CAC Board of Directors elects officers


PHOENIX — Following an election in June, Community AIDS Council (CAC) has selected a new slate of officers for 1989/90. Artie Michaelis, President of Arizona Gay Rodeo Association, was elected Chairman. Bob Aronin, former Chairman is now Vice-Chairman, Dale McKissack, who recently resigned as President of Copperstate Leathermens Association to accept the position of Director of CAC, is Secretary and Bev Fleming, President of Los Amigos Del Sol, is Treasurer.

Other D rectors include Kirk Baxter, Phillip Comi, John Barr, Peter Hudson, Dennis Breeze, Ke. Furtado, Martha Jones, Bill Miller and Bob Palmer.

Shortly after the election of the new Board, CAC founder and Chairman Bob Aronin said, "I'm very pleased with the new board and that it includes such a good cross-section of the community." He went on to state that the organizational leadership background of each of the members will do a lot to advance the work of CAC.

Michaelis explained that the new board and slate of officers will share duties and responsibilities of CAC formerly managed primarily by Aronin during CAC's formative two years. Aronin was the catalyst for the forming of the organization in 1987 following several months of meetings held involving members of the community. The stated purpose of CAC was to directly address the needs of individuals diagnosed with AIDS or proving HIV-positive and to raise funds to distribute to AIDS service organizations for them to, in turn, redistribute them to those in need.

At the most recent meeting of the Council of Central Arizona (CCA), Michaelis, Aronin and Baxter, presented a program covering the history of CAC, the relation of services available in Arizona as compared to the rest of the country, and cur-

rent programs being pursued by CAC

Aronin explained that a major priority of CAC is to establish a list of priorities of the needs of people HIV positive and with AIDS. Recognizing that a great many people and organizations are doing whatever they can to help in the fight against AIDS, he pointed out that without recognized priorities there is no focus on what is most important. The most important priority found, he said, is "... how to survive the disease as long and as well as possible." A call went out to establish a center of information which could provide a broad data base for people from the day they receive an HIV-positive diagnosis.

CAC raises approximately \$4,000 plus monthly from their "Sharing Weekend" project held at local bars. Additional funds are raised from community activities and collection jars at various businesses. In their report to the community in June 1989, CAC announced that they had raised over \$108,000 in the twenty-four months of Sharing Weekend.

'Washington Times' exposes 'nest of homosexuals' in White House

WASHINGTON, D.C. — In a front page story with two-inch-high headlines, *The Washington Post* on June 29 revealed the names of a number of White House officials as clients of a homosexual escort service as part of an independent investigation, incurring sharp criticism from national gay and leabian groups who charged the paper with anti-gay reporting.

The *Times* story was initiated by the closure of a D.C. gay male escort service run out of a local funeral home by law enforcement officials May 18.

That week, *The Washington Blade*, a local gay and lesbian weekly, reported that at the escort service's eviction, reporters from local news outlets were seen rummaging through the escort service's files for names of prominent Washingtonians.

The *Times* alleged that credit card receipts they acquired from the agency revealed the names of a number of highly placed Reagan and Bush administration officials antong the agency's clients. In the story, the newspaper generously quoted its own editors who explained that they would only reveal the names of "those found to be in sensitive government positions of influence."

To back up their alleged need to expose those who are in such "sensitive positions", the *Times* quoted a former top-level Pentagon official who told the *Times* he had long been aware of a "nest of homosexuals" in the Reagan White House, adding that the "nest" may have been penetrated by Soviet spies

"We have known for many, many year

that there is a department of the KGB whose job it is to prey on sexual deviants," Ret. Lt. Gen. Daniel Graham told the *Times*. He added that the Soviets have easily "turned" "closet homosexuals" through blackmail efforts and, hence, "we have always in intelligence tried very hard not be be giving classified information to known homosexuals."

That statement was directly attacked in a statement released the same day by the Human Rights Campaign Fund which said the *Times* story "points out the fear and repression many gay men and lesbians must live under because of their sexual orientation.

"The argument that gays in the government and the U.S. military are targets of potential 'blackmai.' is without merit," the statement read. "The U.S. government, since World War II, has never substantially proved that open gays and lesbiants are more of a security, risk than have research.

not be blackmailed. To report that 'known homosexuals' are not worthy of receiving classified information...is to propagate homophobia and anti-gay prejudice.'

The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force chimed in with their own statement blasting the *Times* investigation as 'petty gay baiting' and 'homophobic sensationalism.'

"The Washington Times story is a rank attempt to sensationalize a fact that should come as no surprise to anyhody: that there

San Francisco voters to reconsider benefits for gay lovers

SAN FRANCISCO — On June 29, the day a new law was to take effect in San Francisco extending certain benefits of city employees to their gay lovers, the law was temporarily suspended pending repeal various.

Sponsored by San Francisco Supervisor Harry Britt and passed unanimously by the Board of Supervisors in May, the law allowed unmarried couples to register as "domestic partners", thereby allowing benefits of city employees to accrue to their "partner" just as they would to wedded spouses.

Opponents to the measure have submitted a sufficient number of signatures to place the issue on the city's November ballot, causing its suspension while they are verified.

This was the first such law passed by a city in the United States.

NY court allows gay couples 'family' rights

NEW YORK — In the first court action in the country recognizing gay couples as a family unit, New York's Court of Apeals overturned a lower court's decision disallowing renter's rights to the surviving partner of a homosexual relationship.

"We conclude that the term 'family' should not be rigidly restricted to those people who have formalized their relationship by obtaining, for instance a marriage cer-

are gay people in the Republican party and in the Republican administration." the NGLTF statement read. "We challenge as baseless the *Times*" implication that the presence of gay people in political office represents a threat to national security."

A June 29 NBC report stated that White House spokesperson Marlin Fitzwater has expressed "no knowledge" of any investigation into gay White House aids. NBC also reported that federal agents confirmed that they are investigating the escort service, but only on charges of credit card fraud, not prostitution.

In their June 30 edition, the *Times* reported that a Republican National Committee spokesperson saw "no reason for cleaning anyone out of office" based on the *Times*" revelations, but in the same edition wrote a lengthy editorial supporting their investigation.

"Those who know about the possible compromising of people in powerful or responsible posts have a duty to inform security officers, even at the risk of being called prudes or homophobes," the editorial

Although none of the five figures named in the *Times* story were highly visible administration agents, centrally placed in the June 29 story was Craig J. Spence, a conservative Washington socialite and fundraiser who was the sole subject of a follow-up story in the newspaper's June 30 edition.

The newspaper has alleged to have testimony and evidence charging that Spence, who is highly placed in the Republican Party spent up to \$20,000 a year on male prostitutes through the agency; offered cocaine to friends and clients; videotaped U.S. and foreign officials in compromising positions with male escorts through a one-way mirror, and in one instance, gave two male prostitutes a 1:00 a.m. tour of the White House.

In one paragraph of the June 29 story, the Times reported that the operators of the "homosexual ring" told them that "videotapes, audio tapes and still photographs were made of sex acts performed by the clients and the call boys, including perverted acts."

The Times did not reveal which particular sex acts they considered "perverted".

In a sidebar to that story, the *Times* stated that "gay clubs" are often used by the escort services to recruit "call boys", and immediately listed the names of seven area gay nightclubs.

Only in the paper's June 30 story on Spence's alleged illegal activities did the newspaper quote anybody who was identified as openly gay, in quoting a former Reagan aide who expressed concern with Spence making passes at his own "bodyguards."

"I'm openly gay myself," the aide told the *Times*. "Most gays find that type of behavior reprehensible."

Recently, Don Slutes wrote in an issue of "one of the city's two community newspapers" that the other (do you think he meant us?) "did our best to scuttle" the recent Gay Pride observance in Phoenix.

