PHOENIX — On Saturday and Sunday, April 1st and 2nd over thirty organizations and businesses and twenty-five performers and performing groups from Phoenix and Tucson gathered together to participate in "AIDS Fair '89", a fundraising event benefiting people with AIDS.

An estimated 2,000 people wandered through the grounds at Durangos and Flex Complex during the two days buying mer-

chandise, joining in on games, imbibing at the bar, dunking their friends and the notorious of the community in the tank, touring the facilities and generally socializing. Throughout the weekend the performers took their turns on the stage providing all sorts of entertainment.

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Helms kills Federal AZT subsidy bill

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Senator Jesse Helms (R-NC) killed legislation that would have extended by six months the federal government's funding program for AZT (Retrovir) for low-income individuals. The move comes as two states — Georgia and Kansas — have exhausted their AZT grants, with funding in several more states expected to expire in the upcoming weeks.

Approximately 7,000 people in the United States are receiving government assistance under the AZT subsidy program. AZT — which costs about \$8,000 a year at full dose — is the only government-approved drug for directly fighting AIDS.

Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF) lobbyists said the bill would not have allocated additional funds for AZT, but

would have given the government time to reprogram already existing funds into federal AZT subsidies. For example, funds from states with surplus money could be moved into states whose funds have expired, or additional monies could be located within the Public Health Service to subsidize AZT.

Majority Leader George Mitchell (D-Maine), who schedules legislation in the Senate, had stipulated the bill would be brought onto the floor only if Senators could agree not to add amendments or to set a time limit for debate of amendments.

Legislative insiders on Capitol Hill said Helms, along with Senators William Armstrong (R-Colorado) and Don Nickles (R-

ACT UP targets New York City Hall

NEW YORK — More than three thousand members of ACT UP/New York blocked Manhattan streets and disrupted City Hall business March 28, protesting alleged city inaction on AIDS issues.

Before the two-and-one-half hour seige ended, 190 demonstrators were arrested and the Eastbound lanes of the Broklyn Bridge were briefly closed.

The protest was the largest action in the history of the nationwide ACT UP phenomenon, bringing out double the number of protestors that shut down the Food and Drug Administration in Rockville, Maryland last October.

ACT UP spokespersons said activists are angry over Mayor Ed Koch's "blatant negligence, disregard and mismanagement

in dealing with AIDS."

The group criticized the city for "overcrowded hospitals, lack of baseline healthcare, lack of treatment assessment clinics, lack of beds for homeless people with AIDS...and a myriad of other negligences."

"As the first and hardest hit city regarding the AIDS crisis, New York represents the future of every city in America," said Alan Klein, a spokesman for the ACT UP Actions Committee.

Literature circulated to passers-by during the demonstration charged that New York "spends only one half of one percent of its budget on AIDS," that the "health

department cuts costs by cutting estimates of people infected with HIV," and that the city "owns thousands of empty apartments while 5,000 people with AIDS live on the streets"

"You've got blood on you hands, Ed Koch," screamed one flyer.

The protest had been planned for months and was carried live by the Cable News Network and local TV.

Streets on all sides of City Hall were blocked in nine separate instances of civil disobedience as activists sat down and joined hands. New York police were often as irritated with journalists as with demonstrators, since more than 50 photographers accompanied each group of 15 activists into the street.

ACT UP members charged police with using excessive force, and chanted, "The whole world is watching. Shame, shame, shame."

In one incident, four police officers repeatedly picked up activist Peter Staley by his four limbs and then dropped him back on the sidewalk on his back.

Activists were also more aggressive than in the past, although they opted for psychological rather than physical abuse. Continuing an increasingly present theme in New York, ACT UP members charged that Mayor Koch has moved slowly on AIDS issues because he is a closeted homosexual atraid of appearing too gay-supportive.

Author Larry Kramer helped produce a series of posters reprinting a New York Newsday cover on which Koch was quoted as saying, "I'm heterosexual." An added caption on Kramer's poster read, "And I'm Marilyn Monroe." Other posters added Barbra Streisand, Carmen Miranda and other gay icons.

Activists also printed 4,000 convincing but phony front pages of the *New York Times* with such headlines as "Koch Fucks Up Again" and "Thousands of New Yorkers May Be Dying in the Streets."

More than 10,000 New Yorkers have died from AIDS in the last nine years.

Conviction overturned because of AIDS prejudice

NEW YORK — The Maryland Court of Appeals ruled last month that a criminal defendant was denied a fair trial because court officers suggested to the jury that he had AIDS by wearing rubber gloves during his trial. Holding that "AIDS prevails in a climate of fear," the unanimous court wrote that "it is not far-fetched that the jury, observing the gloves, thought it better...that [the defendant] be withdrawn from public circulation..."

