of fine china is not at all a derogatory statement.

Since this High Tea was by reservation only, our table was already set up for us. We sat down to four tiny dishes: one of butter, one of homemade raspberry preserves, one of homemade Devonshire cream and one of homemade lemon curd. The waitress, a pleasant but not overly animated woman, asked us for our choice of tea, our only decision of the repast (other than if we wanted more scones). We chose English breakfast — several pots full. The two tasty but diminutive homemade scones with currents and white raisins — one for each of us - were served in a napkin lined basket. The combination thus described would have comprised T-Bird's Cream Tea,

served on Tuesdays and Thursdays to the tune of \$4.50. We, however, having the High Tea at \$7.50 each, were entitled to the addition of a three-tier china tree containing pairs of canapes/finger sandwiches and dessert tidbits for our extra \$3.00.

There were cherry tomatoes stuffed with herbed cottage cheese and finger sandwiches of parsley, cucumber and herbed cream cheese on whole wheat. On heart shaped white bread cutouts we found more of the herbed cream cheese (do I see a pattern here?), this time with cucumber slices (what a surprise!) and a little gem of a nutmeat. Next to that were diminutive slices from a rolled-up flour tortilla with yet more of that herbed cream cheese (is this to much of a mediocre thing?) here augmented with canned chili strips. Obviously, imagination ran wild on this one! I realize that teas are aimed at ladies who are supposed to have rather petite appetites, but really, come on guys (or gals, as the case may be), these four canapes collectively would not have equalled one quarter of a Bomans sandwich!

Of course, there were the desserts, too — all made on the premises — all Lilliputian sized, to be sure. We were offered a braided, overly sweet, orange flavored shortbread cookie as well as a pastry filled with more of the aforementioned raspberry preserves. Also on the sugary side, we had little lemon flavored rich pastry timbales, each filled with a tiny morsel of chocolate. Additionally, there were minuscule squares of rich, double chocolate fudge brownies with a sweet frosting, while another little puff-pastry job had an overdose of almond extract. Although our waitress proposed seconds on the tea and the scones, there was no such generosity when it came to the "meat of the matter". Many of the ladies present might have luxuriated in the idea of High Tea. We, however, were verging on thoughts of highway robbery.

THE SPICERY

Located in an old home, with just a small sign in deference to the residential community that it borders, *The Spicery* is easy to pass by. Those in the know, however, fill up its living room, dining room and two bedrooms, charmingly decorated in country-kitch (with many of the accourrements for sale), in anticipation of some fine victuals. With the rooms being somewhat diminutive, the need for reservations becomes obvious. The tables are all topped with lace cloths and diners eat with (and on) a potpourri of mis-matched flatware (and

Our waitress, who was also the bake was both knowledgeable and cheerypleasant. She brought us menus that were actually docorated slate-boards which hung from cute little portable stands. The soup of the day was a hearty tomato-based vegetable, loaded with a flotilla of the usual veggies augmented with shreds of beef to insure a robust flavor. My partner's ham biscuit was just that. Slices of baked ham were sandwiched between the halves of delicious homemade giant bun that had a taste and texture blending the best qualities of a biscuit and a slice of coarse country bread. A very rich but light mayonnaise moistened the roll and Swedish mustard, on the side, gave it zing. Both were made on the premises.

I had a Tea Plate, not listed on the menu, but discussed when I called

beforehand to inquire about our lunch. Although I was informed that it would contain "four sandwiches and two pastries" for a reasonable \$5 tag, it actually had two each of two sandwiches, plus the pastries, of course, on a dainty milk glass pedestal dish. One pair was a slightly smaller version of my buddy's ham biscuits, while the other had moist white meat of turkey with thin slices of cucumber and sprouts, on homemade full-bodied, full-flavored white bread.

The first of the pastries was a very lemony lemon cheese pie with a slab of rich custard resting on a textbook-perfect flaky crust. The mate was a hefty square of banana walnut cake with a sweet butter-cream frosting, liberally sprinkled with more nuts.