In case he *did* mean TWE, we feel that neither we, the publishers, nor the staff of the newspaper enjoy a reputation of "scuttling" community events.

While that's his opinion which he's free to express, a phone call could have revealed what it was that we were concerned about and finally just gave up — which can be verified by staff, friends and business associates.

1. Since the first meeting, last August, none of us were made aware of nor invited to any meeting of the committee which planned this year's observance — and there are a great many others in the boat with us;

2. No press releases nor advertisements were received by TWE in time for printing prior to the week's event. One was received, mailed the week of the event and receive

ed after that issue was completed, plus, no advance notice was made that it was forthcoming so we could have made arrangements for it; (*The Observer*, in Tucson, received one, but very late, however, in time to print);

3. A message to the committee, through a member, requesting information and stating that we had received nothing in the previous nine months of committee planning went unresponded to, as did a comment in a column printed in May in TWE; and

4. A request by the committee for a full page of "free advertising" in TWE the week of the event resulted in no copy ever being received.

What we did do was print a front page article prior to the observance with its component information based solely on a poster and a flyer we picked up in a bar.

Perhaps Mr. Slutes should consider directing his accusation of "scuttling" elsewhere.

tificate," said Judge Vito Titone.

Prior to this action, only 'family members' in the traditional connotation, were allowed protection under the state's rent control laws. Those laws limit the fre-

quency and amount of rent increases charged to renters.

The case stemmed from the eviction, from a rent-controlled apartment, of a man who had shared the apartment with his lover for ten years. Only the deceased lover had signed the lease. The court found that "family" extends to relationships exhibiting long-term financial and emotional support and commitment.

Arbitrator makes cash awards in historic gay employment rights case against Pacific Bell

SAN FRANCISCO — National Gay Rights Advocates announced on July 7th that 205 of the 232 gay and lesbian claimants in the 14 year, precedent-setting employment rights case agains Pacific Bell Telephone were awarded more than \$3.2 million as a result of a settlement reached in December, 1986. The settlement is the largest single financial award in the history of the gay rights movement.

Leonard Graff, NGRA's Legal Director said, 'An important Supreme Court precedent has now been successfully used to compensate the victims of Pacific Bell's discrimination. National Gay Rights Advocates will continue to protect the employment rights of all gay men and women throughout the country.'

In December of 1986, Pacific Bell was forced into a \$3 million out-of-court settlement to benefit a class of claimants in the nation's largest and longest running anti-gay employment discrimination law suit, Gay Law Students Association v. Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company. The record-setting settlement also produced a landmark California Supreme Court decision in May of 1979, protecting lesbians and gay men against job discrimination in the State of California.

The suit was filed in June of 1975 when several Pacific Bell employees were forced to leave their jobs or were rejected for employment because they were gay. It was later learned that Pacific Bell had a specific policy, approved at the highest level of management, forbidding the employment of "manifest homosexuals" and that gay applicants were systematically rejected by labelling their job applications "Code 48Homosexual."

Jean O'Leary, Executive Director of NGRA said, "This historic settlement confirmed the civil rights of gay men and women in the work place. It puts monetary teeth in a major law suit and puts others on notice that employment discrimination will not be tolerated.'

The San Francisco law firm of Heller. Ehrman, White and McAuliffe was cocounsel in this case and provided their firm's full resources in supporting NGRA. Charles Freiberg, a partner at the Heller firm, led the team of attorney's responsible for achieving the successful settlement.

Freiberg said, "We hope that this settlement serves as a strong reminder to employers that discrimination based on sexual orientation will result in severe financial repercussions.

"Not only does this kind of discriminaton prevent qualified employees from obtaining meaningful work, it restricts, without cause, an employer's ability to hire the best available human talent.

The funds will be distributed within the next 60 days.

PFLAG stands for Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays. During a campaign appearance last February, Daley hinted that at least one member of his immediate family

A second surprise entry in the parade was a large contingent from Cook County Sheriff Jim O'Grady, who sent cars, horses and an honor guard.

Various spokespersons for Chicago Police said that between 5,000 and 75,000 people marched in or viewed the parade, but no official estimate was released. Pride organizers said 90,000 people were present.

The traditional post-parade rally in Lincoln Park saw Illinois Gay and Lesbian Task Force lobbyist Lana Hostetler spontaneiously rip up an ACT Up caricature of anti-gay

Illinois Senator Penny Pullen, who, she said, has sponsored legislation making kissing a criminal offense for those who are HIV antibody positive.

'Penny Pullen is our Jesse Helms,' Hostetler warned. "I need you to call your legislators tomorrow and I need you to get political in 1990 so we can rip up Penny Pullen at the polls."

A second high point came from ACT UP members themselves, who challenged the mainstreaming of the gay movement.

"It's pretty ironic when elected politicians march to honor Black and Puerto Rican drag queens," said the group's Ferd Eggan, referring to 1969's Stonewall Revolt in New York City and to the numerous Chicago aldermen who rode in the parade.

History made in Chicago by Rex Wockner

CHICAGO - Gay history was made in Chicago June 25, when Mayor Richard Daley lead off the Gay and Lesbian Parade riding in a light blue 1956 Thunderbird

Speaking to reporters before step-off, Daley said he came to the parade because he is "the mayor for all the people of the city of Chicago."

No other Chicago mayor has ridden in the parade while in office.

(The late Mayor Harold Washington spoke at the post-parade rally in 1986 and 1987, however, and former mayor Jane Bryne rode in the parade after Washington defeated her.)

Daley wore a button reading, "The issue is human rights: Parents FLAG," and said it was "a great honor to be here."



International News Summary

AUSTRALIA: Ten hooded figures dress-AUSTRALIA: Ten hooded figures dressed in black raided a Gay and Lesbian Task. Force meeting in Sydney April 10, according to the International Gay and Lesbian Association. They seized documents and took photographs before they were chased off. Sydney police later charged a member of the National Action (NA) group with "violent disorder" in retation to the raid.

Australian activists say NA is a neo-Nazi EAST GERMANY (GDR): A new book, Otherwise Quite Normal — Information About Gay Men in the German Democratic Rebuplic, by Jurgen Lemke, profiles the daily lives of 14 gay men. The book will be translated into English, Czech and Russian, the latter to correspond with a 1991 Moscow human rights conference. According to Der Spiegel, there are 800,000 gay men and lesbians in East Germany. Australian activists say NA is a neo-Nazi organization that has carried out a violent campaign against people who support giving land back to Aborigines.

AUSTRIA: Officials in Vienna have repealed one of four laws discriminating against gays by legalizing male-to-male pro stitution. John Clark of Homosexual Initiative Vienna told Capital Gay that the change will help fight AIDS by allowing safer sex educators access to prostitutes. Three anti-gay laws remain on the books. The age of consent for gay men is 18, compared with 14 for heterosexual men and all women. It is illegal to form gay organizations. And, it is forbidden to speak positively about homosexuality in newspapers and public meetings, and on radio and TV. The last two laws are not often enforced.

BRAZIL: Brazil's most popular rock star, 31-year-old Cazuza, went public with his AIDS diagnosis in April in the pages of the popular magazine Veja. Cazuza said he told the truth to help other people with AIDS fight the prejudice and discrimination they face.

CANADA: The Edmonton, Alberta city council May 9 refused to proclaim June 27 Gay and Lesbian Awareness Day, according to Perceptions. During days of public debate on the matter, Ald. Julian Kinisky threatened to run off to Australia where men are still men if the city proclaimed a gay day. Recent city proclamations include Cable Television Month, McHappy Day, Bike to Work Day, Auschwitz Awareness Day and Square Dance Weekend.

EAST GERMANY (GDR): A new book, bians in East Germany.

