Activists seize stage at **International AIDS Conference**

MONTREAL, CANADA - To their own astonishment and to the cheers of conference participants, more than 300 members of ACT UP/New York, AIDS Action Now (Toronto), and Reaction SIDA (Montreal) marched into the Palais Des Congres, commandeered the escalators, entered the main conference site, took over the stage, demanded that the microphones be turned on, and, in the name of persons with AIDS, "officially" opened the Fifth International Conference on AIDS June 4 in Montreal, Quebec.

They remained on stage for nearly an hour, chanting such things as "History will recall, the conference did nothing at all," "Not victims, not patients, but people living with AIDS", "No more business as usual", "Open the borders", and "None of us has time to wait; get off your butts and demonstrate.'

Montreal and Royal Canadian Mounted

Police seemed unprepared for the rowdy, U.S.-style activism and — to the surprise of demonstrators - took no action at all.

Three hours later, activists were again given free run of the huge conference site as they relentlessly heckled Canadian Prime Minister Brian Mulroney throughout his 20-minute address to the conference. It was Mulroney's first major statement on AIDS.

When activists first appeared on the scene, up to half of the thousands of persons awaiting the opening ceremonies clapped and cheered — in response to posters and banners stating that governments aren't doing enough about AIDS and that people with AIDS are fighting back.

After half an hour of chanting and stomping by the demonstrators, Toronto activist Tim McCaskell took the main microphone and announced, "On behalf of

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Landmark domestic partners legislation signed into law

SAN FRANCISCO — San Francisco Mayor Art Agnos signed into law on June 5 precedent-setting legislation ending official discrimination based on marital status. The Mayor's action followed a unanimous vote of approval by the Board of Supervisors, San Francisco's city-county legislative body.

Supervisor Harry G. Britt, President of the Board of Supervisors and author of the law, said that "San Francisco has once again set the pace for the nation. This law is about human rights as much as it is about anything else. No one in this country should be treated as a second-class citizen, whether it be because of their race, their religion, their beliefs, or their marital status. We have sent a clear signal that all of us have the right to love whom we will."

The San Francisco law is the first in

the nation to permit official registration of "domestic partnerships" at the County Clerk's office in a process similar to that used in applications for marriage licenses. According to the law, domestic partners are "two people who have chosen to share one another's lives in an intimate and committed relationship of mutual caring." In practice, the law will accord legal recognition to unmarried heterosexual and homosexual couples.

The new law will have immediate and tangible benefits for lesbian, gay and other unmarried couples. For example, both public and private hospitals in San Francisco will be required to accord domestic partners the same visitation rights now enjoyed by married spouses.

Living Memorial for PWAs planted

PHOENIX - The Phoenix Shanti Group and the Tonto National Forest recently arranged for trees to be planted in memory of those who have died from AIDS. The trees were planted in the Seven Springs area Northeast of Carefree on Saturday, June 10, 1989 by a group of 38 fourth through sixth grade students from Desert Springs Elementary School in Scottsdale, Shanti staff members and volunteers, as well as by friends and loved ones of those who died.

As part of a year-long effort by the students, headed by teacher Carmel Valianti-Smith, to increase general awareness of environmental issues, the project serves to honor those friends and loved ones who have passed away due to complications from AIDS as a living memorial, as well as contributing to the well-being of the planet. The trees, donated by Mountain States Nursery, helped to reforest an area of the Tonto National Forest damaged by a man-caused fire.

The site was dedicated to the memory of those Shanti clients that had passed away from AIDS complications by President and CEO of the Phoenix Shanti Group, Randy Gorbette, followed by a silent moment of reflection and meditation. Jim Payne, Deputy Director of Public Relations for the Tonto National Forest was on hand to thank everyone for attending as well as explaining the importance of the event, both from an ecological and a social standpoint.

names of over 70 Shanti clients were then read by eight volunteers who had worked with clients on a one-to-one basis. Valianti-Smith dedicated one of the trees in memory of a close friend who had died from AIDS, and Deputy Payne dedicated a tree in memory of a family member who had recently passed away from AIDS complications. The trees, m verdes indigenous to the area, were planted along a hilltop by the students and

A closing ceremony followed, in which Vice President of Marketing for Phoenix Shanti, H. Dean Jones, thanked the attendees and those who donated time and effort to make this living memorial a reality. Deputy Payne informed the group that the Tonto National Forest had given their permission for a plaque to be placed at the site dedicating the area to the memory of those whose names had been read.

Another tree planting has been planned for November of 1989. The planting will be open to all AIDS agencies, their staff and clients, and anyone wishing to plant a tree in memory of a friend or loved one who has died from AIDS. Those wishing to be in-

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persons living with AIDS in Canada and around the world, I would like to officially open the Fifth International Conference On AIDS."

He received a standing ovation from approximately 40 percent of the attendees.

The angry invasion reached its high note when McCaskell, referring to the disruption, declared, "This conference has now changed international AIDS conferences forever."

A lengthy "Manifesto of Montreal" was then read in both French and English. Activists demanded, among other things, reclasification of HIV disease as a chronic, manageable condition; enactment of an international code of rights to preserve the humanity of people with HIV disease; development of an international data bank of AIDS information; an end to placebo drug trials; support for the rights of women to control their bodies; medical aid to poor nations; and worldwide diversion of military spending to health-related projects.

By the time activists voluntarily vacated the stage and conference planners regained control of the room, the opening ceremonies were running two hours behind schedule.

The evening's keynote speech was given by President Kenneth Kaunda of Zambia, who said he had lost his fifth-born son to AIDS and had decided not to shy away from speaking publicly about it. Kaunda received a standing ovation when he called for an end to "the wanton destruction of ourselves" with nuclear weapons and demanded that military money be diverted to health care.

to health care.

Fate, Kaunda said, has shown that
AIDS can destory us without any expenditure whatsoever of rubles and dollars.

On a day when the Chinese army slaughtered thousands, 800 died in a Soviet train crash, and Poland held free elections, the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation evening news devoted several minutes to the anger of the AIDS activists in Montreal. "It wasn't the way the Fifth International Conference On AIDS was supposed to begin at all," began the CBC reporter.

The legislation also calls for the development, within three months, of a plan under which the city health insurance coverage may be extended to the domestic partners of city employees. The same task force which is to develope the health benefits plan will also systematically examine all municipal policies and practices which discriminate against unmarried couples and propose changes to end such discrimination.

"Justice and dignity cannot be hollow philosophical notions," emphasized Britt. "They are notions which must be applied in practice as well. We cannot legislate away discrimination overnight, but this new law is a tremendous step forward in the struggle for equal rights for all."

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NGRA beats Dannemeyer in court

SAN FRANCISCO — On June 8, a Superior Court judge in Sacramento sustained the demurrer of the *Bay Area Reporter* (B.A.R.) a gay newspaper published in San Francisco, in a libel suit brought against it by Rep. William Dannemeyer (R-Orange County, CA).

Dannemeyer alleged in his lawsuit that the B.A.R. reprinted a memo, drafted by the Charleton Research Group, exploring how Repbulicans could attack Democrats, during the 1988 elections, for being soft on AIDS. The memo said, in part, that Dannemeyer was "foaming at the mouth", "a live grenade", and "far too emotional to do any good" to the Republican Party with respect to the AIDS issue.

The court held that the B.A.R. article was protected under the California "fair comment" doctrine and the First Amendment. Leonard Graff, NGRA Legal Director, said, "William Dannemeyer can't use frivolous lawsuits to intimidate the gay press. The courts have consistently held that the First Amendment protects the right of newspapers to publish opinions about public figures."

The court also held that the statements in the reprinted memorandum were statements of the author's opinion, not literal statements of fact. Thus, although Dannemeyer was granted leave to amend his complaint, the effect of the court's ruling is that there is nothing he can allege that

would make the statement libelous.

In opposing the B.A.R.'s demurrer, Dannemeyer argued that granting First Amendment protection to the newspaper deprived him of his right to equal protection as a U.S. Congressman. Eli Gould, of the law firm of McCutchen, Coyle, Brown & Enersen which led the defense for the B.A.R. said "Rep. Dannemeyer's Equal Protection claim is beyond belief. Not only was it wrong on the law, it asked the court to undo over 20 years of First Amendment protection of the freedom of the press by the U.S. Supreme Court. The fact that Danneymeyer even made the argument shows how apparently irrational he is when it comes to gays and people with AIDS."

Jean O'Leary, Executive Director of NGRA said, "This victory sends a strong message to William Dannemeyer. His credibility and influence will evaporate as the hard truth sinks in that he can't bully the gay community."

Dannemeyer, a staunch opponent of progressive AIDS health care policy, filed the suit in Sacramento County on September 26, 1988 and served it on the B.A.R. on February 28, 1989. NGRA filed a demurrer asking the court to dismiss the lawsuit. The court found in favor of all agruments by the B.A.R. and sustained the demurrer but gave Dannemeyer leave to amend his complaint.

Oregon ACLU files suit against ballot measure approved by Oregon voters

PORTLAND, OREGON — A ballot measure authorizing state managers to fire gay or lesbian state workers was challenged as unconstitutional in a lawsuit filed on June 8 in the Oregon Court of Appeals.