We also split a broccoli quiche, firm and cheesy and full of its namesake, with a crust that held up well under its contents. Our iced coffees were strong enough to counteract the inevitable watering down from the melting cubes, and were replenished without fail during the entire meal.

Although the clientele at *The Spicery* has a marked predominance of women over men, the portions were big enough for the average masculine appetite, and the prices small enough to satisfy people of all persuasions. No wonder this place is so popular.

another Italian, Chinese or Mexican eatery hangs out their "open for business" sign, I don't always jump at the chance to sample their wares. I do, however, have very fond memories of *Earthen Joy* and *The Good Earth*, and miss being able to get food that is both tasty and healthy (Scottsdale's *Garden Gourmet* certainly doesn't satisfy the former, and their prices could insure a lack of the latter). So, when I read an ad for **Tasters Yogurt Cafe**, (in a weekly paper, available at convenience markets, that shall remain anonymous) which touts "quality yogurt and vegetarian foods", it piqued my interest to the point of immediate action.

Located in a strip shopping center at the corner of Osborn and Seventh Avenue, *Taster's* looks typical of a myriad of other semi-fast-food places also located in strip shopping centers throughout the Valley (or, for that matter, their clones throughout the good old U.S. of A.). Looks aside, though, I really came for the food. Their special of the day, vegetable pic, which also included

a salad of my choice, bread (I guess it was in the crust) and a beverage, all for \$4.75, sounded like a good bet. Well, my friends, don't let sounds deceive you if you want to win any bets. If the ingredients of the pie were listed in order of abundance, the list would look like this: POTATOES, POTATOES, WHOLE WHEAT CRUST, POTATOES, TOES, onions and carrots. Forge herbs and spices, for if there were any had no taste. In fact, the whole mess was pretty tasteless. Ditto for the brown rice salad, which was based on the pate rice in history. Even the lemon cheesecake and peach cobbler frozen yogurts, which were of a popular brand, were underflavored (an understatement, to say the least). Incidentally, the Red Zinger iced tea, selfserved from a bulk container, was wonderfully full-bodied and refreshing.

If you want some of the greatest iced tea in town, *Taster's Yogurt Cafe* is the place to go!

JACKNIFE



Jacknife is a strange kind of film. The characters talk a lot about action, but there's very little of it. There is, however, a lot of dialogue, most of it centering around the movie's three leads. Being a more cerebral type of motion picture, the acting becomes terribly important, and producers Robert Schaffel (American Anthem, Distant Thunder) and Carol Baum (Harvey Fierstein's Tidy Endings for HBO, Dead Ringers) would have been hard pressed to find three actors more suitable for their parts than Kathy Baker (Street Smart, Clean and Sober), Ed Harris (The Right Stuff, Swing

Shift, Places in the Heart) and the supertalented Robert DeNiro (Bang the Drum Slowly, Taxi Driver, Mean Streats).

Here DeNiro plays Joseph "Megs" Megessey, a Vietnam vet who fifteen years after returning to his rural Vermont hometown, still is plagued by his memories of the war. It seems that three childhood buddies were all stationed together and when, in an ambush, Megs got wounded, Bobby went back to rescue him despite the pleading of Dave (Harris), the football hero who was not as confident on the battlefield as he was on the ballfield. To this day, both



men still feel the guild of Bobby's death. Dave, who tries to drown his guilt in a bottle, is living with (and very dependent upon) his sister, Martha, a shy teacher portrayed by Kathy Baker. Dave and Megs, though living in the same town, haven't seen each other in fifteen years.

Before that fateful day a decade and a half prior, the three guys had made a pact to go fishing on opening day when they got back to the states. One day Megs decides that he will, even at this late date, keep that appointment with his remaining old buddy. So opens the film — in the wee hours of the morning on opening day, when Megs first neets Martha (we assume he met her when he was younger, but never paid any attention to his pal's little sister) and is reunited with a very hungover Dave.