ENGLAND: Cottage (tea rooms) arrests have skyrocketed in London as warm weather has arrived, according to Capital Gay. More than 150 men have been arrested in one loo alone, charged under a section of the 1936 Public Health Act which makes if an offense to stay in a public toilet for longer than necessary.

FRANCE: Ornicar is a new human

rights and sexual liberation group set up in conjunction with the 200th anniversary of the French Revolution. Activists plan publish a French edition of the ILGA Book, and a large scale investigation of anti gay discrimination, which will be conducted under the umbrella of the Europe-wide Iceberg Project. (Capital Gay)

ITALY: Venice journalist Ferdinando Camon was fined \$28,000 in late May for libeling the editor of the conservative daily newspaper Gazzettino De Venezia, which refused to accept a paid death notice from friends of a transvestite prostitute, according to L'Espresso. Camon accused Gazzettino editor Giorgio Lago of perpetuating a "moralistic system of journalism that... denied homosexuals access to the press." The death notice rejection also provoked a sit-in by male prostitutes at the paper's office.

ITALY: A new survey by the Institute for Economic, Political and Social Studies reveals that more than 50% of Italians believe the country should pass laws barr-

ing discrimination against gay men and lesbians, according to *Gai Pied*. Only 10% of those interviewed felt homosexuality was an illness and two percent said it is a perversion.

LIECHTENSTEIN: Gay Liechtensteiners living in Vienna have written Crown Prince Johannes Adam to protest the introduction into the principality's penal code of four anti-gay articles. Although Liechtenstein legalized gay sex in January, four new articles were simultaneously copied from the Austrian penal code. These statutes set a higher age of consent for sex between men than for sex between women or heterosexuals, prohibit gay prostitution, ban information about homosexuality, and outlaw gay groups.

**NEW ZEALAND: Activists in Wellington have formed Gays and Lesbians Against Discrimination in order to lobby for human rights, according to **Pink Triangle*. Spokesperson David Hindley said GLAD will function as an umbrella organization to coordinate the fight for anti-discrimination protection in employment, housing, health care and insurance.

SWEDEN: A parliamentary committee has rejected a proposal to provide survivors benefits and marriage rights to gay and lesbian couples, according to Stockholm's Reporter. The Committee on Social Security and Legislation said the consequences of such legislation have not been sufficiently investigated and added that it was disinclined to create a new social institution which might increase discrimination against gays. Two months later, neighbor Denmark became the first nation in the world to legalize gay marriage.

SWEDEN: The ILGA prisoners project, which concerns itself only with individuals jailed because they are gay, reported in June that it is in contact with 64 such prisoners worldwide. Five of the prisoners have been officially "adopted" by ILGA member groups. Staffers say information on gay prisoners in Africa, Latin America and Asia is hard to acquire, but

that they know gays are imprisoned in Iran, the USSR and Arab nations. They also note that "in the USA, there still seems to be a greater amount of pedofiles in prison than in any other country."

SWEDEN: In its May issue, the Reporter published a detailed gay guide to East Berlin. According to reporter Olav Andre Manum, many gay spots in the East Berlin capital are located near three major subway stations — Seneefelderplatz, Dimitroffstrasse and Schonhauser Alle. The guide provides information, addresses and contact persons for bars, cafes, discos and gay religious groups. A companion article profiles Protestant minister Echehard Brauer, who discusses "homoglasnost" in the GDR

TURKS AND CAICOS ISLANDS: Although only nine people have been diagnosed with AIDS here, doctors in this Caribbean nation estimate that 900 of the country's 9,000 residents may be infected with HIV. The Islands have been involved in delicate negotiations with Canada over some form of economic confederation and governmental leaders are concerned that the "rumor of an AIDS epidemic" may jeopardize the process.

WEST GERMANY: The 1989 Spartacus international gay guide is on the stands with tips about gay life around the globe — from Abu Dhabi to Zimbabwe — 1,024 pages in all. The listings cover bars, discos, sex shops, hotels, political groups, switchboards, beaches, toilets, crusing areas, and everything else the authors were able to learn about. It is the first issue of Spartacus to contain somewhat complete, but dated, U.S. listings. London's The Pink Paper may have summed up the guide best when they called it "a gazetter of where to get a screw anywhere in the world." To order direct, write: Spartacus, Bruno Gmunder Verlag, P.O. 



The Foley Fallout by Cliff O'Neill

First we had trash comedy, then we had trash TV and now, direct from the nation's capital...Trash Congress. And the chief arbage collector in the war: Republican Vational Committee Chair Lee Atwater, the Teflon Pit Bull of partisan politics. Not moments after Speaker of the House Tom Foley (D-Wash.) was taking the gavel from the embattled lim Wright (D-Texas), the RNC released a memo which — except to those motivated to unbelievable levels of naivete — was a cheap way of attempting to (as many mainstream media liked to say) link Foley to homosexuality. Faxed to jillions of Republican office-holders nationwide in moments, the memo made the rounds. The battle was on.

After that, the entire controversy became immersed in a cloud of confusion involving beleagured House members, secret phone calls and reporters telling only half the story.

The controversy actually started weeks earlier when rumors surfaced that unnamed Democrats, allegedly siding with Wright and fearful of his then-posible departure from the Speaker's seat, were hinting about the "alleged homosexuality" of a House Democrat who could stand to gain from Wright's departure.

Coming in the same week of dozens of glowing reports about the widely popular Foley, there was little doubt who the rumors were about. But on one was going to go on record about it. Openly gay Rep. Barney Frank (D-Mass.) expressed unbridled outrage that the media was repeating the rumors and hence promoting them.

And then things appeared to go away. One point here. Whether Foley is or isn't gay really isn't the point here, although he has denied the suggestion that he is, for whatever that's worth.

The fact that, except for one ill-thought out vote in October 1987 (on which he later reversed himself), he had a perfect record on gay and lesbian issues in the last session should more than prove that the man is certainly not an enemy of the gay and lesbian community. If he is gay, unless he did something else wrong, the man has a right to privacy. Period.

The question actually is that of the gross homophobia of the Republican party officials involved in the brouhaha in suggesting that homosexuality makes one unfit for office, or is somehow inexorably lined to pedophilia.

Case in point: Karen Van Brocklin, aide to House Minority Whip Newt Gingrich (R-Ga.). Two days before the memo exploede onto the evening broadcasts, the New York Daily News reported than an unnamed Gingrich aide (Van Brocklin, it was later revealed) was calling up media outlets suggesting that they investigate Foley's sex life before their competition broke the story.

"We hear it's little boys," she told the Daily News, they reported that June 5.

She told them the Washington Post had the story. She told the Post that National Public Radio had the story. She told NPR that CBS had the story. And so on, and so on, and so on.

Gingrich, ture to form, played dumb and slapped her wrists — after her name was revealed.

After the memo broke, network reporters — all who had heard the unsubstantiated rumors — all mentioned the memo, but only ABC had the courage to publicly make the connection between the 'Out of the Liberal Closet' headline on the memo and the repeated comparisons to Frank's voting record.

Some criticized that, but I, for For one thing, he has so much as come out and called the bonenea attempt to tag Foley as a gay man a "sword" with which Democrats can attack Republicans. For another, he's expressed that feeling before, stating that gay-baiting may win votes, but may lose a campaign or a party needed credibility.

"I'm not stupid," Atwater told Dossier magazine in its June issue (before the Foley fallout). "I tell candidates who want to do this, 'Look at Anita Bryant. She won an election, but lost her career in the process."

Ah, like a Phoenix, he comes up from the ashes.

Or maybe that comment about a bad penny would be more appropriate.

bad-mouth street demonstrators: Take a closer look. Not all ACT UPs are created equal. While some "loose camons" may raise the concern of more traditional activists, in several areas they work in concert with behind-the-scenes activists to incredible results. Case in point the June FDA approval of AIDS treatments aerosolized

Pentamidine and ganciclovir after concentrated effort by ACT UP/NY and others. There is still a lot of work to be done, but in a world short of victories, this could come as some much-needed good news.