The suit asks the court to rule that Ballot Measure 8, which was approved by Oregon voters in the November 1988 elec-

tions, is invalid, and that contrary administrative rules of the Board of Higher Education are valid. The Board's rules, enacted prior to the passage of Ballot Measure 8, prohibit discrimination in employment on the basis of sexual

orientation.

The lawsuit was filed by the American Civil Liberties Union on behalf of Harriet P. Merrick, a lesbian supervisor employed by the Oregon Board of Higher Education. The suit alleges that Merrick, due to the inconsistency between Measure 8 and the Board's rules, "is required by law to carry out and enforce two contradictory and mutually exclusive legal mandates.

Ballot Measure 8 provides, in part, that 'no state official shall forbid the taking of any personnel action against any state employee based on the sexual orientation of such employee". Opponents of Ballot Measure 8 believe that this provision could be interpreted to authorize managers to fire state workers who are gay or lesbian, in violation of state and federal constitutional

'We are not sure if voters understood the significance of Measure 8," said attorney Charles F. Hinkle, a recognized expert in constitutional law. "If it means what it seems to say, it is plainly unconstitutional, and we hope to obtain a court ruling to that effect.'

The petition filed with the court alleges that Measure 8 violates the privileges and immunities clause of the Oregon constitution and the equal protection clause of the federal constitution. It also alleges that the Measure violates the free speech provisions

of both state and federal constitutions because it could chill Merrick's freedom to express her opinion about her sexual

Merrick supervises state employees and student employees for the University of Oregon student loan program. Merrick claims that Measure 8 is inconsistent with the Board's rules. "The rules tell me I can't fire someone from their job simply because of their sexual orientation. But Ballot Measure 8 says that I can do just that," she

Under Ballot Measure 8 a supervisor can fire a person merely because of his or her sexual orientation. In many cases this will mean the end of job security for state employees who, like myself, are outspoken on civil rights issues for gay men and lesbians," she said.

The suit is brought under a provision of state law authorizing the court to determine the validity of state administrative

In late 1987, Gov. Neil Goldschmidt issued an executive order forbidding discrimination against executive department state workers on the basis of sexual orientation. In March 1988, the State Board of Higher Education adopted administrative rules consistent with the governor's order, banning employment discrimintion on the basis of sexual orientation. The Measure repealed the Governor's order, but not the Board's rules. It passed with fifty-three percent of the vote.

Herpes and AIDS linked in Montreal by Rex Wockner

MONTREAL, CANADA — Further evidence that a common herpes virus may play "an important role" in the development of AIDS was presented June 7 during the Fifth International Conference on AIDS in

Dr. Paul Lusso, a colleague of Dr. Robert Gallo at the U.S. National Cancer Institute (NCI), unveiled findings indicating

that human herpesvirus six (HHV-6) "may accelerate progression of AIDS in individuals who are infected with the AIDS virus" (HIV-1).

In a press release, Lusso and colleagues were careful to state that "although the findings are consistent with a role for HHV-6 as a cofactor in progression of AIDS, they do not imply the herpesvirus causes AIDS.

Such disclaimers stem from repeated challenges to Gallo by dissident U.S. scientists and laypeople who believe HIV is not the cause of AIDS. Berkeley scientist Peter Duesberg, New York doctor Joseph Sonnabend and others have long charged that Gallo's concern for his scientific reputation combined with an overcommittment of U.S. AIDS research dollars to the HIV theory have hampered exploration of other AIDS

Scientists have not yet explained precisely how or why HIV causes AIDS.

In laboratory studies, Lusso showed that HHV-6 and HIV-1 can coinfect helper T cells which then die more quickly than when they are infected with HIV-1 alone. Lusso said the effect on cell killing was not merely additive, but synergistic.

In a separate NCI study, Dr. Barbara Ensoli further reported that HHV-6 infected cells produce a factor that binds to HIV-I and triggers it to replicate. Ensoli said the HV-6-triggered replication is distinct from HIV-1 triggers itself.

This explains how the herpesvirus greatly enhances expression of the AIDS virus in laboratory cultures," Ensoli said.
The immune suppression caused by HIV-1 infection may activate HHV-6, and activaof the herpesvirus may, in turn, stimulate HIV-1 expression, resulting in more immune suppression?

About 60 percent of Americans and Europeans have been exposed to HHV-6 and have measurable antibodies to the virus.

Gallo's and NCI's insistence that HIV-1 alone is sufficient to cause AIDS — an insistence that permeates NCI press releases — became the subject of a memorable debate June 8 during a press conference in debate June 8 during a press conference in Montreal.

PWA Coalition founder Michael Callen, who has had AIDS for seven years, confronted Gallo with the theory that con tinued assaults on the immune system (as experienced by some gay men prior to safe sex and as still experienced by many I.V. drug users) combined with cytomegalovirus infection could be a non-HIV explanation for AIDS.

Gallo aggressively dismissed Callen's suggestion and launched into a mocking attack on Duesberg, making fun of the rival scientist's voice and vocabulary.

New York activist and writer Larry Kramer, who was in Montreal as a reporter for the Village Voice, became visibly amused at the exchange and compared Gallo to "an obsessed movie star on speed."

A reporter from Spain, hearing Kramer's remark, simply called the U.S. premier AIDS researcher "an egomaniac."

Unflattering pictures of Gallo's personality have long been painted by the New York Native and Spin magaizne, and were also included in Randy Shilt's book And The Band Played On.

Gallo promised reporters that a book is on the way that will detail precisely how and why HIV-1 is sufficient alone to cause

A related study, presented in Montreal by researchers from the University of Pittsburgh, suggested that some versions of HIV-1 lead to more illness more slowly than

This was seen as good news for the hundreds of thousands of healthy individuals who have HIV antibodies.

Dr. Phalguni Gupta told reporters that "there are at least two biologically and genetically different strains of the AIDS virus, HIV, one of which is much less virulent than the other and may lie dormant for long periods of time.'

Gupta said that when patients exposed to the weaker virus do develop AIDS, "it may be explained either by mutation of the virus, or by repeated exposure to different types of virus that could be more virulent.

Theoretically," Gupta said, "we could hypothesize that persons who avoid re-exposure to the virus might remain symtom-free for even longer than the 11-year

The research was conducted by the Pitt Men's study which is part of NIAID's five-year-old Multicenter AIDS Cohort Study (MACS) in Pittsburgh, Baltimore, Chicago and Los Angeles.


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


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


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HRCF announces Lesbian Issues and Outreach Project

Gay Mormon Convention set for early October



I am a human being. God created me equal to you, and you equal to me. I am no better or worse that you in God's eyes. God gave us the gift as human beings to have emotions and feelings: love, hate, fear, and the ability to make our own choices in life.

I understand that there are those among us who wish to lock me up because I have



a disease called AIDS. Why? I do not understand. Has not our society learned yet that mistreatment such as this only brings on more pain and suffering? All of the world's past health crises have not been solved by persecution of the sick, but by the compassion of the healers and educators. Did fear and prejudice cure the Black Plague, the influenza epidemic or polio? I answer you a resounding NO. But during those times, there were those who acted in fear and spread their fear among the population in the form of prejudice and persecution of the sick and dying.

If you should lock me up, I will quickly die. You will be telling me that my illness does not want to be dealt with by our

society and you want to ignore it by hiding me away. Now, when I need your love and understanding more than ever, please do not turn your back on me. But if you should choose not to love and support me through this journey, I beg of you do not deny me the love and support that I have from my family, friends and community. Their's and God's love are my inspiration. Their love and caring give me the will to fight this

Sunday 'Blue Laws' a little paler/ extend liquor sales time

PHOENIX - On Friday, June 9, Governor Rose Mofford signed into law a bill that will allow liquor purveyors to commence sales on Sundays at 10:00 a.m. instead of the previous time of noon. This would include bars, restaurants, hotels and liquor retailers. The new law will take effect this fall.

Supported heavily by businesses involved in tourism, mainly hotels and restaurants, the change was seen by them as a positive step toward gaining added revenues, a considerable percentage of which is in taxes which accrue to the State. Opponents argued that the change would increase the numbe of drunk diving incidences and related losses and costs.

The bill will also allow the state liquor superintendent to set down rules for erotic entertainment in liquor serving establishments, allow persons under age 19 to sell liquor, and authorizes research into the sale of liquor in fast-food operations.

A call for AIDS assistance financial reporting

Within the gay community of Phoenix there is a great deal of concern being expressed over financial accountability of 50lc-3, non-profit, tax-exempt, organizations which are the primary recipients and distributors of funds intended for the care and treatment of AIDS patients, counseling and education overall.

The legally required annual financial disclosure of such organizations is no longer meeting the informational needs of people who contribute to and support them.

"...a higher standard"

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dividual and community businessman, called for a "higher standard" of these organizations at a recent meeting of the inter-organization Council of Central Arizona (see Letter to the Editor, this issue). Through this he requests a regular submission of information by these organizations including sources and amounts of funds received from the community; i.e. individual contributions, fundraising activities, receipt of funds from other organizations who in turn receive their moneys from community sources. Further that they should report their distribution of community funds received; i.e. number of cases and the amount distributed to them.

"...funds received from the community"

The subject here is "funds received from the community". There are additional sources of funding such as governmental agency and foundation grants. Those, due to their complexity wherein some restrict their usage to 'administrative overhead',

'printing of educational materials', or 'public information seminars' are best handled in the annual reports of the organizations.