Megs, who got the handle 'Jacknife' when he told his buddies in the service that he once 'totalled out' a truck, is a coarse and reckless soul — a slob with an earthy charm — while Martha is just the opposite. Well, opposites do attract, and before long they are both head over heels for each other. Of course, this doesn't sit well with Dave who stands to lose a maid as well as a good friend and mother figure. 'She's have a hard time handling the most perfect sonofabitch in the world, let alone handling you!" he tells his former pal in an effort to dissuade him from seeing her. To Martha he says "He's not my friend." — and repeats it several times throughout the movie, for emphasis (or overkill), no doubt.

Quite a few scenes take place at meetings for 'Nam vets who are still having difficulty adjusting after the way, sort of like an A.A. for veterans. The film explores, in some depth, the 'post Vietnam stress syndrome' and how differently different people deal with their memories fo the nightmare of combat, of seeing buddies killed and even of having to kill the enemy (which they ultimately realize are human beings too), and the immense difficulties of their transition back to a civilian life where they didn't even get to enjoy the decency of being welcomed back home as war heroes.

To me, that theme, advanced through the tremendous performances of the three main characters, is really the strength of this film.

Robert DeNiro, who has won Oscars for his outstanding performances in both The Godfather - Part II and Raging Bull, also has impressed audiences world-wide for his intense portrayals of vastly divergent characters in such films as The Deer Hunter, The Mission, Brazil, Midnight Run and a host of others. Appropriately, he gets the lion's share of the best lines and bits in this one. When asked by Martha "do your girlfriends come over and cook for you?", he wows us with "is that a real question or are you you just jerking my chain?" in a delivery that only he could do so well. Then there's the absurd irony of this total slob picking up bar and restaurant tabs. "It's on me" he chauvinistically declares in the grand manner, "A lady can't buy when I'm around!" Perhaps one of the funniest scenes in the whole film comes when he really does clean up his act, for Martha's sake, and a tuxedoed version of this former pigpen (he taking her to be a chaperon at her student's senior prom) is frantically cleaning out a decade's accumulation of garbage from the back seat of his car.

I don't know whether it was the theater or the film, but the sound had a terrible quality — or lack of it. There were several lines of dialogue that got lost, even at a critic's screening that had only three people (or critics, as the case may be) in it. I guess the fact that Bruce Broughton's kaunting original score came through it all in good shape would tend to put the blame on the print rather than the sound system.

Although *Jacknife* tends to be a little sluggish and perhaps even overly wordy, it is filled with lots of charm and significance. It's no wonder (about the charm and significance), screenwriter Stephen Matcalfe also wrote the recently released *Cousins*, a sensational sleeper that took both the critics and movie-going public by storm.

revived — the dream disappears — and she is taken home by her mother. Anna goes back to her drawing and pencils in a young boy at an upper window. Sure enough, when she next falls asleep and comes back to her "paper" house, there is a boy in that same window. She calls to him to let her in, but he says the house has no stairs so he must remain on the second floor. The next time she awakens, she draws in a flight of stairs. As this attempt to rescue the boy progresses, each time it gets a little more difficult for Anna to escape the dream, which is becoming more real than reality.

This film succeeds very well in its fantasy portions, greatly aided and abetted by production designer Gemma (*Mona Lisa*, *Never Say Die*) Jackson's fanciful "paper" house and director of photography Mike (*Gothic*) Southon's big, bold shots of the wild, windswept moors of Devon, England; but often fails when it tries to be a thriller. The premise is exciting — the actuality is disappointing for its unfulfilled potential. I don't know if the fault lies with Matthew Jacobs' adaptation of Catherine Storr's novel *Marianne Dreams* or with the director, Bernard Rose (whose previous forte had been directing rock videos), in his feature direc-

torial debut.