According to William B. Rubenstein, Staff Counsel to the American Civil Liberties Union's AIDS Project which filed a brief on Wiggin's behalf, this is the first time

a criminal conviction has been overturned because of AIDS prejudice. "HIV infected criminal defendants have been excluded from the courtroom, handled with rubber gloves, and even shackled to their seats," said Rubenstein. "We hope this decision will begin to send a message to courts throughout the country that such hysterical measures will no longer be tolerated."

The defendant, Bernard Wiggins, had been convicted by a Prince George's County (Maryland) trial court of felony murder, robbery with a deadly weapon and felony theft. During Wiggins's trial, the court officers asked the judge's permission to wear rubber gloves because of their fear of contracting AIDS from the defendant, who was suspected to be HIV-infected. The judge permitted the officers to wear the gloves over the objection of Wiggins's attorney and without making any findings concerning the risk of HIV being transmitted to the court officers even if the defendant were infected.

The American Civil Liberties Union's AIDS Project, the ACLU of the National Capital Area, the ACLU of Maryland and the American Public Health Association, filed a brief on Wiggins's behalf when the conviction was appealed. The organizations argued that there is no medically indicated reason for courtroom personnel to wear gloves or other protective garb when handling HIV-infected criminal defendants. The groups also argued that because of societal fear of AIDS and prejudice against people with AIDS, the use of such gloves created a strong liklihood that Wiggins was denied his constitutional right to a fair trial.

An intermediate appellate court agreed

An intermediate appellate court agreed with the first ACLU and APHA position, writing that "The wearing of gloves by courtroom security personnel is wholly inconsistent with the current theories concerning AIDS transmission." However, the in-

termediate court was "not persuaded that the trial judge's cautious actions require reversal." By contrast, the Court of Appeals found that "the wearing of gloves, without a sound basis shown for doing so, undermined the fairness of the fact-finding process and diluted the principle that guilt is to be established by probative evidence beyond a reasonable doubt."

The the Court of Appeals, Maryland's highest court, vacated the defendant's conviction and sent the case back to the lower

courts. The state will now have to decide whether to appeal the court's decision to the United States Supreme Court or to try Wig-

'We are pleased that the Court of Appeals has acted to protect the rights of people with AIDS," said Elizabeth Symonds, a Staff Attorney with the ACLU of the National Capital Area, who authored the ACLU/APNA brief. Maryland judges will now have to ensure that their courtrooms are free of medically unwarranted reactions to AIDS, like rubber gloves, or they run the risk of having their verdicts overturned."

Oklahoma), refused to agree to the stipulations, thus preventing the bill from being considered by the Senate.

"When we say Jesse Helms is 'King of Killer Amendments', we really mean killer," said Robert Bray, HRCF communications director. "More people are going to get sick and die faster because they cannot afford life-prolonging drug treatments. It was not a good day in Washington for affordable health care."

Last September, Congress authorized \$15 million to continue the program until March 31, 1989. The new bill would have extended the subsidy program through September 30, 1989. The program was originally created in spring of 1987 when AZT was first licensed. Congress adjourned for two weeks and did not reconvene until April 4, after the program had ended.

The legislation was introduced into the Senate by Ted Kennedy (D-Mass.), who rallied wide-spread, bi-partisan support for the bill. Reports indicated the Department of Health and Human Services had endorsed continuation of the program.

The AZT subsidy bill and other health care financing legislation have been identified as top legislative priorities by the Human Rights Campaign Fund, the largest AIDS and gay and lesbian civil rights political organization in the country.

HRCF furiously lobbied for passage of the bill before the current program expired.

Among other actions, HRCF sent 3,300 mailgrams to Capitol Hill, urging virtually every Senator to vote for the legislation

"The subsidy bill was the best short-

term solution," said Steve Smith, HRCF. lobbyist. "It would have bought more time for patients to continue getting AZT witho spending themselves into poverty.

HRCF lobbyists remain optimistic that some form of government subsidy can be worked out in the near future, despite interference from Helms.

'We will look for alternative opportunities to help low-income individuals pay for AZT," said Smith. "The objective for us is affordable health care for all Americans, including people with AIDS."

HRCF suggests people contact their senators and representatives and urge their support of future federal AZT subsidies. Individuals may send Congress a preauthorized mailgram through HRCF's Speak Out program by calling HRCF's Field Division at 202-628-4160.

Anti-gay lyrics bump heavy metal band from AIDS benefit by Cliff O'Neill

NEW YORK — Popular heavy metal band Guns 'N Roses was bumped March 14 from the roster of bands set to appear at a June AIDS fundriaser due to the antigay lyrics of a song on one of their two currently popular albums.