We fully support Mr. Barnes' request and further are advised that a majority of those organizations have already voluntarily agreed to provide this information. The Western Express will be pleased to print the submissions on a monthly or bi-monthly basis, whatever is deemed advisable by those involved, in a format which will be concise and easily understood.

"...clearing up confusion"

It is hoped this will aid in clearing up confusion which currently exists. If those reports cause further questions those items should first be taken up with the Boards of Directors of the organizations involved, allowing them the opportunity to respond and hopefully avoid confusion and rumors, both potentially damaging to the ongoing work of those organizations.

Gay and Lesbian Rights/Many International changes in the 20th anniversary year of our own Stonewall Rebellion

It's amazing that we're being inundated as never before in our past nine years of publishing with announcements of rallies and marches for gay rights, changes in discriminatory laws, and governmental support of human and civil rights throughout the world. More precisely we're watching for those that deal with gay and lesbian issues.

Recently San Francisco adopted a firstever major U.S. city law recognizing cohabitational (including homosexual) relationships and passing medical and insurance benefits to partners and/or survivors. In Denmark it is now legal for gay men and sbians to marry. But that's just the tip.

In preparing his new monthly-updated column "International News Summary" which commences in this issue, columnist Rex Wockner is uncovering many more such hanges and in some very unlikely counies. To read of these international events this particular time, the 20th anniversary the Stonewall Rebellion in New York City, a time when we are reflecting on changes within our own country, is indeed heartening. They bolster one's opinion that things can change for the better.

Here are some examples: AUSTRALIA: 12 TGLRG (Tasmanian became legal in Israel last year. Gay and Lesbian Rights Group) members

staged the first ever gay rights march in the small Tasmanian city of Burnie.

NOVA SCOTIA: 200 members of Lesbian and Gay Rights Nova Scotia rallied outside the provincial legislature urging their MPs to add sexual orientation protections to the province's proposed new human rights statutes. The minister responsible for human rights supports gay rights.

SASKATCHEWAN: 100 people attended a March 2 rally in this city, signalling the formation of Equality for Gays and Lesbians Everywhere. EGALE is Canada's version of NGLTF.

JERSEY, CHANNEL ISLANDS (Eng.): Gay male sex may be decriminalized on this British island 22 years after it was legalized on the mainland.

LONDON: In their most dramatic action yet, members of ACT UP/London brought rush-hour traffic from London and Kent to a grinding halt by blocking off Old and New Kent Roads in a protest of cuts in benefits payable to people with AIDS.

HOLLAND: 2 lesbians in Ermelo have won a battle to have their baby baptized in the Reformed Church.

ISRAEL: 200 members of the year-old gay group Otzmah debated three members of the Knesset Parliament. Homosexual acts

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

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Highlights of Our History — The Stonewall Rebellion and Since

NIGHTS

First in a series celebrating the gay and lesbian lifestyle excerpted from "The Allyson Almanac", Allyson Publications

Early in the morning of June 28, 1969, a routine police raid on the Stonewall Bar at 53 Christopher Street, in New York City, turned into a riot when the patrons put up unexpected resistance. A group of uniformed policemen arrived at the bar about 3:00 a.m. They ordered customers to leave, then began arresting employees, as well as several drag queens. Although such arrests had often taken place without protest, this time the crowd began to react. They began changing "Pigs!" at the police, then threw bottles. The police barricaded themselves inside the bar, which itself came under attack from the crowd. According to one observer, the riot was escalating and the trapped police were about to begin firing on the crowd when reinforcements arrived, and the group dispersed. Further riots continued, for the next several evenings.

The Stonewall Rebellion marks the beginning of the modern lesbian and gay movement. The homophile movement of the 1950s and 1960s, with its emphasis on social respectability, gave way to groups such as the Gay Liberation Front (a militant leftist organization begun in July 1969) and the Gay Activists Alliance (a less militant group formed by activists who were put off by the GLF's alliance with often homophobic leftist groups).

1970 — Rita Mae Brown and other lesbians are purged from the National Organization for Women. The following year, however NOW acknowledged the "oppression of lesbians as a legitimate concern of feminism." . . . In July, the Gay Liberation Front of the Tri-Cities (Albany, New York area) obtain what is believed to be the first telephone listing to contain the word "gay".

...The country's first legislative hearing on

gay rights is held in November at the New York Bar Association in New York.

1971 — The first gay march on the Canadian Parliament takes place in Ottawa...The first statewide gay rights march in the U.S. is held in Albany, New York. Some 3,500 people marched on the state capitol.

1972 — Jim Foster, of San Francisco, addresses the Democratic National Convention. He is the first openly gay person to address a national convention of a major political party. . . "That Certain Summer" airs on network television. This made-for-TV movie, about a boy who learns that his divorced father is gay, was the first television drama to focus on gay issues.

1974 — The National Gay Task Force is formed in New York by Dr. Bruce Voeller. . . . Homosexuality is removed from the American Psychiatric Association's official diagnostic manual of mental disorders. . . . The United States gets its first openly gay elected officials: Kathy Kozachenko to the Ann Arbor, MI city council; Elaine noble elected to the Massachusetts state legislature; Minnesota state senator Allan Spear publicly declared his homosexuality.

1975 — Leonard Matlovich, discharged from the Air Force after he came out, appears on the cover of *Time* magazine. The story shattered many popular stereotypes of gay people. . . . Ernest O. Reaugh is appointed by New York state senator Manfred Ohrenstein to act as liaison to the gay community. Reaugh, who still serves in that position, is believed to have been the first gay liaison appointed by any public official.

1976 The San Francisco police department officially urges gay officers to come out.

1977 — Midge Costanza, acting as community liaison in the new Jimmy Carter administration, receives the first official lesbian and gay delegation to the White House. . . . Anti-gay singer Anita Bryant starts a highly emotional campaign to repeal a gay rights ordinance in Dade County. It-was repealed by a two-to-one margin. . . . In New York, Ellen Barrett is ordained, becoming the first openly gay Episcopalian priest. . . . Harvey Milk is elected to the San Francisco Board of Supervisors, the first openly gay city official in a major city.

1978 — The Civil Service Reform Act bars discrimination against gay people in the federal government's civilian positions. . . . San Francisco mayor George Moscone and openly gay city supervisor Harvey Milk are assassinated by homophobic ex-cop Dan White.

1979 — Stephen Lachs becomes the country's first openly gay judge when California Governor Jerry Brown appoints him to the State Supreme Court. Brown also appointed the country's next three openly gay judges. . . . On October 14, an estimated 50,000 to 100,000 lesbians, gay men and supporters show up for the first National March on Washington for Gay and Lesbian Rights.

1980 — The government of Holland, in an unusually strong official statement informs the governments of Ireland and New Zealand that it considers their anti-gay laws to be unacceptable. . . . Rhode Island high school student, Aaron Fricke, takes a gay date to his high school prom. The school administration tried to stop him, but a court order forced the school to back down. . . . Mel Boozer's name is put in nomination for the vice-presidency at the Democratic National Convention. That convention also included some seventy-five

openly gay delegates.

1981 — On June 5, the Centers for Disease Control announces that five previously healthy gay men in Los Angeles have been diagnosed with pneumocystis carinii pneumonia. This was the first official warning of what would become the AIDS epidemic. . . . Mary Morgan, an appointee of California Governor Jerry Brown becomes the first openly lesbian judge in the U.S. . . . In Strasbourg, after lobbying by the International Gay Association, the Council of Europe votes overwhelmingly to encourage member countries to pass gay civil rights legislation.

1982 — Following a lengthy effort by Rep. David Clarenbach, Wisconsin becomes the first state to pass a wide-reaching gay rights law. Republican governor Lee S. Dreyfus, as he signed the bill into law on February 25, expressed his belief in the "fundamental Republican principle" of restricted governmental involvement in the lives of citizens. . . . The first international Gay Games are held in Kezar Stadium in San Francisco with 1,300 gay and lesbian athletes from 22 countries competing.

1983 — Openly gay mayors take office in both Santa Cruz and Laguna Beach, California. . . . Congressman Gerry Studds becomes the first politician elected to national office to openly and unapologetically state that he is gay.

1984 — Robert Ebersole, the town clerk of Lunenberg, MA, comes out and is easily re-elected. He was the country's first openly gay Republican elected official.

1985 — The U.S. Supreme Court strikes down an Oklahoma law banning the favorable mention of homosexuality in schools as an unconstitutional interference with free speech.

1986 — In June, the U.S. Supreme Court upholds the right of states to legislate against gay sex between consenting adults. . . . A settlement is announced between Pacific Bell and the National Gay Rights Advocates, in which Pacific Bell agrees to compensate individuals against whom it discriminated because they were gay.