Poor Charlotte Burke, who is so convincing in her feature film debut as the little girl controlled by her dreams, had no one to play off of — her mother (Glenne Headly) is very disappointing, especially after having seen her exhilarating performance in the starring role opposite Michael Caine and Steve Martin in Dirty Rotten Scoundrals, while another surprisingly lackluster performance is put in by Ben Cross as Anna's father, who we would have expected much more from after witnessing his spellbinding role in the Academy Award-winning Chariots of Fire. Happily, Marc, her young crippled friend, was sensitively portrayed by Elliot Spiers, while other strength also comes from the quarters of Gemma Jones (The Devils), who far outshined Headly in her ability to make the small role of Dr. Sarah Nichols into a pivotally important

April Movie Preview: Not-Ready-For-Prime-Time Movies

The period between Easter and Memorial Day is filled with Oscar winners, spring-break holdovers, and a lot of screenfilling crap the studios want to get off the shelf so it can hit the video stores soon. There may be a few exceptions and a few surprises among the April releases, but this month is basically not prime time for

This year's Oscar nominations reinforced the policy of saving the best stuff for December, and the big entertainments are considered summer fare; so this month we get what's left, which at press-time included:

Early April

Cyborg Action speaks louder than dialogue as Jean-Claude Van Damme escorts the title character (Dale Hudson), who carries the antidote to a plague in the world of the future.

Dead Calm — Australia's Philip Noyce directs a suspense drama about a couple (Sam Neill, Nicole Kidman) cruising the Pacific to get over a tragedy, who run into trouble in the form of a psychopath (Billy Zane).

The Dream Team — Who's really crazy — four guys (Michael Keaton, Christopher Lloyd, Peter Boyle and Stephen Furst) on the loose from an asylum or the population of New York they encounter? Howard Zieff directed.

Major League - Tom Berenger,

Charlie Sheen and Corbin Bernsen are Cleveland baseball players who get an unlikely shot at the big time, in a comedy written and directed by David S. Ward.

Mid April

Another Chance — Jesse Vint wrote and directed this romantic comedy about a "womanizer" (Bruce Greenwood) who gets to try again to live a good life. (Does he become a manizer?) Let's hope it's deeper than Skin Deep.

As time passed discotheques striving to keep a crowd sought more advanced means of entertainment. The once-hypnotic beat gave away to wide screens, TV monitors and video, no longer requiring the perfection of a DJ and his vinyl.

Everything changes. Perhaps video will take its place on some dusty shelf some day, just as some of the professional disc jockeys were forced to do when it became popular. But right now, the demand for the live DJ is definitely back and growing.

Welcome to an inside view of the talented men and women who in the next years will expose you to the biggest dance crazes since disco.

COUNTDOWN INTERVIEW

DC: You've been around the business a long time and have worked in all sorts of clubs. In consideration of the many clubs you have worked in, including some that were on their way out, how has that affected you?

HC: Honestly, I've loved the challenge.

DC: With that background what do you think about DJs as professionals?

HC:This town needs a few more professional DJs who know what's going on. Also, if they make money for the club they should be rewarded accordingly.

DC: What talents separate the professional from the non-professional when it comes being a qualified club disc jockey?

HC: It's entertainment. Any entertainer must know the material and be able to read crowd. Each night's program must have a beginning point, a middle and an ending point.

DC: Is there a specific formula to becoming a club DJ?

HC: Not that could actually be taught in a college, although learning to read music has been a definite plus. It helps you understand the structure of dance music, making it easier to blend your mixes smoothly.

But even with the basic knowledge, spinning in a club is much more than knowing your material. I've heard DJs who could line up the beats but had no idea how to make it in-

You learn to be creative by listening to other DJs mix, then by practising and adding your own personal touch. It really has a lot to do with the individual.

DC: When did you first start mixing?