ON THE HATE CRIMES BILL: It was no big surprise that the landmark bill which would collect statistics on hatemotivated crimes would pass the U.S. House with its anti-gay violence provisions intact last month, but the battle is still fierce in the Senate. The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force is extending its National Lobby Days through July and the Human Rights Campaign Fund is continuing to sign up mammoth numbers of people to their preapproved congressional mailing "Speak Out" program.

e expected Sen. Jesse Helms (R-NC) amendment to the bill still looms, and it could derail most of the gains of the past ten years of the movement. If you haven't participated in either program this summer, do it now.

Inside The Washington Lobby

Over a year ago, U.S. Marine Barbara Baum was charged with "lewd and lascivious acts, sodomy and obstruction of justice" for allegedly engaging in sexual activity with another woman and lying about her activities. The other woman, in fact, testified against her, and Baum was sentenced to a year in prison and a dishonorable

Baum's case is one in a series of prosecutions of lesbians by the armed services that have become prevalent in the last year. Gay rights activists and feminists believe that these prosecutions are an extension of sexual harassment directed against women. In many of the military's investigations of charges of lesbianism, the woman under investigation had refused a sexual advance from a man who then, from spite or for revenge, accused her of being a lesbian. It is more than just homophobia that is making the military go after women; the misogynistic attitude that women have no

place in the military is also evident.

That was clear in the case of Petty Of ficer Mary Harrison. As far as can be dete mined, a male subordinate apparently resented having to take orders from Harrison because she is a woman, so he accused her of being a lesbian. In many cases, the women under investigation are competent and aggressive - threatening characteristics for those who like to believe that women have no place in the armed services.

One of the reasons the military has stepped up its investigations of women recently is that the armed services have changed their standards for sufficient cause for a discharge. In the past, the military had the discretion to retain a person who had engaged or was found likely to engage in homosexual activity. Now military law states that homosexual persons must be discharged (even though a heterosexual person who was "just experimenting" can be retained). In addition to possibly leading to an absolute

discharge rule, an investigation is intimidating in the way that it is conducted. Persons suspected of being gay or lesbian are told to name names in order to save themselves. Some persons, including Baum, have not been able to withstand the considerable pressure of the investigators, and have named others. Inevitably they end up, as did Baum, fully prosecuted regardless of their cooperation. The atmosphere is truly one of a witch hunt.

Baum served 226 days of her one year sentence before her lawyers, pro bono attorneys from the D.C. law firm of Arnold and Porter, managed to have her sentence suspended and secured her release from prison. Her discharge, however, remained dishonorable. Her lawyers are trying to get her sentence commuted (erased complete-ly, so that she would not have to face even the potential threat of having to finish out the remaining days) and to have her discharge changed to "honorable". The ACLU is filing an amicus brief on her behalf arguing that her sentence is a violation of the Eighth Amendment — that it is curel and unusual punishment to give a prison sentence for consensual sexual activity. The ACLU is also exploring whether there is a problem of selective enforcement in this area — whether the armed services are investigating and sentencing more lesbians than gay men.

To defend women like Baum and to protect other women - lesbian and heterosexual — in the armed services, the Military Freedom Project was established about a year ago. The Project, a joint effort of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, the Women's Equity Action League, the ACLU, the National Organization for Women and the National Lawyers Guild, is investigating the condition of women and gay people in the military. One main issue they are addressing is the treatment of lesbians in the military. One of the Project's first acts was to arrange for women who have been subject to military investigation to meet with members of Congress - particularly those Representatives who are on relevant committees, such as the Armed Services Committee. Some of these women nave also been invited to speak before the Defense Advisory Committee on Women in the Services (DACOWITS) — a civilian advisory committee to the armed services which held hearings in Washington this past May on issues affecting women in the military.

On the legislative angle, the strategy for addressing the treatment of women in the military is to put the spotlight on the issue — hold hearings and educate members of Congress as to the way the military is handling the treatment of women. If the investigations can be shown to be outgrowths of sexual harassment, legislative measures may be possible. Of course, the armed forces will be a challenge to change because it is seen as the last bastion of machismo.

The final goal is to get the military to change its rules so that they will not be able to discharge anyone from his or her job for reasons unrelated to job performance. It is hard enough for women who choose to join the military. That a charge of lesbianism is used to intimidate, control and subvert women is insidious from feminist as well as from gay rights perspectives.

Observer's Notebook by Paul Varnell

by Paul Varnell Our Academic Progress

One source of encouragement in a world of only fitful gay political progress is the fact that the field of lesbian/gay academic studies is not only alive and well, but flourishing as never before — not only in this country, but in Germany, The Netherlands, and, to a lesser extent, even England. Some of the participants in that field, if not household names, may at least generate a spark of recognition: e.g. John Boswell, John D'Emilio, Lilian Faderman, Gilbert Herdt, Robert Tielman, Louis Crompton, Martin Duberman, Barry Adam.

But happily there is a great deal more as well. Consider some of these upcoming and recent achievements.

Professor Wayne Dynes of Hunter College in New York, one of the busiest participants in the gay studies effort, recently circulated an announcement to his friends, colleagues, and co-workers that "the manuscript (more accurately 25 computer discs)" of the *Encyclopedia of Homosexuality* was finally completed and delivered to the publisher in early February. Dynes describes the *Encyclopedia* as the largest-ever such undertaking, "interdisciplinary, trans-historical, and cross-cultural," and expresses the pious hope that while it contains some 800,000 words, still it might be contained in a single volume of about 1,000 pages

The publisher, Garland Press in New

York, confirmed for us the one-volume format, estimated a probable price at around \$75, and gave a tentative publication date of March, 1990.


For years articles on homosexuality and gay studies appeared only fitfully in journals devoted to other fields — sociology, sex research, history, even classics. The valuable *Journal of Homosexuality* has tried to be an outlet, but its own emphasis has tended to be on psychology, social psychology and social adjustment, and, in any case, there was far too much material for any one journal. Now the prestigious University of Chicago Press is preparing to publish a new quarterly called the *Journal of the History of Sexuality*.

It has been only in recent decades that scholars have confronted the fact that sexuality *has* a history — that sexual behavior, licit and illicit, seems to show some changes over time. It seems clear, though, that social, religious, and legal pressures have impacted differently at different times, and that people may even have thought of their

sexual behavior in different ways in the past. Those are some of the very issues that will be dscussed in the new journal.

According to Susan Constantin of the University of Chicago Press, the new *JHS* will begin publication in the summer of 1990, and the cost for an introductory subscription will be \$24.50. It will be edited by John Fount of Bard College (New York), who has done some research on homosexuality in Germany, and the editorial board includes a number of people well-known in gay studies such as Boswell, Herdt, Faderman and Gert Hekma.

Hekma himself, a director of the gay studies program at the University of Amsterdam, is responsible, along with Kent Gerard, for another recent important contribution — the massive (551 pages) collection of articles (20) and reviews (9) called The Pursuit of Sodomy: Male Homosexuality in Renaissance and Enlightenment Europe. Originally a special double issue of

the Journal of Homosexuality, it is now a separate paperback published by Harrington Park Press (1989). At nearly \$30 it is expensive, but there is nothing quite like it: articles on Italy, Portugal, France, Spain, Germany, The Netherlands, Denmark and England, covering the period 1400-1800. I cannot make anyone be interested in gay

history, but most people at some point begin to wonder about their "roots" or how people like ourselves lived in earlier times; those who want to reach back with their minds and make contact, however tentative, with colleagues in the past could do no better than read this book — not all in one sitting, but in bits, over a month or two.