1987 — On January 14, station KRON in San Francisco becomes the first television station to agree to run condom ads. ... In March, the AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power (ACT UP) forms in New York. ACT UP advocated a more confrontational style than what many AIDS activists had taken, and similar groups soon formed in other cities. ... In May, the Danish Parliament votes to ban discrimination against lesbians and gay men. . . . Threated with a gay boycott, Delta Airlines apologizes for past homophobia and announces that it will not discriminate against passengers with AIDS. . . . On May 30, U.S. Congressman Barney Frank comes out in an interview published in the Boston Globe. ... The New York Times finally decides the word "gay" is acceptable to use, as an adjective. ... A U.S. Court of Appeals orders

the Army to reinstate Miriam ben-Shalom. Eleven years earlier she had been discharged after stating that she was a lesbian. ... On October 10 and 11, the largest gay and lesbian gathering of all time assembles in Washington, D.C., to march for gay civil rights and to push for more action against AIDS. The crowd was variously estimated at 200,000 to 600,000 people. The same weekend the NAMES Project unveiled a giant quilt containing nearly two thousand panels, each commemorating a person who had died of AIDS. Two days later, the largest civil disobedience action since the Vietnam war took place as six hundred demonstrators allowed themselves to be arrested on the steps of the Supreme Court, protesting the Court's upholding of state sodomy laws.

1988 — The National Black Gay and Lesbian Conference in Los Angeles draws over four hundred participants, making it the largest such gathering ever. . . On February 29, Svend Robinson becomes the first member of the Canadian Parliament to come out. . . . On September 12, 1988, the U.S. Army finally re-enlists Sergeant Miriam ben-Shalom after being held in contempt of court for refusing to do so earlier. She was the first openly gay person ever reenlisted by the U.S. military.

BELGIUM: The editors of the Brussels gay paper Tels Quels went on trial April 19 for allegedly promoting prostitution and debauchery through the newspaper's personal ads. A verdict was due May 31. Coeditor Luc LeGrand, speaking by phone from Belgium, said he and co-editor Pierre Bocquet are "very optimistic about the verdict." The attorney general didn't push things too far at the trial," LeGrand said. "He did his job, but he wasn't very insistent." Throughout their year-long ordeal with authorities, Bocquet and LeGrand have argued that the Tels Quels personal ads are nothing more than gay men and lesbians looking to meet each other, and that the police charges reflect deliberate harassment by the country's new Catholic secretary of state.

BERMUNDA: When AIDS cases are calculated as a percentage of total population, Bermuda has the highest per capita AIDS rate — 1,339 cases per million residents. The U.S.A., which has the highest number of AIDS cases, rates 29th in the per capita statistics, with 234 cases per million. After Bermuda, in descending order, come French Guiana, the Bahamas, Guadeloupe, Haiti, Barbados, Trinidad,

Martinique, the Netherlands Antilles, the Dominican Republic, Jamaica, Cuba, Brazil Honduras, Mexico, Costa Rica, Panama, Venzuela, Nicaragua, Ecuador, Urugay, Colombia, El Salvador, Chile, Argentina, Guatemala, Paraguay, Peru and then the U.S. The statistics are as of March 1, and were compiled by the World Health Organization.

CANADA: In the past six months, eight of Newfoundland's 100 Catholic priests have been arrested for having sex with young boys. The latest revelations involved Brendan Foley, "the singing priest" known for his TV appearances with his guitar. The Canadian Bishop's Conference has formed a committee to investigate what the media has called "this rash of pederasty."

CHINA (PRC): According to a new book, Meizhov Wenzhai, a gay wedding was recently celebrated in the small Fujian village of Zhunta. Ye Xing, 28, and Li Linxing, 30, reportedly had a traditional Chinese ceremoney with Ye Xing dressed as a woman throughout the day. Gai Pied, in reporting on the wedding, said guests "pretended not to be aware of 'her' true sex." Chinese authorities reportedly later determined that Ye Xing was a man and fired him from his job, but simultaneously granted him permission to live with his 'husband', Gai Pied said.

FRANCE: A new book called the World Atlas of Freedoms maps worldwide attitudes toward homosexuality. According to the authors, only Thailand, Canada, Brazil, Japan and Western Europe can be said to have both legally and socially liberal policies toward gay sex. The authors feel that conditions for gays have worsened in recent

Box 11218, Phoenix, AZ 85061 years in Mexico, Venezuela and Indonesia and point out that repressive laws and practices persist in such places as the USA, Australia, Turkey and South Africa. In sidebars, the authors noted that 21 nations have gay/lesbian newspapers and that some countries, particularly in the Arab world, have a very high incidence of homosexuality but no recognition of it.

GREAT BRITAIN: It appears unlikely that London police will allow the June 24 Lesbian and Gay Pride parade to pass through Picadilly Circus or Trafalgar Square. Pride Weeks Committee spokesman Wilhe Molton told Gay Times that authorities have been "obstructive, rude and negative" Meanwhile, soap star Pam St. Clement of EastEnders, filmmaker Derek Jarman and singer Michelle Schocked have offered thier support to the annual festival.

GREAT BRITAIN: The Pink Triangle Project is raising money across Europe to create art work that will be presented to Nazi concentration camps where homosexuals were murdered. Organizer Chris White said the project will remind everyone of the consequences of not fighting oppression and will encourage lesbians and gay men to work together on practical projects in preparation for the 1992 European unification.

GREAT BRITAIN: Section 28 of the Local Government Act, which outlaws promotion of homosexuality by local authorities, is to be repealed, according to a leaked Cabinet document which was obtained by *The Pink Paper*. Prime Minister Margaret Thatacher has reportedly given her backing to the U-turn in government policy after a detailed analysis of the Treaty of Rome revealed that Britain would be acting illegally after 1992 if it kept the Section on the books.

POLAND: Condoms sent to warsaw by West European gay groups for free distribution are being sold by a man who took over the P.O. Box set up for the purpose, accor-

ding to *De Gay Krant*. The activist behind the original plan has emigrated to West Germany. Condoms are both hard to find and expensive in Poland. West German activists traveled to Poland last month to clamp down on the capitalist in question.

USSR: There have been further scattered news reports that the Soviet Union is about to decriminalize gay sex. According to Gay Times, the influential weekly Liberary Gazette recently carried an article in which noted sexologist Igor Kon stated: "As far as I know there is no article against homosexuality in the draft of the new criminal code." Kon called the Soviet Union's anti-gay laws "mindless and cruel" and said the rights of sexual minorities are "an aspect of human rights." The news article was prefaced by a letter from a mother of a gay son who had been sacked from his job, expelled from the Communist Party and imprisoned on the basis of information from an STD clinic. She said that when she appealed on her son's behalf to the local procurator, he told her: "I'd have had such scum shot." Last December, the Young Communist paper Molodoi Komunist carried an unprecedented pair of letters from two gay men discussing their problems. Article 121 of the current Soviet Penal Code allows those convicted of homosexual behavior to be sentenced to five years of forced labor.

USSR: According to the daily Komsomonolskaia Prayda, Moscow barbers may no longer shave their clients because health authorities fear it could transmit HIV. City health services director Dr. Vinogradon called the new policy "a preventative measure taken after proof of numerous infractions of hygiene standards."

Mexico Bids for ILGA Conference

The Colectivo Sol (Sun Collective) of Mexico City reports that Mexican groups are bidding to host the 1991 International Lesbian & Gay Association Annual Conference in Mexico. The decision will be made this July at the 1lth Annual Conference in Vienna, Austria. If the bid is successful this would be the first time for the conference to be held outside of Europe or the USA/Canada.

Isreal to Hold First Gay Pride March

Israeli lesbians and gays will be holding their first Gay Pride Parade in Tel Aviv the last week of June. The march will be followed by an unprecedented demonstration outside the Knesset, Israel's Parliament, to show solidarity and to claim Lesbian and Gay Rights.

According to *Passport Magazine*, a heated debate in March 1989 between members of the Israeli Kneset and leaders of the gay rights organization, Otzmah (power), served as the first shot in the upcoming battle for gay rights. The Knesset recently rejected laws to protect homosexuals from job discrimination.

Thailand & Singapore AIDS Auctions

Thailand observed AIDS Awareness Week as part of the International AIDS Day, with the aim being mass public education. The highlight was an anti-AIDS parade in Bangkok, the first time in Thai history that gays had marched in public.


A gay Thai student at Mahidol University has produced an educational video called "Your Choice". The video is a drama about a Bangkok barboy and his AIDS-knowledgeable friend. The barboy tests positive to HIV. The video is being shown at the university and in Bangkok gay bars to very favorable responses, especially from barboys.

Singapore also held International AIDS Day benefits with proceeds going to the newly formed Action for AIDS Singapore. This new group intends to help promote education, welfare and research into the illness. It is a private organization with government approval.

Columbian Gays March

Lesbians and gays joined the workers of Columbia on May 1 by marching in the May Day parade in Bogota. The Colectivo

del Orgullo Gay (CORG) — the Gay Pride Collective — and the Columbian National Association for the Defense of Gays and Lesbians (ANGAL), marched with signs and handouts, demanding a national Anti-Discrimination law to protect lesbians and gays as other oppressed peoples.

In a related development, President

Virgilio Barco created on April 20 a new 1,000 person force to wipe out right-wing death squands run by drug traffikers and police agents. The death squads have killed about 1,500 people in Colombia in the last five years, including hundreds of homosexuals. Barco said he will create a national commission to take even more measures to combat the death squads.

To complicate matters, the Immigration and Naturalization Service took almost a full week to issue written guidelines mandating the policy change, which has also raised the concern of AIDS activists.

Of course, there is still legislation which would address the issue of AIDS and immigration, but even that is under fire.