Guns 'N Roses is one of the most popular rock bands in the nation today, with their first two albums Appetite For Destruction and G'NR Lies, both on the national Top 10 album charts, reporting sales of over 9 million units. In February, New York AIDS service group Gay Men's Health Crisis (GMHC) announced that the recordbreaking band was the first group to agree to appear at their June 8 "Rock and a Hard Place" fundraiser at Radio City Music Hall, the nation's first major hard rock AIDS

However, in December, shortly after the release of the band's second album, Lies, The Western Express reported that one song on the album, "One In A Million", featured the following lyrics:

"Immigrants and faggots/ They make no sense to me/ They come to our country/ And think they'll do as they please/ Like start some mini-Iran/ Or spread some fuck-ing disease."

Shortly after the February announcement of the band's headlining the GMHC fundraiser, The Western Express again contacted Craig Davidson, executive director of the New York-based Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation regarding the

"I think we should contact GMHC about this," stated Davidson last month. "People need to learn that they can't be 'good on AIDS' but 'bad on gay (issues).'

Shortly thereafter, Davidson contacted several members of the GMHC board and GHMC Executive Director Richard Dunn and informed them of the songs lyrics.

"I told them I wouldn't trash GMHC hey didn't pull the band, but I wanted

to let them know that if people found out about this (the lyrics), they could wind up hearing about it in the future.'

After three weeks of internal meetings, GMHC made the announcement that the band would not be appearing at the benefit.

"It wasn't until after they had accepted our invitation that these lyrics came to our attention," stated GMHC spokesperson Corissa Cunningham. "We decided it was not appropriate that they appear and we withdrew our invitation.'

When asked if GMHC had heard anything about the lyrics of the song from anyone other than GLAAD, Cunningham stated. "As you can imagine from the makeup of the staff here, there aren't a lot of people that listen to heavy metal music. This had to be brought to our attention by

When contacted in Los Angeles, Geffen Records, the band's label, referred this reporter to a Geffen publicity agent Lori

Earle who would not comment beyond reading a press release which contained a quote attributed to an unnamed band spokesperson.

"Unfortunately, the GMHC committee has chosen to reject the band's offer to appear based only on the content of one of their songs," the unattributed quote said. "Guns 'N Roses still wishes GMHC every success in their event."

When asked what band member or band spokesperson made the statement,

Earle refused further comment.

To date, neither Guns 'N Roses, nor Geffen Records, a major player in several AIDS charity efforts, have made any statements nor offered any apology for the lyrics to "One In A Million".

GMHC's Cunningham asserted that although Guns 'N Roses was the first group to sign on to the benefit, they are not the only one. An updated list of rock bands scheduled to appear at the June 8 fundraiser is scheduled to be released later this week.

"As far as I can see," stated GLAAD's Davidson, "I spared them a lot of heartache. It's not like they were made to feel a lot of pressure to fire Guns 'N Roses, that's just the result."

distributing fliers promoting "peace of mind" by taking an "affordable" \$50.00 test and offering a picture I.D. card to prove that the cardholder is HIV-negative.

Because the local health department was offering free HIV testing and because I.D. cards are not an effective AIDS reduction tool. Caplan wrote letters to various government officials demanding an investigation of ACT. I.D. cards are misleading and counter productive because they are good only for the moment the blood is taken. It can take up to fourteen months after infection for HIV antibodies to show up on the test.

As a result of his activism, Caplan was sued by ACT for \$6.5 million in U.S. District Court. National Gay Rights Advocates (NGRA) has agreed to defend Caplan and on Friday, March 31, 1989 fil-

ed a Motion for Summary Judgement, requesting that the court dismiss the suit.

"We are asking the court to protect Mr. Caplan's free speech rights under the First Amendment. While we are in the midst of this epidemic, it is crucial that every one be encouraged to speak out against unscrupulous AIDS profiteers," said Leonard Graff, Legal Director of NGRA.

Mark Lane, an attorney affiliated with Liberty Lobby, an ultra-conservative Washington politiacal group is representing ACT. Lane is also known for his book about the Kennedy assasination, *Rush to Judgement*. Edward Wolf, of Arnold and Porter, is NGRA's co-operating counsel. Arnold and Porter is one of Washington D.C.'s largest and most prestigious law firms.

The court will hear the case on May 19 in Baltimore, Maryland.


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

cially and otherwise, organizations, campaigns and candidates supportive of these goals, as well as engages in other activities to promote Impact's goals.

Proposed regulation restricts medicare coverage for AIDS treatments

SAN FRANCISCO - National Gay Rights Advocates (NGRA) released public comments on March 31 criticizing federal regulations which would prohibit Medicare coverage for drugs granted "Treatment-IND" status by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA). The Treatment-IND Program was established to allow early release of promising drugs to people with life-threatening illnesses before the drugs receive final FDA approval. Some of the most important AIDS-related drugs such as aerosolized pentamidine would be unavailable under the new proposal because they are currently granted Treatment-IND status. NGRA was particularly critical of the proposal because Medicare already funds experimental cancer treatments under its "Group C Cancer Drug" program.