HC: Back in high school. . I was about thirteen. It was back in The Virgin Islands. I used to spend every Saturday in my room splicing songs together with a cassette deck and a pause button.

a pause button.

Back then I wanted to be a radio disc jockey. The radio always had a lot of dead air and that bothered me. I knew the music could be put together better and I knew I could do it.

DC: And did the recognition of a radio disc jockey appeal to you?

HC: NO! I just never liked the way radio disc jockeys played music. I knew I could do what they were doing and do it better by doing my own thing.

I didn't got into this business for the recognition. I like playing music and at the time.

I didn't get into this business for the recognition. I like playing music and at the time it was an alternative to what music listeners were used to.

DC: Do professional club disc jockeys in Phoenix deserve recognition?

HC: If they are qualified, yes. But Phoenix is very backwards compared to L.A., San

Francisco or New York. Some Phoenix club owners think just anyone is capable of operating a sound booth. This is not true. But then again some of the equipment in these sound booths is equivalent to that of someone's stereo in their living room. Some forget that the key to our business is entertaining people.

DC: If the key to the Phoenix club scene is in the hands of the club owners, then your interview should have some positive input. Is there anything else you would like to add?

HC: Yes, I would like to remind DJs that the days to dance (to the live DJ). back. And they should take the opportunity you are giving us to express themselves seriously.

Next month we go to the DJ of one of our popular women's bars where the usage of DJs started more recently, but where they were quick to find some real talent and establish some new ideas directed to their clientele.





Moreno is in San Francisco to receiv a tribute and Life Achievement Award from Northern California Women in Film and Television. She has just finished shooting a *Miami Vice* episode in which she plays a congresswoman and she's going home the next day to begin acting classes with the legendary Stella Adler. "I hear she's not nice to women," she told the tribute audience the night before; "especially goodlooking women."

At 57, Moreno looks great. One of her upcoming projects is an exercise video with an original salsa score, to show that "you don't have to turn into an old person. You can get old without being decrepit." It helps keep her fit that she's not afraid to try new things — or at least tries new things, even if she is afraid. "I'm scared to death," she confides about the acting lessons, "but I want to do it. I think it'll stretch me."

What has she got to lose, being the only female performer to win all four — an Oscar (West Side Story), a Tony (The Ritz), a Grammy (The Electric Company soundtrack) and two Emmys (The Muppet Show and The Rockford Files)? "I'm opting for brilliance," she declares of her acting goal after trying a few higher-toned ways of ex-

"I was brilliant once," she adds, referring to her performance as Serafina in Tennesee Williams' The Rose Tattoo, which she did in Chicago in 1968 and New Haven in



1977. "The part's an actress-abuser," she says, "but I've got one more in me."

Another role Moreno would love to repeat is that of Googie Gomez in Terrence McNally's *The Ritz*. "My daughter rented the video a couple of months ago," she says. "I told her I'd watch ten minutes of it and I saw the whole thing... This is one of the greatest, most clorful losers on earth." While she doesn't minimize McNally's playwriting skills, she wants it known that she invented the character of the extreme Latina stereotype with far more ego than talent, who blames everyone else for her failure in show business.

"At a party during the filming of *West Side Story* I was singing 'Everything's Coming Up Roses' as Googie," Moreno says. "Terry was there and loved it, and wrote a play around it." *The Ritz* is set in a gay bathhouse where Googie is performing, as Bette Midler did at the Continental Baths. But unlike Bette, who has practically disowned that period of her life since the AIDS epidemic hit, Moreno — though not insensitive about AIDS; she's lost as many friends as the rest of us — doesn't feel the need to throw the baby out with the bathhouse water.

"Some of the lines hurt," she points out, noting especially one that extols the activities at the Ritz: "We've got a mightclub, movies, TV, swimming pool, steam room, sauna, massage table, discotheque, bridge amateur night and *free blood tests every Wednesday.*" It used to get a laugh in the theater, she says, but now. . .