While until recently little has been written on gay history, there is aparently more information be be mined than anyone would have thought. Much of the data comes from records of court proceedings (as the title hints), but a good deal is from contemporary books and pamphlets (often attacking "sodomites"), from private diaries and personal correspondence, and even from printed literature if one can get beneath the surface or read between the lines. Happily, there is probably still much to be found—researchers and archivists are only now beginning to large the surface of the su

beginning to look for it.

Most work on lesbian/gay studies is done by scholars with other departmental affiliations; there are few courses in gay studies still, and few academics can justify to their department chairs a full-time attention to gays. Part of the answer is the forming of actual Lesbian/Gay Studies Departments or Lesbian/Gay Institutes like Gert Hekma's in Amsteradam or Robert Tielman's Gay and Lesbian Studies Department at the University of Utrecht, but that has gone very slowly in the United States, not always for lack of academic interest. Gay historian Martin Duberman wrote recently in the Nation that his three-and-a-half year old project to form a Center for Gay and Lesbian Studies at the City University of New York was welcomed by the university but that he had not been able to raise sufficient funding (some \$500,000) from foundations or from within the gay community to pay for even a first-year budget.

Better news, however, came almost simultaneously in a story in the San Francisco Bay Area Reporter about the founding

of a Gay Studies Department, America's first, at the City College of San Francisco. The new department is chaired by Professor Jack Collins, who has a background in comparative literature and midieval studies. Collins told B.A.R. that he expected to start with one course and then add a course each semester in areas such as history, anthropology, sociology, literature, and theatre.

Lesbian and gay academics, including those with similar interests, have often been widely separated geographically and thus deprived of that kind of intellectual stimulus provided by being surrounded by colleagues who can encourage, comment on, and criticize their work. No doubt San Francisco's new Gay Studies Department will have some impact on the gay students at the college itself; but for the rest of us its impact will be that it can provide a supportive and stimulating environment for real gay scholarship and research. That will be the test of the department as an academic institution.

If the professors at the department publish articles based on what they teach, if the department holds conferences and invites scholars to come and deliver papers, if they can help to legitimize (and it needs legitimizing in most people's view) the whole idea of lesbian/gay studies by showing that its contents are rich and significant and its methods are rigorous, then they will have done us all a great service.

Donna Summer Comes Out!

by Jeffrey Wilson/Hot Wax Music Report

Dance music's good time lady returns to the top-of-the-chart pop scene at the end of a decade through which she has endured a tumultuous recording career and an equally controversial relationship with her fan base. Donna Summer, who enjoyed almost unparalleled success for a female popular music soloist from 1975 through 1983, is delighted by her resurgence with a new deal at Atlantic Records upon the release of Another Time And Place, the fourteenth album in a varied career which began more than 22 years ago.

Some critics concurred that when Summer "found" religion, she lost her edge to compete in the fast-paced music industry. Although her 1984 Geffen album Cats Without Claws may have lacked commercial appeal, it didn't stop Donna from making the Top 25 with a haunting cover of the Drifters' "There Goes My Baby". Those who scoffed at Summer's religious find would also be amazed that the girl who won a Gramm Award for "Last Dance" years earlier, became the 1985 recipient in the Best Inspirational Song category for her moving rendition of "Forgive Me", also from the Cats lp. 1987 would be Donna's last album for Geffen, All Systems Go, a col lection of spunky pop dance numbers and heartfelt ballads with collaborations by Richard Perry, Brenda Russell and Harold Faltermeyer.

Yet Donna was riding out the unnoticed slow down, on varied opinions of advice, all the while raising her family and seeking out a new musical direction. Summer recalls, "I was having differences with my record company [Geffen]. They just didn't have the facilities to promote [my] music. For that reason, it didn't work out. They really do big rock n' roll, but they don't do good promotion on r&b." Winning a Grammy Award in a different category than your fans are used to is hardly a hiatus from the music scene, but Geffen Records was looking at All Systems Go as Donna's pop comeback. Although Summer doesn't like the term "comeback", she admits to a certain degree of sadness at the lack of recognition for Systems and considers, "We're going to bring it back out. We're probably going to release a Best of with a lot of stuff on it. Them I'm gong to release the unreleased records. 'All Systems Go' is a fun song, it should be commercial!'

of expression, I will use to express my self. It was always there, even before I put it on records. I was always writing things down on scraps of paper and telling ideas." And just where do these ideas come from which she has generated so many hit records, "Sometimes I have an inspiration or a theme, and sometimes I just have a musical line and I'll say, 'This is really a beautiful musical passage, and I need to write some lines.' I'm one of those people that almost always knows the name of a feeling, so it really helps when I'm writing. If music can give you feeling, I can always put color to it. Music to me is like a canvas in words."

It must not have been music to Donna's ears, not to mention the astonishment and disbelief of her legion of fans in the gay community, when it was rumored that Summer had told a man backstage during a conversation after one of her 1983 concerts, "AIDS is your sin". From this unfortunate beginning grew the tale that Summer had further incorporated into her concerts the remark, "God made Adam and Eve, not Adam and Steve". Unbeknownst to Sumner, the gay community and its friends were launching an offensive to combat the former friend who, as the uninformed gay press took it upon themselves to decide, become one of their most treacherous enemies. The "Donna Summer Record and Concert Boycott" was on, but the artist, under the protection of her former manager and rock n' roll label, was unreachable, and equaly as uninformed as the gay pro

To her defense, Oscar and Grammy Award-winning songwriter Paul Jabara told Hot Wax Music in 1986, "I know Donna real well. She's not a mean-spirited girl at all You've got to remember that this is religious girl and she didn't understand, sh never knew exactly 'what was going on with the boys'. When people started explaining to her the [sexual] acts that went on in exlicit language, to any straight person who is unaware, it's very difficult to corr prehend. When all this was brought out into the light, she didn't quite understand. I'm sure Donna thought and perhaps felt, that the heavens were telling 'the boys' to slow down. Everyone thought of her as this real hip diva, the love goddess. The image was manufactured by the record company [Casablanca], to set her up as this goddess, but Donna was really this simple girl from

"I'm telling you from my [own] lips, I never said anything about God giving gay people AIDS. If there's one thing, anything, that I have to give, it's always been love."

With fresh producers and label change intact, Summer resumed her ascent to pop respectability anew with the Stock/Aiken/ Waterman production of ten new tracks, most of which beckon dance club enthusiasts at the very first listen. On the heels of a fiery new single success with "This Time I Know It's For Real", Donna provides even more fuel with the potential hits "If It Makes You Feel Good" and "Whatever Your Heart Desires". Both songs are loaded with pizzazz for dancing or driving with the top down this Summer. "I Don't Wanna Get Hurt" sets the pace for all the danceable numbers through pulsing synthesized keyboards and chorused title lyric harmonies. Decades ago, it was almost unheard of as most singers didn't write their own material, so Donna's talent today is quite a find. Which comes first, you as the lyric or the hook? "Either way,' says Summer rather matter-of-factly. "Sometimes I just hear a sound in my head. It's a note, so I sing the note. Then I connect it to something and it becomes a melody, and then, I have to sing it onto something or 'play' it down so I can remember it.'

Donna says she has always had this gift, "I would write songs from the time when I was very young. Back then, I guess they were much more immature songs. I've always been expressive in some form or another - art, words, anything that's a form

Boston with a spectacular voice. She's not a malicious girl and would never take it upon herself to actually judge anyone."