NGRA also criticized language in the proposal implying that, for Medicare purposes, the "safe and effective" use of drugs may be limited to purposes specified in the drug labeling insert. NGRA pointed out that

the FDA itself has repeatedly stated that prescribing drugs for off-label uses is a valuable and widely accepted medical practice.

"Providing coverage for promising but unproven cancer drugs, while proposing to exclude similar drugs for persons with other life-threatening illnesses, has no rational justification, said Cynthia Goldstein, Staff Attorney with NGRA and co-author of the published statements. "Such a policy is legally questionable and inconsistent with the purpose of Medicare."

Attorney Benjamin Schatz, Director of NGRA's AIDS Civil Rights Project and coauthor of the comments remarked that "it is critically important for Medicare to allow physicians discretion in prescribing drugs once they are approved. Some of the most important uses of drugs for HIV disease and other illnesses are not specified in FDA labeling. Recent court decisions indicate that Medicare and other government programs

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are legally required to fund drugs for these

NGRA Executive Director Jean O'Leary, said: "We have fought hard to convince the government to speed the

release of promising treatments for people with AIDS and ARC. We cannot sit back and let Medicare deny these treatments to people on the government's own medical programs."

Gay Mormons approve lesbian Bishop

SALT LAKE CITY — For the first time since the founding of "Mormanism" in 1830, a church claiming its origin from Joseph Smith has ordained a lesbian to the office of Presiding Bishop.

The Restoration Church of Jesus Christ, which serves latter-day saints in the gay and lesbian community, approved the ordination of Leanna R. Anderson, of Sacramento, California at its semi-annual general conference on March 18.

Although Anderson was ordained a biship in 1987, her elevation to Presiding Bishop places her in a position to preside over all other bishops in the Church. Prior to this appointment, she served as First Counselor in the Presidency of the Church.

Bishop Anderson will serve with two counselors, Bishop Douglas B. Madrid, also of Sacramento, and Bishop Charlie E. Morgan, of San Diego. The Presiding Bishopric is responsible for all financial matters, physical facilities, welfare and training of those ordained to the Church's Aaronic Priesthood.

The Restoration Church of Jesus Christ has members and/or organized church units (called "families") throughout Utah, California, Arizona and Texas. It was organized in 1985 in Los Angeles for the purpose of serving the spiritual needs of disenfranchised "Mormons", including those of the lesbian and gay community.

ADHS study shows AIDS awareness in Arizona increasing

PHOENIX — Awareness of the ways which AIDS is transmitted has increased among Arizonans over the past two years, while unrealistic fears about infection with the disease have decreased, according to a recent Knowledge, Attitudes and Beliefs (KAB) study commissioned by the Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS).

The ADHS study was conducted between August 26 and November 18, 1988 by the Tempe marketing and public opinion research firm of O'Neill Associates. A total of 526 adults were randomly surveyed by telephone.

Comparison of the 1988 KAB study data to that of a similar study conducted in early 1987 shows that AIDS awareness among Arizonan's has increased in areas such as recognizing high risk behaviors and

methods of protection against the virus. While the demographic characteristics of the 1987 respondents varied somewhat from those in the most recent study, both studies utilize the same methodology of data collection, and general trends in knowledge and attitudes are comparable.

Respondents to the survey showed a basic understanding that sexual contact with a person with AIDS, sharing needles to inject drugs, having many sexual partners, and having sexual contact with a prostitute are high risk behaviors. At the same time respondents understood that donating blood, attending school or working in an office with a person with AIDS, and eating in a restaurant are very low risk behaviors.

ADHS study shows AIDS awareness increasing

More than one quarter (28%) of the respondents indicated that they have changed their lives in some way because of concern about AIDS. The primary change cited was fewer sexual partners and more caution in casual social contacts. There was also a significant increase in the number of respondents who agreed that the use of condoms during sexual intercourse helped prevent the spread of AIDS (85% in 1988 compared to 70% in 1987). Other findings in the 1988 study include:

• 80% of respondents compared to 69% in 1987 agreed that children with AIDS should be allowed to attend school;

• 84% of respondents compared to 91% in 1987 believed information about AIDS prevention should be taught in schools. Of those in 1988 supporting schoolbased AIDS education, 93% think AIDS education should begin before high school, and 69% believe it should begin in the sixth grade or earlier;

• only 4% of respondents recalled that sex partners of people at high risk for AIDS are also at risk:

• 49% said they would be interested in learning how to avoid AIDS, but only 15% were interested in learning about safer sex practices.

According to Dr. Steven Englender, Assistant Director of the ADHS Division of Disease Prevention, the results of this study will assist public health officials, health educators and community organizations in targeting AIDS information and education in Arizona.

"Data from this study clearly shows us where AIDS education has made an impact, as well as what areas need additional focus," he said. "We are now into our seventh year of responding to the AIDS epidemic and their ccontinues to be great need for educational programs which provide accurate information regarding transmission and methods of prevention.