That's how fast issues affecting the gay

sions bill which will, among a host of other things, lift the ban on lesbian and gay immigration into the U.S. and loosen the AIDS/HIV waiver regulations to allow the INS (slightly) more breathing room.

The problem here is twofold. On AIDS immigration, changing the existing legislation could be downright impossible at this point, but this bill doesn't really do that. Most importantly, however, the waiver provisions it does include are now under attack.

Rep. Bill McCollum (R-Altamonte Springs, FL), an emerging AIDS/homophobe studying under Rep. William Dannemeyer (R-Fullerton, CA), is sponsoring an amendment which would eliminate the possibility for all waivers for AIDS immigration. So, suffice it to say that the position on this is defensive.

On the Senate side, Senate Minority Whip Alan Simpson (R-Wyo.) has introduced his version of the Frank bill, minus the AIDS and HIV provisions. Scuttlebutt has at that it is likely that the Senate wil adopt a "wait-and-see" approach to the Frank bill and see how it does in the House before taking any action.

Lesbian and gay onlookers have been heartened, however, by the fact that Simpson, a staunch conservative, did endorse lifting the ban on gay immigration and (in the *Congressional Record*, at least) did refer to it publicly, stating that "whatever one thinks" about homosexuality, the immigration exclusion is wrong.

Opposition to the bill apparently has not been focused on the gay and lesbian immigration section, but on other issues involving ideology and immigration. At present, there is no action scheduled on the bill in either chamber, although inside sources suggest that the full House Judiciary Committee could take up the bill as early as mid-June.

HATE CRIMES -

Intense action is surrounding the immensly popular Hate Crimes Statistics Act which would order the Justice Department to collect statistics on crimes motivated by bias based on race, religion, ethnicity or sexual orientation.

May 18 the House Criminal Justice Subcommittee unanimously approved the bill without an expected amendment from Rep. George Gekas (R-Harrisburg, Penn.) who last year introduced amendments to eliminate the "sexual orientation" clause out of last year's bill. The big surprise was that the amendment he successfully placed on the bill allows the attorney general to expand the bill to include other groups in the future who could become targets of hate crimes.

Now it will go to the House Judiciary Committee where a similar vote is expected. Of course, the big question is whether Dannemeyer will introduce a gay-exclusionary amendment on the floor.

But that aside, the major fear is in the Senate, where lobbyists are holding back the bill until they have enough votes to beat back an amendment which will be proposed by Sen. Jesse Helms (R-NC). The rider, which is probably the biggest legislative threat to the gay and lesbian community in recent

memory would mandate that states having sodomy laws enforce them, would: state that the Senate is foursquare against any federal legislation banning anti-gay discrimination; ban schools from "condoling]" homosexuality as an "acceptable lifestyle", and declare that the "homosexual movement threatens the survival of the American family as a basic unit of society."

In part because of the specter of Helins and the rabid right wing's propensity for reading the gay and lesbian press and using the actions of the "homosexual lobby" against panicy senators and representatives, activists are greatly worried about what he could do this time.

One need only recall that during his fight for his AIDS amendments to the omnibus Senate AIDS bill last year Helms held up a copy of *The Washington Blade* and called it "an invitation to sodomy."

Otherwise, activists are pulling out all the stops on this one, scheduling lobbying meetings with House and Senate members in their home districts throughout June and signing up unprecedented numbers to the Human Rights Campaign Fund's preauthorized Speak Out congressional message program.

Action in the House is expected sometime in June, while Senate action may hit in July, or, if Helms still looms as a possible victor, into the fall and closer to 1990, an election year. That, activists fear, could make the battle even tougher.


No wonder, as his credentials, at the


Fortunately for Phoenicians and those who choose to dance in the Valley there are several varieties of dance clubs with excellent DJ's. Do yourself a favor and try a club you've never been to or check out the club you used to frequent.

On any given night and at most dance clubs you're likely to hear anything from 'house music' to progressive to rock and roll and old dance classics, depending on the DJ and the format of the club...and there's a "Little Bitty Ol" Pissant Country Place" called CHARLIE'S which features the talents of MR. JOEY FRAZEE, Countdown Phoenix' Profile for June. Joey and the bar have brought country/western music to fans who wanted it and has created new C/W fans out of many more.

NAME: Joey Fraz

FROM: Albuquerque

WORKED AT: Foxes, Albuquerque; Charlie's/Phoenix, past five



DC: You have been employed by Charlie's for the past five years. You've worked primarily with a country/western format, would you ever consider spinning other dance music?

JF: I used to spin dance music and I enjoyed it for about two years. Then I became

really burnt out on it.

DC: What is it about country/western music that has helped you avoid 'burnout' for over five years?

JF: Well, when it finally came time to stop spinning dance music it was also time to say goodbye to some of the bad habits I had acquired ... habits that were dragging me down.

It wasn't long after that when I met John King at Charlie s/Denver. He introduced me to a 'different side' of country/western, although I would have to say it was my Mom's love for country/western that first caught my ear.

DC: What is the "different side of country/western"?

JF: The country/western I grew up with was alot of the older stuff my Mom listened to. The country/western John exposed me to was country/western dance music. It has a definite base line and a certain 'twang'.

DC: Okay, so we've established country/western and country/western dance. How does the dance music hold your interest and avoid the burnout?

JF: It doesn't always. I sometimes still get burnt out but the difference now is that I enjoy my job and my lifestyle is entirely different which allows a variety.

DC: Having had the experience of spinning both dance music and country/western dance which would you say was more difficult?

JF: Technically dance music, because you're mixing by beats per minute. On the other hand country/western dance is blended by the pace of the music. Starting a set very slow and working up to very fast...this is something I taught myself.

DC: Did you have any other help learning to blend country/western dance music?

JF: "Buckle Rubbing" is slower paced and you tend to dance closer causing your belt buckles to rub against one another. Here at Charlie's/Phoenix I was given the opportunity to experiment — to try something different.

The crowd seemed to enjoy fast-paced country/western dance music just as much as the slower paced. And my country/western music collection grew as new dance steps came along...I was able to supply a wider variety which now includes great country/western dance, Top 40 dance, and even occasional surprizes like "The Hokey Pokey".

DC: That's definitely a variety, but then so is the crowd you've attracted. How do you make it comfortable for someone like myself who doesn't know how to two-step or line dance?

JF: I believe my whole purpose as a DJ is to work along — equally with the staff to create an atmosphere comfortable to each person, no matter what type of music is being played.

DC: Is it easy for you to work along with the staff?

JF: Most definitely, but then my boss wouldn't settle for anything less. The staff is more of a family than a group of guys working in a bar.

Well, I can't think of any better working conditions.

Congratulations to Joey! The unity of staff shows in his work. And on the subject of unity, just a reminder to club DJ's that Joey is your host for the June DJ Conference to be held at Charlie's on Monday, June 19 at 6:30 p.m.

Without Reservations

June is busting out all over — and so are a bunch of new and recently opened restaurants, all over the Valley. Some of the eateries that I will discuss with brief descriptions now will also be written up in more detail in later issues, others have perhaps only one or two outstanding qualities that these comments will easily cover, then there are some that I never want to write about again. Going roughly in a clockwise pattern around the Valley, below are some of my observations from recent meals at Rascals, Mazel Tov, Taste of Shish Kabob, San Carlos Bay Sea Food Restaurant, Chris' Cafe, Maggie's Stuffed Sopapillas, Crazy Jim's Pizza, Russo's

Pizzeria and Maui Grill. Films are busting out all over, too — this is the beginning of the summer season. Some will only show for a week or two, but others are destined to be the summer block-blusters. Peter Weir's latest entry, Dead Poet's Society, featuring Robin Williams and a septet of relatively unknown but talented youthful actors, is fine fodder for the fire of films fashioned for efficiacious folks (funny, but I usually save the "f" words for the all-tooplentiful seasonal drivel). With a wider showing beginning today, it now should be easier to view without camping out in a line for such a long time.

TidBits

Spurred on by the enormous building boom out North Scottsdale Way, Rascal's certainly is not the only (or even the newest) restaurant to replace the sage and sand (alright, dust!) of that once pristine land. It is, unquestionably, the one that serves the best fajitas in that corner of the world. Companion and I split an order of chicken fajitas for two (\$14.95), the other night. Not only was the main ingredient moist and tender, but the mellow onions and green peppers arrived on the same sizzling platter that let off a wonderful aroma as well. A large clay pot (which had seen better days I would have been embarrassed to have brought it out, had I been the waiter) was filled with the best homemade tortillas I have ever had. Fat, chewy and corny, they were large enough to hold generous portions of the accompanying sour cream, smoky beans topped with melted shredded cheese, a zippy ultra-fresh tasting salsa and creamy nutty guacamole and still leave room for massive amounts of the main event. Of course eating these monster soft tacos was a terribly messy affair, but who cared? If you want to get down and dirty with fajitas in North Scottsdale, this is the place to go. Somewhat hidden in the shopping center at the Northwest corner of 92nd Street and Shea. Call 860-0000 for more info.