Her friend's support, and both Warner Brothers and Geffen Records ignoring the problem, hoping it would go away, only made Summer's attackers that much more compelled to extract a statement from the singer who once taunted them with "Love To Love You Baby". In the wake of this epidemic and as well as an aficionado of Summer's music which merged disco with the sexual revolution nearly 15 years ago, I asked Donna to completely clear the air. The rumors, allegedly reported through Chicago free-lance writer Michael Kutza, that Donna Summer said, referring to gay people, 'AIDS is your sin' backstage at one of her concerts in 1983, is not true. Locally reported by Raymond Tobler to the San Francisco press, that "God created Adam and Eve, not Adam and Steve", is part of Donna Summer's concert act, is also, untrue.

Referring back to Kutza's report which enraged an entire community, Donna quickly responded, "I have never, ever spoken to this person. I have no idea who the person is who started this. I didn't say anything about God giving gay people AIDS." You could tell she was uncomfortable having to defend something so horrible, and that she was not properly adivsed how to defuse the



situation. Still, in a tone of what I believe as genuine friendship, Summer continued, "Let me just say this, so you can feel at ease, I'm telling you from my [own] lips. I never said it! I'm not that kind of person. "I said God loves everybody, and that's how I feel. Listen, I'm not in a position to judge anybody. I have never been in that position. I'm just thankful that God loves me, and that's where I'm coming from. I have numerous gay friends, they have been my friends through this and throughout.

"Geffen [Records] wanted me to retaliate in a way that made me feel like I was straightening out something that I said, and I had not said anything. I didn't feel I should give it any credence." I tried to understand her logic about not dignifying such visceral rumors with a reply, when Summer placed me in a similar set of hypothetical circumstances stating, "I have defending it, because if I made a comment about you and said you hated Black people, then all Black people said, 'Oh, don't read this guys reviews, don't even talk to this guy, he's against Blacks.' You know what I'm saying, you'd spend your life defending something you never said in the first place.

"When I first started, they said I was a transvestite. How do I defend that? Do I have to take my pants down and show everybody (nervously laughing) that I'm not a guy, or, never was a guy, that I was born a girl. Do I have to ask my mother to show my birth certificate to everyone in the world that doesn't believe I'm a girl? I can't defend that."

It's easy to understand why Summer is so visibly distressed, the gay community has one of the most incredible grapevines for the rumor mill, and once it starts it's virtually impossible to stop. Hedda Hopper and Louella Parsons would have loved it, but most people with normal intelligence would ignore it. "I never said those horrible things. You can't imagine the pain that [the rumor] has caused me, especially because of where I started from. I feel like I got a terrible rap. I have always been loyal to my fans. I'm a loyal human being. If there's one thing, anything, that I have to give, it's always been love."

Being so full of love, in spite of the bad press and boycott which is coming to a head

over the new album, Summer has tirelessly been performing benefits to fight AIDS. "I've done several over the last couple of years. I've done AIDS benefits back-to-back in Florida for two years running. I did another with the cast of *Hair* in New York last year." But she cautions, "I don't want to list all this stuff, it isn't necessary. I'm not doing these things to *prove* I'm not antigay, I'm doing them because it's right. I'm not going to go out and do AIDS benefits because I want you to buy me records. If you don't trust me, don't buy my records, that's what I feel."

It's apparent that Summer does care about her friends in the community, she cut a demo for Paul Jabara on one of his songs. said an enthusiastic Paul, "I think Donna can do this. I wrote her a great song to fight AIDS called 'We're Gonna Win'. She's all for the proceeds to go to AMFar. Donna came into the studio and sang it with me, she did five vocals on it." Says Donna, "It's a really great song. And there's a chance, but unfortunately at the time, my record company wanted me to work with people who didn't want to work with Paul. I would say to him (mock playing), 'Paul, give them the song, let them record it, leave them alone, let them do the song,' you know what I mean. But Paul wants to be everywhere - in the kitchen, doing the cooking, doing everything. I've known Paul, it seems, all my life. He's like my baby brother." Donna says reflectively, "You know, it was six years ago [when the rumors started], and it's old news. Let my actions speak louder than the words that anybody else can say.'

An anthem of hope and a strong concert closer can be found in the last cut of Donna Summer's new album, *Another Time And Place*, with the inspirational "Love's About To Change My Heart". Music carries a message, and it is the medium which can soothe and heal many emotional wounds, perhaps a misunderstood Donna and her aching fans can reunite, because for Summer, this is truly another time and place



From light-hearted to the serious side, M.A.'s work is appreciated by a growing national readership. He decided to give me a little exam in order to determine if I had been pulling his leg about being gay (after all, I HAD gone to the prom with him). He asked me questions guaranteed to establish whether I was truly homosexual. It is a known fact that all

gay persons are expert on certain subjects. So he tested me on my knowledge of disco (does anybody even remember disco?), dancing in general (which is definitely not one of my fortes), fashion (I wear the same sweatshirt and sweatpants day in and day out), and finally, hair care (the last time the guy who does my hair saw me he screamed (yes, he's gay) and begged me not to tell a soul that I even knew who he was).

Obviously, I failed the test miserably. But my old friend wasn't stupid. In no time at all, he realized he was asking me all the wrong questions. Everyone knows that the above inquiries should always be made only to a gay man. And while society may lump all gay persons together, my friend was bright enough to realize his mistake. He immediately switched tactics. He proceeded to give me a flash quiz on topics familiar to all gay women. Like which gasoline is best for long mileage and my fastest time for changing a tire. It wasn't that I was trying to disappoint him. I simply know nothing about gasoline and the thought of breaking a nail (not to mention my revulsion at physical labor of any kind) has kept me a good distance from tires. Besides, I've always managed to con someone else into doing stuff like that for me. I may be a feminist but I'm not a fool.

Still, I guess my friend figures that no one would say they were gay if they weren't and I suppose a not-quite-up-to-snuff homosexual was better than none at all. He insisted on going somewhere for a drink (no one was going to have an opportunity to say that some of his 'best friends weren't gay'). He asked me if I'd prefer going down to Greenwich Village (a trick question, no doubt). Since we were on the upper East Side, I thought we might find someplace just a little bit closer. His eyes lighted up. He suggested a bar where he and a number of his business associates hung out (he assured me they were all very liberal) and trotted me off, rather like a prize poodle, to be inpected by four upwardly mobile yuppies. ets face it. Wall Street probably isn't the st exciting place in the world to spend your time, so when he introduced me as a gay activist and glanced at me nervously, I thought, what the hell, maybe the guy is desperate to prove himself, maybe people new of his enormous collection of Roy Rogers paraphenalia. Briefly, I wondered if he still slept with a stuffed horse called Trigger. But being gay does rather obligate one to an enormous amount of sensitivity and

I looked around at his four buddies. I

prayed that this time my quiz would be about Harvey Milk or the passage of the NYC gay rights ordinance.

Instead, his friends opted to go the 'Rubyfruit Jungle' route. That would have flattered Rita Mae but it didn't really do a whole lot for me. I suppose it would have been sportslike to open the bottle with my teeth or something but I'm lousy at sports and I haven't the slightest desire to ruin perfectly good teeth for a beverage I wouldn't drink if it were served to me in a champagne glass.

I should have seen this as an indication of things to come. After telling these 'liberals' that I knew absolutely nothing about flannel work shirts, black leather jackets, motorcycles or pool tables, the conversation lagged. I tried to revive it. I talked about the recent sale at Saks, the new Elizabeth Arden shop, the problems faced by professional women. I even made a somewhat feeble attempt at sports. That helped until they realized that I thought Dr. K was a drink.

One of them squeezed my leg under the table. I guess I had it coming. After all, I did have a skirt on and a woman wearing a skirt is secretly begging to have some strange guy squeeze her kneecap with his lecherous little hands. EVERYBODY knows that. All I knew was that it was time to leave. I noticed my friend looking at me sadly as the others reluctantly stood when I did. Definite proof that the old Roy Rogers stigma would not be put to rest by ME. "It's to bad Radclyffe Hall is dead," I whispered to him desconsolately.