"Because there is presently no vaccine or cure for AIDS, education remains our most effective means of curbing the epidemic," he noted. Dr. Englender added. "We are pleased to see an increase in several areas of AIDS awareness since 1987, but there are still many topics which need attention."









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
Janus Theatre disbands

"The building won't be ready until June, but we're opening our first event April 21," says Moore. "We've found alternate spaces for most of the events and a few have been postponed until June or later."





ATC Announces Emergency Fundriasing Theatre Group Needs \$972,000

This season will be the last for Arizona Theatre Company unless \$972,000 in donations is raised by June 30. According to George Rosenberg, ATC Interim CEO, "These funds are necessary to provide the cash flow needed to ensure that the Company is able to complete this fiscal year and present the 1990 season. This situation is a direct result of the 1988 debt, which has placed the Company in an untenable cashshort position."

After six years of debt-free operation, ATC finished last year's season \$658,000 in

the red. During that time it has been the nation's only professional resident theatre company serving two major metropolitan areas. It was cited by the Reagan White House Committee on the Arts and Humanities for the success of this two-city phenomenon and has served as a model to other aspiring institutions nationwide.

ATC has ranked fifth in the nation among 103 such companies in terms of amount of moneys received from individuals and 10th with respect to corporate contributions. Continued on page 24

* A five-year delay in securing a permanent theatre in Phoenix prevented it from establishing an identifiable presence.

* The 1987 season consisted of three of six plays which were somewhat controversial, resulting in a loss of 700 subscribers.

* A significant decline in contributions attributed to amended tax laws.

What ACT Is Doing

* Ticket sales are up to a record high of 11,244, more than any other performing arts organization in Arizona.

* The budget has been reduced by 10% in this season. Projections for 1989-90 will reduce that another 10%.

What ATC Needs

The ATC Board has adopted a strategy

in which a substantial portion of the money needed would be raised from the business communities of Phoenix and Tucson. 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Without Reservations

With all the brouhaha of the Oscar race occupying all their waking minutes, it seems that the studio moguls forgot about us lowly critics — there was only one screening and that was for Sing, a film that has already opened last Friday. I really like things that sing out (unfortunately the movie didn't), especially when it comes to strong flavors in the culinary arts. Pizzeria Bianco at the Euro-Market, Double Rainbow's Gourmet Grills and Bombay Bazzar's Snack Bar all had tidbits worth singing out loud and clear about, so I have included them under my TidBits below. Back to the movies. I did, however, manage to wrangle a private screening of The Dream Team, and also found time to take in a viewing of The Mighty Quinn, another movie that opened on the same day with Sing. Will I talk about them, too? U Betcha!

TidBits

A few Sundays ago, I was having breakfast at the Euro-Market, the ultimate purveyor for foodoholics, at the corner of Central and Camelback, Before rhapsodizing over a perfectly made (and most reasonably priced) omelet, of which I was the architect (but not the builder), I roamed the aisles ogling all the goodies, my taste buds envisioning the endless, deliciously exotic possibilities. Suddenly, rounding a corner, I spied a new addition to the scene a storybook appearing, wood-burning brickovened, handmade pizza kitchen. Thus, my discovering Pizzeria Bianco was a classic textbok example of the greatly abused word

I had taken home a menu, studied it and made my decisions, and last week I returned with a friend to sample their pies in the flesh, having suffered the agony of anticipation long enough.

The pizza baker was a personable New Yorker — an Italian boy from The Bronx where "they have a bigger 'Little Italy' than

the one in Manhattan." And, if this young man worked there, I'd bet it was a better one, too! Not only was he a pizza maven, but he had a wonderful sense for finding affable combinations of ingredients. After a lengthy discussion, we scrapped the menu in favor of Christos' imaginative masterpieces, for the ones he described sounded even better than the ones on the menu.

The first was not a pizza at all, but a focaccia (a flat bread somewhat similar to a pizza crust) embellished with prosciutto, mild sweet red onions, pistachios, olive oil (his extra-virgin olive oil also contained sun dried tomatoes, garlic, peppers, basil and other mysterious herbs, all floating in a handsome jar), fresh sprigs of red and green basil and some more rosemary on a light, thin crust. This creation ran \$4.34 for an individual size, which was about eight inches across.

The pizza, also an individual portion, had a whole wheat and cornmeal crust (which was practically caramelized), quatro cheeses which included mozzarella, ricotta, Parmesan and Romano, shredded zucchini, a tangle of red onion slivers, fresh tomatoes, that special olive oil and red and green basil, highlighted with little slivers of Greek sausage. I thought the tag of \$5.74 for the same sized pie to be most reasonable.