Considering the sizeable Jewish population on McCormick Ranch and its environs, you might say mazel tov to Dan and Laurie Druckman for having the foresight to open up a New York kosher style restaurant in its midst. You might also congratulate them on the quality of the food that they serve at their new eatery at 9015 East Via Linda (Phone 391-2986) entitled, appropriately enough, Mazel Tov. We started off the meal by sharing a Chopped Chicken Liver appetizer (\$4.95), a serving so rich from the schmaltz (chicken fat) and chopped eggs that was added to the handchopped livers that one large scoop was ample for the four of us. Then I tasted Grandma Ida's Sweet and Sour Cabbage Soup (\$1.25 a cup), a more subtle version than those I am accustomed to, this one being without tomatoes but made with tomato broth, but I "borrowed" my second, third, fourth and fifth spoonfuls from my

messmate, I grew to like it immensely. A basketful of oven baked, lightly buttered bagel chips was a big hit with us all. One buddy's Nova Scotia Lox and Cream Cheese served with B.L.T.O. (bagel, lettuce, tomato and onion) was perfectly sweet, soft, creamy, fresh, crisp, ripe and mild respecfively, while another's Cold Cut Platter of Prime Beef Tongue with Potato Salad and Cole Slaw (\$6.95) was its equal in every way. The third of our party had a deliciously spiced, perfectly cooked Roasted 1/2 Chicken with a delightful crisp cole slaw to counterbalance it. I choose the Flanken (braised short ribs of beef) in the Pot with Mushroom Barley Soup. The latter was rich and generous with the vegetables, the broth having a very hearty flavor from the mushrooms, but the meat was, unfortunately, tough and stringy. The taste was great it's a shame that the texture wasn't. For dessert (and who was hungry at this point? we managed to split a savory version of a Noodly *Kugel* (a baked 'pudding' of noodles, fruit, butter, eggs and other fattening ingredients at \$2.25 for a colossal slice.) Grandma Ida and Grandma Flo had some good kids - and they sure know how to

The **Taste of Shish Kabob** restaurant has been hiding out behind (and I do mean behind) Walgreen's in the shopping center on the Southwest corner of 68th Street and Thomas for roughly a year now (I wrote a little tidbit on them last July, and another in my special 183 restaurant anniversary special edition), and their location still is their major nemesis for attracting new customers. With food as good as theirs is, however, I'm sure that by now they have a loyal (but small) following. Let me toot their horn again, and hopefully - especially with their new lunchtime (11 AM 'til 4 PM) Persian buffet - I can send some more customers their way. This is an all-you-careto-eat spread, priced at a modest \$4.95. In no particular order, there was a delicious dish of fresh green beans with ground beef; rice fired into cracker-like rounds; white rice flecked with saffron; herbed rice; yellow split peas with beef, onions, tomato and lemon; little hot whole-wheat moons filled with a savory mushroom and beef

combination; an iceberg salad with tomatoes and cucumbers, a piquant dressing on the side; and a lightly curried chicken in sauce. For drinks they have an addicting Persian tea or a refreshing concoction of yogurt and mint called Dough. We added a piece of baklava for dessert, this version not being as cloyingly sweet as others, but delightfully subtle with just a hint of rose water for complete ethereality. The chefs/owners are very friendly, and will go out of their way to make sure you are happy with their food and service. Aside from the buffet, there is an interesting menu with many other reasonably priced dishes. Once you taste their shish kabob — or any of the other savory choices — you'll be hooked, too, on this unpretentious, serendipitous cafe.

Brand spanking new, the **San Carlos** Bay Sea Food Restaurant is the latest in a string of recently opened Mexican seafood places (see the review of Soto's Seafood Mexican Restaurant and Rocky Point Restaurant in the April 21st issue) in the central and southern portions of the City. The menu here is almost a dead ringer for the latter, give or take just a few items (take, for instance, the caguama [turtle], which, although on this menu is crossed out for the time being, or give the albondigas con arroz [meatball stew] which is not on the other one), but this one is definitely cloned enough to suspect either plagiarism or dual ownership. San Carlos Bay is by far the best looking of the trio, and also, at this point, the most disorganized, service wise. I did manage to get, after a while, a basket of chips and a bowl of wimpy hot sauce. They are worth skipping, because the rest of the food certainly was worth indulging in without the disadvantage of a mindlessly (and tastelessly) filled stomach. My meal consisted of two appetizers, first a small abulon (abalone) cocktail (\$4.50) which was loaded with the tenderest pieces of snowwhite shellfish in a mild, tomato-based juice augmented by bits of onion, tomato and cilantro, all enhanced with fresh wedges of lime, then a tostado de pescado (fish ostada) that was ultra-crisp, with a layer of ce instead of the usual beans, stufed with pieces of fish and topped with crisp shredded lettuce and tomatoes. Freshness is the byword here I suspect that if the waitresses were reasonably swift, the fish might still be swimming around. But, don't worry. They aren't, so it won't be. Still, if you try hard, you can catch the next wave at the corner of 19th Street and McDowell. For surfing hours, call 340-0892.

Between the River and the freeway, in a bleak industrial area, lies Chris' Cafe like an oasis in the desert. Clean and simple of line, they offer the usual type of fare for the area with the addition of a few surprises. The best and most unusual dish on their menu is Mediteranean (sic) Beef and Beans, a large styro bowlful currently going for a paltry \$3.60. Lurking within you will find a bountiful bunch of beef tips and white beans simmered with leeks, onions, carrots, cilantro and some assertive spices. It is a flavorful, homey tasting blend that will warm the cockles of your heart (especially if your heart is stuck trying to find decent food in this gastronomic wasteland part of town). For an additional \$1.75 I purchased a huge Fresh Fruit Cup, with an emphasis

on fresh — and a handsome variety, to boot. A large cup of sun tea completed a very leasant meal. *Chris'* is tucked away at 2455 South 7th Street, and they will deliver to local businesses by calling 258-8589 before 10:30

Into every life a little rain must fall. Although the skies were clear, we must have been having a deluge the day a buddy and I tried the new tenant at the site of the old Appetito's on the corner of 7th Avenue and Osborn. Maggie's Stuffed Sopapillas is an intriguing enough appelation, so I had been watching in eager anticipation for their opening. Alas, even the listing was most disappointing. Of the ten varieties of stuffed sopapillas, all but three seemed rather mundane (Spanish Rice, Ground Beef Patty [!] and Red Chili, for instance). Not quite ready for dessert, I skipped over the Stuffed Pie Apples and Cheese rendition and went right for the Scrambled Eggs, Wieners and Fried Potatoes with Green Chili combination (\$1.80) and the Carne Adovada (meat with red chili sauce) with Fried Potatoes, Cheese and Lettuce one (\$2.25) as well. The "pillows" were like nothing I had ever had before (which is not necessarily bad, but it indubitably was in this case), and the fillings were greasy, offtasting and generally disagreeable. Both the chili and the cheese were bland, while the adovada tasted burned. Actually, I was so turned off to the food that I couldn't even get up the courage to try my companion's enchilada and burrito, but if looks could kill, I saved my life by refraining. Call 277-5099 if you're extremely masochistic.

I don't know why it took me so long to discover Crazy Jim's Pizza on 15th Avenue, just south of Indian School Road, since I often drive by on my way hither and yon. Mostly a take-out place (they also deliver by calling 264-4777), there is only room for a few small tables inside this rather miniscule edifice. The food, nevertheless, is all of good quality, tasty, and of large portions. Normally, I don't order Arabic foods in an Italian restaurant, but with the Gyro Pita Sub (\$2.95) there was a sub-caption that stated "Jim's Special Tsaziki Sauce On The Side" which piqued my interest beyond all trepidation. Lucky for me. The meat, a crusted melange of beef and lamb was lovingly moist and the sauce was a perfectly balanced blend of yogurt, mint and cucumbers and herbs. The pita was the thick kind that I have previously only found locally at Nick's Golden Cuisine (etc., etc.). My pal's lasagne (\$4.25) was as good as it can get, loaded with meat and good quality cheese sandwiched between the broad noodles, baked with a spicy tomato sauce and the accompanying garlic bread could have kept a gaggle of vampires at bay. There's a world of subs, salads, pizzas and baked dinners awaiting my on my return. They won't have to wait long.

It is not a pretty thought, but *Russo's* pizza looks much better than **Russo's Pizzeria**. In fact, I'm sure his pizza tastes absolutely wonderful, especially if Russo's American Pie (\$4.95) and his breadsticks (\$75 per order) are any indication of his cooking abilities. The latter are long and broad, more like *focaccia* in appearance and taste than anything else. The "pie" is of the deep dish pot variety, served in a huge oval



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

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ramekin filled with bubbling Cheddar, Longhorn and Mozzerella (sic) and a plethora of fennel laden sausage and fresh mushrooms. Next trip I intend to take along some other tasters so that I can try a Calzone, some Lasagne Florentine, an order of Noodles Russolini and maybe even one of those lush looking Sicilian Pizzas. If you can't make it by their 19th Avenue (just north of Campbell) location, try for their free (or almost free, if you live farther away) delivery by calling 246-9199. Naturally, you must be there in person for their daily All You Can Eat Spaghetti feast, served from 11 AM 'til 2 PM, for only \$3.45 (meatballs can be had for four bits apiece more, for salad or sausage add \$1.25). The place may not be pretty, but the food sure is good.