We said goodby and it was obvious that my handshake did not come up to snuff. I played around with my ACT UP button but my friend was too dejected to notice. I sincerely hoped that he still had his old stuffed horse back at his apartment. Everybody needs something.

As I hopped into a cab for the ride to La Guardia, I felt a certain remorse. Here had been people eager to show me how modern they were, how willing to accept a gay woman as one of the guys. And all I had done was make it very obvious that I not only was not one of the guys, but that I didn't have the slightest desire to be one.

Thank God I sat next to a well dressed man with a great haircut on the plane. He was reading GQ and listening to an old Judy Garland tape through his walkman. We talked about the various options provided by brunch and exchanged recipies for crepes all the way to Phoenix where his wife and kids were waiting for him at the gate.

Nicholas Dante's Inferno

'Chorus Line' Casualty Interview by Steve Warren

What do you do when you can't write

It's been a long 14 years for Nicholas Dante since A Chorus Line openened on Broadway and he won a Pulitzer Prize for his first produced work.

Probably the greatest stage musical of all time, A Chorus Line has been a money machine that's helped Joseph Papp keep the New York Shakespear Festival afloat when its other shows weren't doing well.


But for various reasons, many of the people involved in the show's creation have been unable to spin off careers from it; for some, including Dante, it remains their sole Broadway credit.

The show's downside was very much on Dante's mind as he visited San Francisco to attend the Lesbian/Gay Freedom Day Parade and promote the umpteenth tour of A Chorus Line. It stars the original "Cassie", Donna McKechnie, the closest thing to a star the show produced and yet she hasn't had a major success apart from it.

The most moving moment of *A Chorus* Line comes when "Paul", a young Puerto Rican, tells how he started in show business doing drag with the Jewel Box Revue. It's Dante's own story, much as he told it at the initial rap session that developed into the

As Dante describes it, a friend of his who had had a bad experience as a dancer told director-choreographer Michael Bennett about it. He brought 25 dancers together to talk about their careers from Saturday midnight to Sunday noon "around a big table of sandwiches," Dante says. "We weren't all friends, because we were all in competition with each other, but that night we became people."

That was also the night Dante became a writer. He had done some writing in school but had given it up because he was struggling with his sexual identity and hated being called a sissy. "I had a talent, I wanted to write," he says, "but I didn't have discipline. I was this aging chorus boy and

tionship with Zack, the director, and his former lover Cassie, who had left the chorus for a shot in Hollywood and wants to return, they brought in professional playwright-novelist James Kirkwood to help. "He worked for four months, got twice as much money as I did and most of the credit, Dante claims.

'In spite of this Jimmy and I became good friends, which is not typical when someone is brought in to work on someone else's script.'

In writing A Chorus Line Dante and Kirkwood incorporaed many ideas and some actual dialogue from the other dancers' biographies - but not, Dante insists, as much as people think. "The kids came to believe they wrote the show, and some of them got angry when they didn't become stars and didn't get credit.

"A lot more of the show was scripted than people thought." Dante takes credit for "Sheila's" lines, "Can the adults please smoke?" and, when asked "What do you want to be when you grow up?", the reply "Young!" and says Kirkwood wrote the famous, "... suicide in Buffalo is redun-

Originally, Dante discloses, Bennett planned to have only dialogue and dance, with no singing, but he changed his mind and hired Ed Kleban to write the words to Marvin Hamlisch's music. Kleban, now dead of cancer, was another Chorus Line casualty. "He never wrote anything else,"

Speaking of casualties, Paul becomes one before the end of the show, leading the other dancers to discuss what they will do when their dancing careers end. As a lover of the show, I've long agonized over the "political incorrectness" of the major gay character being the unfortunate one.

'Jimmy [Kirkwood] was pissed about it too," Dante admits, "because it smacks of the old movies where the gay character always commits suicide. But we tried 'killing off' someone else and it just didn't work." Paul has become the most sympathetic character at that point, and the audience wouldn't care as much if someone else were injured.

What bothers Dante more is his realization over the years that "Paul was designed to not offend the audience. I have mixed feelings about that...When I wrote it I wasn't thinking in terms of the movement and all that, and the effect it would have on

Years later, when Harvey Fierstein took Torch Song Trilogy to Broadway and became famous for playing a drag queen, Dante was resentful. "Finally I realized, I paved the way for Harvey, after all I went through being jealous of that man."


Michael Bennett died from AIDS in 1987. James Kirkwood died in April of this year, his death attributed to cancer though some have suggested otherwise. "I don't think it was AIDS," Dante says, "and I'm the last person to protect someone about hat. AIDS is as respectable as any other killer disease. What's not respectable is the attitude some people have around it."

Three biographies of Michael Bennett are scheduled for publication in the near future, Dante says. "I did an interview for all of them, but in each one I was in a different phase of my neurosis and my anger." The contrast could be into

Some of the anger, which took years to surface, was directed against Kirkwood, even though they were friends. Rather than confront him directly, Dante discussed him with Bennett's biographers thinking he would eventually read about it. One incident that still disturbs him is when he and Kirkwood won the Tony award for best book of a musical. "I spoke first — I didn't want to but he made me. Then he spoke and at the end he turned to me and said, 'Nicholas is really a very talented fellow.' I didn't realize it at the time, but that was so condescending."

Dante feels that Kirkwood, Bennett and the other more experienced Chorus Liners "were able to take the ball and run with it" when the show was a success. Having better-known names they got the lion's share of the attention. "I got left in the dust...People thought I was this little fag dancer tagging along on everyone else's coattails. I wanted credit for everything I had done...There my name was running around

Television Rescues Gay Film Festival

An unusual number of works dealt with gay teenagers and lesbian and gay seniors as British and Canadian television provided the 13th San Francisco International Lesbian and Gay Film Festival (SFILGFF) with most of its highlights, despite the 11th-hour cancellation of one of the best of the scheduled programs.

Threats from the Langston Hughes estate forced British director Isaac Julian to withdraw *Looking for Langston*, his beautiful "meditation" on the life of the black American poet, from the Festival, even though it had already been broadcast in Britain. It received enough good press before cancellation that a cult is developing, even among those who haven't seen it.

The estate objected to Hughes being portrayed as gay, so wait 'til they see John Greyson's *Urinal*! The Canadian artist who combines film and video in his work uses Hughes as one of several historical gay and lesbian figures brought together by presentday activists to study the issue of tea-room sex: Should we condemn its practicioners for giving us all a bad name or support them, especially against the greater evil of vice squad entrapment? Greyson defends the latter stance, become a bit strident in his politics at times, in the daring and imaginative film, his first feature. The SFILGFF also screened his earlier videos, Kipling Meets the Cowboys, The Perils of Pedagogy, The Jungle Boy, The AIDS Epidemic and Moscow Does Not Believe In Queers, most of which mix politics, entertainment, unsafe sex and clips from old movies in varying degrees.

Of the new features in the Festival, *Urinal* and *Salut Victor!* were the best. (The audience disagreed, but we'll get to that in a moment.) *Victor*, a lovely picture of liberating friendship in a retirement home, was made for Canadian television by Anne Caire Poirier. One of its two protagonists has spent his life in closeted fear, but the friendship he finds in his twilight years should remove some of the fear of aging from anyone who sees it.

from anyone who sees it.

Seen by fewer people but rated excellent by a higher percentage, the clear favorite in the SFILGFF audience poll was another Canadian telefilm, Jean-Yves Laforce's Le Cour Decouvert (The Heart Exposed), a variation on Making Love which pairs a 39-year-old man with a 25-year-old who has an ex-wife and partial custody of their child. The men, who have no visible chemistry between them, argue and agonize most of the time, giving us no idea of why they want to overcome the odds to stay together. Viewers were apparently concerned with what issues were raised than how they were dealt with.