Another kind of focaccia, a stuffed version called *focaccia del giorno*, is a sand-wich made of a classic Italian flatbread (though of a completely different texture and density than the other, and this one having been baked with rosemary in the crust), filled with basil, green pimento, fresh tomato, oil and vinegar, herbs and spices, and homemade mozzarella. Yes, you read it right. The mozzarella was made Christos, and it was far superior storebought. \$4.99 got us

Everything here was so fresh and clean tasting — all the ingredients sang out loud and clear - and nothing was obscured

an overpowering tomato sauce. If the portions weren't so ample, you might be tempted to call this Pizza Nouvelle.

It's no surprise that Double Rainbow, at Elliot and McClintock in Tempe, makes some mighty fine ice creams. That's what this franchise chain is famous for. The unexpected pleasure of this place, however, came from their Gourmet Grills, where they whip out savory grilled sandwiches with equal aplomb. After a generous cup of nicely piuant homemade Minestrone (\$1.25), I ampled a cheesy (lots of cheddar and Monterey Jack) sandwich loaded with fresh tomatoes and mild green chilies between

golden-browned slices of tangy grilled sourdough bread. My partner also had one of these crunchy/oozy jobs, his weighted down with spicy marinated artichoke hearts and nutty gouda cheese with a sprinkling of herbed oil for added flavor. Both were made for good eaters and come with fresh tortilla chips and a perfectly balanced, chunky salsa (\$2.95 each). My lime flavored Italian soda (\$1.25) was pleasantly tart and natural tasting, and pretty as a picture served in a huge glass frappe dish.

Of course, we couldn't have left without trying their piece de resistance (or Pieces

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

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
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

de resistance, as the case may be, because we tried seven flavors between us. Their ice creams are sold b weight, so any combination so desired may be had.) We both thought that chocolate raspberry swirl was the best, followed closely by rum raisin and coffee bean (intensified with espresso grounds).

There's a *Double Rainbow* of grilled sandwiches and great ice cream awaiting you here — which is much tastier than a old pot of gold any day.

Probably one of the best kept secrets in town is that Bombay Bazaar, at 1841 West Camelback Road, is not just a small specialty deli and grocery, but also has a "snack bar" where they serve vegetarian food of India. I accidentally discovered the eatery part the other day while hunting out a hard to find spice. I found it amazing, for such a tiny space, all the different things that were able to be crammed in. Aside from the Indian foods there are British foods and candies (quite a large selection), Filipino meats and fish (I bought some delicious sausages and marinated pork slices), goat meat, English bangers, incense, cookbooks, musical cassette tapes from India, cooking utensils, health foods, exotic spices and a whole lot more.

They also manage to squeeze in two

tables on which to eat the snacks. Several of these tidbits together makes a very satisfying meal, and *Bombay Bazzar* makes it easy by offering four different combinations. The Deluxe Combo (\$4.50) is the top of the line and it even takes two (paper) plates to handle all the food. Since it includes a sample of everything this kitchen puts out, I decided that would be the way to go.

decided that would be the way to go.

One dish contained a delicate golder fried triangle of pastry stuffed with lightly curried vegetables, a *Samosa*, in addition to a *Bhonda*, curried potatoes dipped in a gram (garbanzo) flour batter and deep fried. It also held six *Pakora*, small crunchy balls of a mixture of spinach, mathi and cilantro that were prepared like the Bhonda. The other plate had a pile of aromatic basmati rice and a pool of dal (spiced puree of lentils), which are normally eaten together There also was a portion of mixed curried vegetables in a tomato base that was strongly flavored without being the least bit hot. Finally, to shovel up food (there were forks provided, however) and soak up the curry, there was a wedge of chapait, a soft Indian bread, somewhat like a pita. A bottle of guava juice was delightfully cool and soothing.

With individual items starting at \$1.50 and most of the other combinations costing a measly \$2.50, if you don't mind eating in a grocery store, *Bombay Bazzar* is a deliciously fun experience.

SING


First, let me get this straight. Sing, as used here, is not a verb, as in "to sing" (or a follow up to Tap), but rather a noun, as in "a Sing" (oh, pardon me, I meant The Sing — the high school Sing competition that, according to this film, is the crowning achievement of the high school years of every teenager in Brooklyn). Speaking of high schools, some students of that institute of higher learning might even find some appeal in this movie — especially the freshmen — but the bulk of its audience will undoubtedly come from an even younger group. For those of us some years beyond puberty, paying five and a half bucks to sit through this would be more like a sting. This film's only redeeming qualities are evident in the rousing song "Total Concentration", sung by the very talented Patti LaBelle and the two final musical numbers, "Life Ain't Worth Living (When You're Dead)" and "(Everybody's Gotta) Face The Music", which are cleverly writen, well choreographed, and employ wildly imaginative costumes and sets. Of course the movie's star, handsome Peter Dobson, has a major part in the latter one, and, unfortunately, dancing, singing and acting are his three strongest weaknesses.