With a slogan like "Eat, Drink and be Maui", you'd think that the Maui Grill on West Bethany Home Road, just east of the Black Canyon Freeway would be a fun place to eat. This rehab of an old Der Wienershnitzel has a new coat of paint, but little else to make one want to linger for very long on a hot day. And hot days are what we are going to have many of in the coming months. The food concept is good — we have practically nothing Hawaiian, culinarily speaking — but the execution...well, execution is actually a very good word to use here. We started off with an order of Zuchs-N-Shrooms (\$1.69) — God knows why, because there is absolutely no Island in-

fluence in a dish like that. Although the breading was overdone, the results weren't all that bad. The 'cool ranch dressing'', however, was most certainly out of a bottle, and probably one sporting the logo "eat out more often" and the initials S.E.R. on the label. The three Island Style Dishes were Shrimp Spears, skewers of charbroiled medium shrimp that were so wizened you couldn't tell how they were seasoned (they claimed it was "Island Style", (they claimed it was "Island Style", whatever that is); Mahi Mahi, a tiny charbroiled filet, this one, the best of the bunch, fortunately came still moist, sprinkled with Macadamia nuts; and Teriyaki Chicken, soaking in what tasted like plain soy sauce. Each is served over a bed of steamed white rice (doesnt' that sound exciting?) with a side of tropical fruit (a couple of wedges of pineapple). The Maui Plate, a combination of any two of the above, rings in at \$3.89, while "light" servings of any one individual dish would set you back \$2.69, full portions at \$3.69 (or \$4.49 for the shrimp). Their Pina Colada drink (79¢ for a large size, refills a mere 25¢) was the most refreshing thing of the whole meal. If these guys got their act together, added a few more Hawaiian items, cooked those that they do make a lot better, and made their place a little oasis with some nice cool-feeling greenery, they would have a franchisable gold mine. For take-out orders, their phone number is 242-0478. Aloha!

DEAD POETS SOCIETY

Partly biographical, partly fictional, Tom (Honey, I Shrunk the Kids) Schulman's brilliant screenplay of Dead Poets Society lays the groundwork for an extraordinary film of great depth and passion. Although it stars Robin Williams as John Keating, an off-the-wall English teacher at a starchy prep school (the kind of institution that you would have expected to have molded the like of George Bush), it is basically about seven of his students and how they are affected by this inspired imparter of wisdom.

'Carpe Diem — seize the day — and make your lives extraordinary!"

Not only is this another movie about a teacher who loves his kinds and wants them to really learn something - it is the definitive movie about a teacher who loves his kids and wants them to really learn something — and, by golly, they actually learn how to think for themselves and get a lot more gusto out of life than they would have just memorizing things by rote and then sitting around drinking beer. The wise old philosopher was right when he said "give a man a fish and you feed him for a day, but teach hem how to fish and you feed him for a lifetime.'

Our introduction (as well as the students') to Keating as a teacher has him


walking through the classroom whistling the 1812 Overture and then encouraging his students to rip out a pompous introduction to their text book that treats poetry like algebra. This maverick gets our immediate mental applause. What a breath of fresh air. And remember, this is Welton Academy in the '50's, a time and place where wealthy parents could insure that their sons would get a traditional conservative education that even the Glendale Mechamites of today would be gleeful of.

"Learn to think for yourselves again. Words and ideas can change the world."

Keating is a free-thinker in a world of conservative rhetoric - one who teaches by inspiration rather than by intimidation. Spare the paddle and enrich the child. **D.P.S.** is about naturally imaginative youths wanting to flower and mature in a world far too full of adults who are languishing in the stench of dogmatic conservatism under the guise of tradition.

"Medicine...sustains us (but) poetry is what we stay alive for!"

"The Dead Poets Society", a group which Keating and several of his contemporaries founded when he, himself, was a student at Welton Academy, met in a cave in the nearby woods at the witching hour

and engaged in rousing poetry reading sions, was "dedicated to sucking the marrow out of life."

"Sucking the marrow out of life does not mean choking on the bones."

The success of this film as an entity and not merely a Robin Williams showcase lies, I'm certain, squarely in the lap of director Peter Weir (Gallipoli, The Year of Living Dangerously, Witness). Congrats to Weir for making Robin Williams a part of this film and not the other way around. By keeping this very talented comedian in tow, he has made a movie far superior to any we are likely to see all summer.

Weir's loving attention to details proves to be a sage trait, too. In scenes such as Neil's father (Kurtwood Smith) meticulously placing his slippers by the bed before going to sleep, showing a particular facet of his personality more effectively than several pages of dialogue could have, or the close-up of the pen offered to young Todd Anderson (Ethan Hawke) for his confessional letter, thereby making an innocent item seem remarkably sinister, this point is beautifully driven home.

Producers Steven Haft, Paul Junger Witt and Tony Thomas (collectively with an impressive list of moive and TV credits) have assembled a talented crew perfectly orchestrated by director Weir. John (Mosquito Coast, Witness, Gorillas in the Mist) Seale's alternately glorious or sultry or foreboding photography is lovingly matched by Maurice (Witness and the Academy Award winners Doctor Zhivago, Lawrence of Arabia and Passage to India) Jarre's music, while William (Galipoli, The Year of Living Dangerously, Breaker Morant) Anderson's editing keeps lively what could have been a spail's passed tells then. Therefore (and with a snail's paced talkathon. Together (and with a host of other very talented eraftsmen) they prove once again (thank God) that a film with substance can survive (and succeed) in the summer.

Now it's your turn. To paraphrase Keating: "Carpe Diem — seize the day, see Dead Poets Society — and make at least two hours of you life extraordinary!"

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

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
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Hot Wax Music Report

Sylvester's Bay Bridge Series — A Tale of Two CDs by Jeffrey Wilson



In death as in life, the spirits of Patrick Cowley & Sylvester keep Megatone Records alive!

Say what you will about the Castro District's petulant prima donna, Sylvester had a "fabulous" voice to go with an original style that attracted legions of r&b, dance, and disco lovers like a magnet, for a better-known recording career which spanned the last 12 years.

San Francisco's own Queen Bee spent his last eight years as one of the mainstays of Megatone Records, churining out successful dance oriented club hits. "Don't Stop", "Hard Up", "Sex", and "Band Of Gold" kept Megatone on top in good times, and afloat during lean years, as well as through less popular acts on which the label gambled.

Megatone president Marty Blecman returned the favor by orchestrating Syl's (shared) move to a major label in the autumn of 1986, culminating in a five-album deal at Warner Bros. This new collabora tion spawned the artist's first major char ting (sans disco/dance) in eight years featuring of ing a fiery remake of Stevie Wonder's "Living For The City". Sadly, all but Sylvester's own vocal tracks had been completed for his second WB/Megatone project when he took ill. Considerable attempts were made to complete the album, but the complications from AIDS turned the imporbable into an impossible task. It was even rumored that some so-called friendly recording artists lacking in decency, and good taste, suggested themselves to finish the lp vocally, in memoriam of course, before our heroine had passed on (tsk, tsk).

Megatone's ability to capatilize on a number of thematic complications, much like Motown Records, has come up with the ultimate viable buyable: Sylvester's livliest on CD, appropriately entitled *The 12 X 12 Collection*. Just when you thought your disco loyalty was tapped, and you couldn't possibly purchase another repackaged dance product for the collectible cover art alone, the label brings you their star's finest on compact disc in a baker's dozen. The bonus cut here is Sylvester's most driving track, "Do Ya Wanna Fuck".

Not to be outdone, especially at a time when fallen former recording stars can once again turn a profit from catalog, Berkeley's Fantasy Records releases their surprisingly good r&b CD, Sylvester/The Original Hits.

Here his pre-Megatone label repeats Syl's truly biggest (and only) chart topper from 1978, "Dance (Disco Heat)", followed by the obligatory, yet equally popular "You Make Me Feel (Mighty Real)". The disco is interspersed with many delicious, and quite authentic rhythm and blues/gospelflavored selections which should delight and move those who only knew of Megatone, Moby Dick and Euro-imports. To attract, and most probably insure the latter, Fantasy has made room on the packaging enough space to name drop the disco era with Patrick Cowley, Michael Finden, Two Tons O' Fun aka The Weather Girls, HJ&S, Jeanie Tracy, and many too obscure today

Per the title they chose, Fantasy means to imply this is where the diva got his start, but Sylvester's move across the bay to Megatone was more obviously where he wanted to be.

Sylvester fans of the compact disc age, you must have both offerings! Aficionados with collectibles in both r&b and discotinged dance music, you would be remiss if you didn't add these to your archives of an artist from an era which is often emulated, but gone forever. As Sylvester so aptly pointed out to me during an interview, he chided, "There can't be but one queen on the throne anyway and you know which one that is; the only one, the Diva, Me. Who the hell else?"

Which came first the genius or the break? It is often cited that because Marty Blecman and the late Patrick Cowley, cofounders of Megatone Records, set up their shop before Sylvester left Fantasy Records, that Cowley "discovered" Syl. Whatever the true history was, it's fact that Cowley was a musician (turned friend and roadie on tour) with Sylvester's band back in the old days. Let's just say, that together, they contgributed greatly to each other's success. In a reiteration of sorts, Megatone applies a similar magnet appeal of CD to Cowley's fan base, honoring his memory and work with a companion compact disc to Sylvester,

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

Anita Morris: Not Your Ordinary Housewife?