"One thing gays have always done with great elan," Moreno notes, "is to laugh at areas of their lives." In that regard she compares us to Jews and blacks: "The humor comes from adversity."

She had one of the best times of her life last year, she says, entertaining on a gay cruise ship. "Wayland Flowers was there too. I think it was one of the last things he did." She also does her show in nightclubs and concert halls, and really loves playing pops concerts with symphony orchestras.

Born in Puerto Rico, Moreno moved to New York with her mother at the age of five and made her Broadway debut at 13, appearing with Eli Wallach in *Skydrift*. Four years later she was in Hollywood, hearing Louis B. Mayer suggest changing her name from Rosa Dolores Alveria to "Teena Marina"; Rita Morena was a compromise.

Through the 1950s Moreno was used by the movies as an all-purpose ethnic, one of what George Bush sees as "little brown ones." She was Tahitian in *Pagan Love Song*, Siamese in *The King and I*, Native American in various westerns, and so on through *The Fabulous Senorita*, *Latin Lovers*, *Jivaro* and more than a dozen other before her breakthrough role as Anita in *West Side Story*.

Even that film, which remains her favorite, had its problems. She still laughs at the "ridiculous" accent she had to assume for the part, and the uniform makeup imposed on the Puerto Rican characters. "We are not all the same color," she says. "I was afraid to argue, but I did anyway." She got nowhere, even though director Robert Wise "is a good liberal. He voted for Dukakis."

An attempt to turn her *Ritz* character into a television series, *The Rita Moreno Show*, never got past the pilot stage in 1978. "I don't know that a weekly Googie Gomez is bearable," she says in retrospect.

Last November she played an aging actress (based in part — "the way her mind worked" — on Joan Crawford) making a comeback in *The Closed Set*, part of the "Tales from the Hollywood Hills" anthology on PBS. "A woman directed that — Mollie Miller," Moreno says. "I was so glad."

Throughout the years she has made frequent television and stage appearances in both musical and dramatic roles. Her fans never know where to look for her. Being so diverse has its downside, Moreno admits. "I could have been a bigger star if I'd concentrated more in one area." Still she says she's happy, with her husband of 24 years and their 22-year-old daughter, and with her career, which is taking her in even more directions this year.

Most immediately there's *B.L. Stryker*, the Burt Reynolds element of ABC's *Monday Mystery Movie* series. Moreno plays his ex-wife; he's one of her four exes. She's presently married to Abe Vigoda, but there's still a spark between her and Reynolds, who she says keeps everyone in hysterics on the

Moreno is also set to film *The Frances Sandoval Story* for CBS. It's about the Chicago woman who started "Mothers Against Gangs" after her son was killed. "She's Latina, she's bright and she's political," says Moreno, who is involved in the production end in addition to starring. She's decided to take *el toro* by the horns to create more and better roles for Hispanic actors.

Still in the fundraising stage with hopes to go into production this year is *Hearts on Fire*, about a miners' strike in Silver City. New Mexico, and the 1953 film, *Salt of the Earth*, that was made about it by blacklisted director Paul Jarrico. Moreno is coexecutive producer with the project's originator, Marine Dominguez, and will star in it with Edward James Olmos and Ed Asner

While she has no specific project in mind, Moreno's greatest hope is for a Tweeries that would portray an upscale Latin family, a la The Cosby Show — perhaps a modern "Ricky Ricarado" in I Love Lucia.

Moreno thinks her frequent talk show appearances, speaking in unaccented English, have helped her escape stereotyping to some extent. On the other hand, she still speaks her first language and is disappointed that she's never been asked to appear in a Spanish-language film. Pedro Almodovar, are you reading this?

Moreno was into nontraditional casting before it became fashionable, telling her agent, "If you see a great part, but it's for a man and he's 30 years old, as long as it's a great part, suggest me for it."

She could probably do it without rewriting. After all, didn't Googie play "one of those Trapp kids" in *The Sound of Music*?