The minuscule bit of plot was inconsequential, the characterizations were flat and the dialogue was rife with lines too cliche to bear repeating even one more time. With all this going for it, *Sing* will probably achieve cult status within the week!

THE MIGHTY QUINN

If one were to examine the individual dots of a Seurat painting there would be little to impress — but stand back and view the dots as a whole entity and *voila*, there is something quite beautiful. In *The Mighty Quinn* it is rather easy to pick at the various threads that form the fabric and thus tear it apart without appreciating it as an entity. But I say "why bother". Here we have an

easy film to enjoy if we just let ourselves do it. It has a little comedy and a little suspense (but not really a whole lot of either one), quality photography of lovely tropical scenery, interesting music (including the hilarious song "I Had The Blues" as well as a typical island-type ditty "The Mighty Quinn" and a group of salty, wonderfully diverse, well developed black characters



(strangely, the whites are all as animated as oatmeal — although not all as wholesome). All that is fine and well, but this film's strength is its uninhibited look at the fascinating, colorful native Jamaican lifestyle. Even their everyday talk is melodic and rhythmic, and their humor is British dry. When asked "Do you ever let down your guard, Mr. Quinn?" he replies with a twinkle in his eye "Coupla weeks ago I shayed off my mustache"

shaved off my mustache."

Here, everything centers around Police
Chief Quinn, a perfect character to be
played by Denzel Washington, and his
childhood friend (and current island rogue)
Maubee (Robert Townsend). Esther Rolle
does a great job as the old wheelchair-bound

witch who is continually casting wicked spells on everyone, with varying degrees of success. I really don't think her powers impressed Maubee very much because when Quinn asks him what would happen if he crossed the witch, he answers, with a big grin "I get 'the hex', my dick fall off, and I wake up dead!" Island talk can be quite pungent, to say the least.

The Mighty Quinn is a different kind of film — but that fact alone certainly doesn't make it a good one. Of course, on the other hand, that at least insures that it isn't going to be a flat out dull one. I mean, check out the competition. If Fletch Lives, then Quinn soars!


THE DREAM TEAM

From the very moment of its inception, The Dream Team team (crew and cast) had to tread a very thin line. I mean, if you're going to make a comedy based on four people with mental diseases, you really have your work cut out for you. Go too far off the mark in any direction, and you're either going to have a gigantic flop or gargantuan flack. Well, kudos to the writers, the director and the actors. You can laugh at this one (and you will — many times) with no remorse.

The trickiest part, the screenplay, which is the basis of it all, comes from the word processors fo the neophyte team of Jon Cnnlly and David Loucka. These men did

something quite clever, which makes the comedy work in the face of a possible tragedy. They made caricatures out of their psychotic characters, in effect, taking them out of the seriousness of the deranged and into the superficiality of "loonies" (sort of like Looney Tunes, but without having to put their personalities into the bodies of animals drawn on a series of cells). Director Howard Zieff (House Calls, Private Benjamin) obviously kept this principle in mind throughout the entire film — especially when working with the four priciple actors — to make this an adventure comedy with







Betrayals by Arthur Lazere



Maestro Andrew Meltzer

Maestro Andrew Meltzer was, until his death from AIDS-related causes last year, the resident conductor of the San Francisco Opera Orchestra. Meltzer died, as he had lived, with honesty and courage.

When he was profiled in this column in 1985, Meltzer was the only conductor of a major opera or symphony orchestra who was openly gay.


Now there are none.

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Despite a best-selling biography that analyzes his homosexuality in depth, Leornard Bernstein has never publicly acknowledged that he is gay. Despite statements in published articles about his homosexuality, neither has James Levine of the Metropolitan Opera ever acknowledged it for the record. There are others as well - famous, acomplished conductors known by many to be gay, but fearfully dissembling before the imagined wrath of opera symphony boards of directors.


This column has never been a place where closet doors were pried open or where private lives were subjected to public revelation against the subject's will. But the private lives of Leonard Bernstein and James Levine are decidedly not private. The public knows they are gay and the public knows that they know that their homosexuality is public knowledge. Under thsoe circumstances, the continuing failure to be honest about it tacitly accepts a judgement that there is something wrong with being gay. Denial, even passive denial, buys into the stigma. Denial such as Bernstein's or Levine's does a disservice to all gay people and underestimates the intelligence of the

broader audience.

Andy Meltzer experienced blatant homophobia directed at him during his career. His response was not to deny, but to affirm.

"I couldn't live with not being who I was," he said, "I didn't want it to be an issue. The easiest way to erase it from being an issue was to make it a nonissue by saying, 'Yes, I'm gay'. I don't ever have to worry about it interfering with me professionally again because *there it is*.

"There is a member of the orchestra who said to me, 'I can't believe how you can be political. Music is the only thing in my life.' I said, 'Music is the only thing in your life until all of a sudden you lose your job because you're gay and you can't make music anymore.'"