Anita Morris emerged full-blown as a glamorous sexpot, earning a Tony nomination for the musical *Nine*, and she's played variations on the same part ever since. Do humorless feminists—almost a redundancy—take offense at the roles she plays?

cy—take oftense at the roles she plays:
"I get asked that question a lot but no,
I've never gotten any flak," Morris says in
a candid interview. "I love women and I
think women enjoy all parts of
themselves...I'm never 'Hey, look at me!'
It's more 'Let's go for this, let's do this part
of me.' I laugh with the audience at the
character I'm playing, if she thinks she's
God's gift to men or something.

"That's what I love about the stage and what I'm working toward on film, me and the audience — we are *together*. That's what I'm there for, the experience we can share."

Shooting her current film (soon to be a cult video) A Sinful Life was not totally pleasant, Morris admits, and it was projecting to that shared experience that got her through it. "There was so much tension on the set I would cut [mentally] to the future and imagine the audience watching the scene I was doing."

A little Shirley MacLaine-ish, but it worked. The budget was so low they generally did only one take of each scene. "We'd finish," Morris says, "and I would say, 'I don't think I got — and they'd say, 'It was wonderful, Anita, don't worry.""

Morris appraises the result as "a strange low-budget movie. See it with a group of people on Friday or Saturday night"; but she campaigned hard to get what she calls "my unglamorous role" in A Sin-

ful Life. "They said I was too pretty, and that made me mad. I went back without makeup and they all sat around the room and looked at me. Finally one producer said, as if I wasn't in the room, 'Her features are too fine."

The actress excused herself and went to the bathroom where she donned a blonde wig she had bought on Hollywood Boulevard and some grotesque makeup that distorted her fine features. "I *shlepped* back into the room...An hour later the director called and told me I had the part."

Why did she try so hard to get into this low-budget comedy in which she plays Clair Vin Blanc, a slovenly alcoholic single mother fighting to keep her child from being taken away? "I think this was right for me to do now," Morris explains. "I need writing that's this juicy, that does not rest in any way on being glamorous."

in any way on being glamorous."

Approaching middle age, Morris would rather be allowed to age gracefully than to spend half her salary on cosmetic surgery to enable her to play a sexport forever. In *Follies* Stephen Sondheim had an aging actress sing, "First you're another Sloe-eyed vamp, Then someone's mother, Then you're camp..." Morris reversed the last two stages, going directly to camp (Do not pass GO. Do not collect \$200). A Sinful Life finally lets her play a mother.

A native of Durham, North Carolina, Morris first appeared on Broadway in the chorus of *Jesus Christ Superstar*. "My character had a name, 'The Maid by the Fire," she says mock-boastfully, "and I had

opportunities were becoming more limited. "NBC wanted to find a comedy series for me," Morris says. Instead they put her in the ensemble cast of Berenger's after she moved to Los Angeles. Yet another series pilot is still in the offing; she has her fingers crossed.

Another reason Morris moved west is that raising a son is too difficult in New York. Hers just turned 11 and loves California. The actress may not look like a 'normal housewife' but she insists, "I am a normal housewife and I'd love to play a normal housewife a no mal housewife. I'm a mother and I can fix things around the house — the vacuum cleaner and the toilet - I think my husband (Grover Dale, co-director of the current New York hit Jerome Robbins' Broadway) married me because on our first date we went to his house in the country and I built a stone wall."

After nearly a dozen films (The Hotel New Hampshire, Maria's Lovers, etc), Morris is incredibly frank (and overly modest) in saying she hasn't hit her stride in the movies: "I sense a strength and power on stage that I haven't had yet on screen."

She cites recent Oscar winner Kevin Kline as another actor who "projects an incredible energy" on stage that has yet to come across on film. One stage performer Morris feels is able to deliver for the camera is Bette Midler, with whom she worked in had together was cut. "Bette is so incredib -' she begins. "Her presence is so strong. It's not a matter of being a good or bad actress, it's just that presence." She feels Kline is "getting closer to it, and I hope I will

Morris has two more films in the can, Bloodhounds of Broadway and Martians Go Home, and makes an unbilled cameo appearance in Earth Girls Are Easy. She plays a nightclub owner in Bloodhounds, which stars Matt Dillon and Madonna, and indicates script problems were such that what happens in the editing room will determine whether the picture's good or bad.

The actress explains Martians Go Home, which stars Randy Quaid, as "The Martians come down and they're all standup comedians. I'm a [Dr. Ruth-type] therapist." That's all she knows, she says, because her scenes were filmed at night. "When I start at nine p.m. and do a scene at four in the morning, I don't know what I said or did."

If you look closely at the dancing hologram in the opening scene of Earth Girls Are Easy, you'll see it's Morris, who was featured in director Julien Temple's Absolute Beginners and his hilarious segment of Aria. "I love Julien Temple," she says. 'I'd do anything for him.' When asked if there was a part for her in Earth Girls, coauthor Julie Brown had already cornered the market on camp, but Temple was able to work Morris into the one scene. "I'm unrecognizable," she says with undue modesty. "I'm made up to look like a unicorn."

Although she only filmed for one day, she says, "It took three days to get all the glue out of my hair where they had it up

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Remembering Stonewall

An Anthology Takes Shape by Dan Page Special to The Western Express

History and mythology tell us that the 1969 Stonewall "Rebellion" in Grenwich Village was the militant beginning of the current wave of gay and lesbian activism. Steeped in hearsay and politicized interpretation, Stonewall is the one piece of their history that most gay men and lesbians have heard of - yet few of them really know anything about it beyond the hearsay. References to Stonewall and its importance to our community will only intensify as Gay Pride season 1989 marks the twentieth anniversary of the rebellion. Yet, scandalously, no book-length work exists to give a basic narrative of the tumultous events of June 1969, or a sampling of perspectives to make sense of this flashpoint in the light of recent gay history.

The forthcoming book Remembering Stonewall, edited by Wayne Curtis and Michael Rogan, promises to fill this gap. This anthology — unlike an oral history of the riots currently being written — will contain both eyewitness accounts from Stonewall survivors and thought-provoking essays that examine Stonewalf in the light of the last twenty years of gay politics and culture. Curtis and Rogan conceive of their book as a way for the gay and lesbian community — and anyone interested in social history — to formulte answers to important questions surrounding the events we call Stonewall: what do various participants think took place? What were the short-term results for the gay and lesbian world? What do we think we know about Stonewall twenty years later, and how accurate is that knowledge?

Scheduled for publication in the fall of 1990, *Remembering Stonewall* will be the first study of Stonewall to look at not only what actually happened when gay people challenged the New York police in the summer of 1969, but what shape these events have given to an emerging gay sensibility.

Participants' own stories of their Stonewall experiences are the heart of *Remembering Stonewall*. As personally-written history, these accounts give the reader evocative, up-close perspectives on the events and emotions of the Stonewall riots. Such documentation is becoming increasingly crucial as the passage of time and

the AIDS crisis limit our connection to events twenty years ago. Going far beyond "objective" reports of a gay demonstration, these stories are true expressions of the personal as political.

"Because the riots took place on successive nights and in various sections of the Village," states co-editor Wayne Curtis, "each individual's reminiscences are necessarily limited to what they saw, and what rumors they heard. Accurate reporting from news sources was scarce, so from the beginning 'Stonewall' has been part personal experience and part mythological symbol. This book will reflect both aspects of this nature." *Remembering Stonewall* thus promises to confirm some truisms about the legendary diversity and militancy of the rebellion, destroy a few myths, and perhaps create a few new ones for the 1990s.

In an extended essay on Stonewall and the building of a gay community based on sexual desire, critic and commentator Michael Bronski — author of Culture Clash: The Making of a Gay Sensibility — opens the second section of Remembering Stonewall by focusing on Stonewall as a cultural and political history. A frequent contributor to Gay Community News and the Advocate, Bronski argues that Stonewall illustrates the unique character of the gay movement: a product of "bar culture" and people who acted on their homosexual desire, hence forging a political identity based on sexuality. Provocative and insightful, Bronski's essay seeks to redeem early 70s gay culture from its recent reputation as a decadent and self-destructive period, while showing how a few evenings of riots were a microcosm of the militant and widespread gay activism that followed.

Other essays, several by prominent les-


Other essays, several by prominent lesbian and gay activists and artists, will focus on Stonewall as a community 'icon' whose mythology continues to influence the gay and lesbian movement. The authors will explore the significance of Stonewall participants' original intents (or lact of intent), the meaning of an urban bar riot to gay people in all sorts of communities, the way later embellishments of the Stonewall events relfect a community's self-concept, and the role of Stonewall in the broader history of

gay oppression. As with the first-person accounts, this section of *Remembering Stonewall* aims at connecting the reader with the recent past as a direct prologue to contemporary culture, ideals and lifestyle.

The editors of *Remembering Stonewall* bring broad experience as historians and editors to their project. Wayne Curtis holds degrees in American History from the College of William and Mary and the University of Delaware. He has edited several nonfiction works, including *Revelations: A Collection of Gay Male Coming Out Stories* (Alyson Publications: 1988). Michael Rogan

studied oral history at Columbia University and has served on the editorial staff of several academic journals. Both have contributed articles and reviews to gay and lesbian, as well as academic, publications.

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