After diagnosis, Meltzer went public about his illness in a *People* magazine article. He did so despite resistance from his boss, Terry McEwen, then general director of the San Francisco Opera. Metlzer believed about AIDS what he believed about being gay, that to deny the truth is to capitualte to the stigma. By going public, he thought he could help change misguided attitudes about the disease.

Meltzer suffered through pneumocystis carinii penumonia and other AIDS related conditions. Neuropathy caused him great pain in his legs and feet. Nonetheless, with dogged determinatin, he came back for a final triumph. He conducted a brilliant *La Traviata* in 1987 for which he received glowing reviews, audience ovations, and sold-out houses.

Last September there was a memorial recital for Meltzer. Between arias, two speakers talked of his life and accomplishments. One, Christine Bullin, who worked with Meltzer at the San Francisco Opera Center, spoke of his work training young singers.

The other who spoke, Matthew Epstein, is a well known opera expert and consultant. Epstein is himself openly gay and said in a 1984 *Advocate* interview, "The sadness about the musical world for me is that so few of the homosexual element are willing to stand up and be counted."

In his edlogy, though, Epstein failed to mention in any way that Andrew Meltzer was gay, a sad omission and a betrayal of Meltzer's courage and integrity.

Meltzer would not have approved. But he would have loved the beautiful singing, because, as the speaker said, that's what his life was about.

In 1982, this column took a look at the Miller Brewing Company, a major factor in the beer market, headquartered in Milwaukee. At that time no openly gay employees were found at Miller's, but two closeted employees were willing to tell their stories.

One, a middle management staff person, knowing all along that he was gay, had married and fathered children to project the straight image he felt was necessary to protect his career. The other, a blue collar supervisor, had been falsely accused of sexually harrassing another employee. He fought the charges, which were subsequently dropped, but he carried a deep resentment of management's initial failure to support his position.

Despite Wisconsin's statewide gay rights law, Miller, at that time, had no articulated policy of nondiscrimination on the basis of sexual orientation. Twice, this column focused attention on the lack of such a policy.

In July, 1983, Alan Easton, a Miller vice president, called to say that Miller was

adopting a nondiscrimination policy, company-wide, which would include locations outside of Wisconsin. Easton said that materials on the subject would be added to company training programs.

In recognition of Miller's enlightened new policy, the National Association of Business Councils, a lesbian/gay organization, presented Miller's with an award. A representative of the company traveled to Los Angeles to receive the honor at an NABC dinner.

A recent call to Miller's uncovered a major disappointment. Steve Forsythe, speaking for the company, indicated that a nondiscrimination policy was posted once, at one location, for an eighteen month period. He said that sexual orientation is "mentioned" in EEO training at Miller's plants, but, when asked if there were printed materials covering this "mention", he sidestepped the question.

According to Forsythe, there is no written policy of nondiscrimination on the basis of sexual orientation at Millers. It is not mentioned in the company's EEO policy. It is not in the employee handbook. It is not in corporate training programs.

Like Coors, Miller's has tried to purchase goodwill by making contributions to community organizations. The Cream City Foundation, a Milwaukee lesbian/gay philanthropic organization, and the Gay World Series have been funded at the corporate level. Local Miller distributors around the country have contributed to other groups.

In 1985, a Miller's employee, John Cowles, acted as liaison between Miller's and the Gay World Series. The resulting publicity thrust Cowles into a high profile as a gay man at the company. "I didn't hide anything at work," Cowles says, "I still don't raise up a purple flag, but everybody knows what's going on... Everybody likes me. If people didn't like me, I'm sure it wouldn't be as good."

Cowles says he has experienced no negataive repercussions due to being upfront. He even takes his lover to company functions. "I'm probably unique in that respect," he says, "Most are lower keyed. I would be, to, except for the World Series." Cowles is an awarad winning, senior research chemist, a management level employee.

Citing Wisconsin's law, Forsythe says company attorneys believe a company policy is not legally necessary, since the company obeys the law. He adds that company attorneys interpret "sex" in the EEO policy as inclusive of sexual orientation.

"They are clearly misinformed," says civil rights attorney Leonard Graff, "The courts have considered and ruled on the saue that the term 'sex' does not offer protection from sexual orientation discrimination."

Most employees are not protected by a position of strength such as that of John Cowles. The commonplace discrimination that average gays and lesbians suffer in the workplace can only be stopped when companies are willing to stop weaseling out of responsibility with legal rationalizations. If company policy is not to discriminate, that must be made clear, up and down the chain of command, from the executive suites to the rank-and-file.

Progressive, people-oriented companies add sexual orientation to their EEO policy, publish the policy in their employee handbooks, and, through training programs, make it clear to all the the company *means* it

Miller Brewing has betrayed the lesbian and gay community which, in good faith, accepted the company's promise of six years ago. Until the company fulfills its commitment, let's pass on the High Life, Lite, and Genuine Draft.