Wonderland, now in commercial release, sold out the Castro Theatre but drew a mixed reaction to its mixed-up script by British gay activist Frank Clarke, a story of two gay teenagers who are fleeing a killer but stop to liberate some dolphins.

Summer Vacation: 1999 is a unique Japanese gay teenage ghost story in which boys are played by girls. It's a bit slow for my taste and lacks the energy we associate with teenagers, but it's beautifully photographed and bound to find a cult.

Taxi to Cairo, Frank Ripploh's sequel, could hardly have been as good as Taxi zum Klo, but it was also unfunny and borderline-homophobic in trying to attract nongay audiences with the plot of La Cage aux Flles 3, about a marriage of convenience to protect an inheritance.

The opportunity to compare East- and West-Coast angst was about the only intereting aspect of Roger Stigliano's Fun Down There (East) and Greg Araki's The Long Weekend (o' Despair) (West). Araki repeated the formula of last year's Three Bewildered People in the Night, with twice as many people, well photographed in black and white, boring us by talking about how bored they are. Fun Down There is more colorful but not much more fun in its story of a farm boy who comes out during a week in New York. Getting a job washing dishes is exciting for him, but not for us.

Johanna d'Arc of Mongolia is dykesland uber alles as a trainload of western travelers is attacked by Mongol warriors and the native women invite the female tourists to become their hostages. From then on Ulrike Ottinger's film is tedious going as it studies Mongol customs with such tongue-in-cheekiness that we can't take any of it seriously.

Two other lesbian features had some problems but were generally commendable. Casi Pacilio's *Out of Our Time* parallels the lives and female bondings of a grandmother in 1930 and her granddaughter in Chicago today. Pleasant and not too soapy, it's an okay first feature, but one of the leading actresses is woefully inadequate. *Night Visions* by Canadian Marusia Bociurkiw deals with the problems of women, especially lesbians, face in today's society. It's crude, feels real, and should be appreciated by political women and men with clear consciences.

Further blurring the line between film and video, *Desire: Sexuality in Germany 1910-1945*, directed by Stuart Marshall, was shown as a feature documentary but was made as part of the *Out on Tuesday* series we'll discuss below. At its (frequent) best it's the German equivalent of *Before Stonewall* with emphasis on the Holocaust and the burgeoning gay movement it stifled.

That was about it for new features at this year's SFILGFF, other than Elfi Mikesch's documentary about two women in a home for seniors, What Shall We Do Without Death, which I didn't see; and Marc Huestis' Men in Love, which I can't review because it was shown as a work-in-progress (and because I make a brief appearance in it), but it mixes sun, sand, surf, sex and spirituality in the story of a man who goes to Maui to scatter his lover's ashes and becomes involved with a Hawaiian man and Tantric Yoga.

Several revivals were also screened—the good (lax rum Klo, The Killing of Sister George), the bad (Some of My Best Friends Are...) and the beautiful (Therese and Isabelle, Westler: East of the Wall and Jim Bidgood's 70-minute well dream, Pink Narcissus). There was also an extraordinary program of three delightful silent films from 1912-14 that explore sexual stereotypes in





different ways. The feature A Florida Enchantment, superbly acted by Edith Storey, is about a woman who takes a pill to change her gender. In Algie, the Miner effeminate Billy Quirk goes west to "become a man", and Lillian's Dilemma has Lillian Walker becoming Yentl-for-a-day to visit her brother's boarding school.

The Out on Tuesday series (billed as Out on Four by the Festival), which was broadcast in February and March on Britain's Channel Four, won the audience award for Best Video after three programs of two episodes each placed 1-2-3 in the balloting. (The two remaining episodes, Desire and Looking for Langston, were scheduled separately, as detailed above.)

Working in a magazine format, the makers fashioned outstanding programs with a good balance of serious and frivolous subjects and approaches. It was daring of Channel Four to air them at a time when the government attitude toward homosexuality is the worst it's been in 30 years. "The first show I watched," festival director Michael Lumpkin said, "featured gay men discussing the effects of AIDS on anal penetration. And I thought, "This was on prime-time television!"

Perhaps the segment most widely discussed in England was Advertisements for Ourselves? which took off on the idea that the "promotion of homosexuality" has been outlawed by Clause 28 of the Local Government Bill. A major advertising agency was retained to devise a campaign to promote homosexuality. The results ("What's so great about being straight?") may not convert anyone, but they deserve a Clio!

Other segments include: Playing Gay, transatlantic sharing by actors who have played lesbian and gay characters, including Harvey Fierstein and Patricia Charbonneau; Disco's Revenge with Pet Shop Boy Neil Tennant, apparently resigned to being out, and others discussing how gays have influenced the pop scene in recent decades; Cruising the Channels, about gay characters on English and American television (Heart-Beat's producer says, "I don't think these [lesbian] characters will ever kiss"); Richard Kwientniowski's gay alphabet, Alfalfa, a hit at last year's SFILGFF; Crimes of Passion, about dyke detectives; and Out in Africa, profiling gay antiapartheid activists.

Yet other topics covered are why straight women go to gay bars; a hassle surrounding the Reno Gay Rodeo; lesbian/gay foster parenting; how immigration problems separate lesbian and gay lovers; an Erma Bombeck-style look at the butch/femme question; where PWAs can get financial assistance in Britain; and "blasphemy" charges, from the (London) *Gay News* in 1976 to Salman Rushdie today. And that's not all. I only wish everyone who has ever tried or will ever try to produce a lesbian/gay magazine show in the U.S. could see this series.

Would-be screenwriters could have taken a lesson from the pairing of British and Canadian television dramas about coming out in high school. Canada's *The Truth about Alex* is simple and didactic, aimed at

an audience of cretins, while Britain's *Two* of *Us* starts from the same point but developes into a far more complex, ambiguous and intriguing story. When one of the *Two* proclaims himself joyously bisexual ("twice as lucky as everyone else"), they go off on a seaside honeymoon but discover they can't reconcile all their needs within their relationship. In the other film, similar in plot to last year's *Friends Forever*, Scott Baio discovers his best friend is gay, and goes through a crisis of conscience in deciding whether to be supportive. It has the simplistic sincerity of an Afterschool Special

The major AIDS-related video documentaries were about two Germans who have died from the syndrome. Yearning for Sodom shows actor Kurt Raab was a drama queen to the end. As he speaks of Beethoven composing his "Ninth Symphony" after he'd gone deaf, it's obvious Raab hoped this portrait of the final months of his battle with AIDS would be his equivalent. It's not, but it has its moments. The Right to Fight: Everyday Life with AIDS is the second half of Peter Sieglar's video legacy, and is more obvious in trying to make the desired points about living with AIDS. The result, if less intimate than I'm Still Alive! A Person with AIDS Tells His Story, is a positive contribution to the growing library of AIDS tapes. A number of other AIDS-related videos were inspiring, empowering and/or

The Best Short chosen by festivalgoers also won an Academy Award and its star, Boyd Gaines, won a Tony this year. It's Ray's Male Heterosexual Dance Hall, with a delightfully original concept no one should spoil by telling you about

spoil by telling you about.

Two of the better featurettes were An Empty Bed and Beyond Gravity, which made an interesting double-bill. Mark Gasper's beautifully-made Bed is about a day in the life of a lonely old gay man in New York, while Garth Maxwell's Gravity is less grave, a perky, quirky New Zealand romance of two young men, one a potentially dangerous charmer.

The audience prize for Best Documentary went to Pam Walton's *Out in Suburbia*, another surprise as I thought its squeaky clean images belonged in Lesbianism 101, although it was technically well done. It's the kind of video you'd want your mother to see. The balloting reflected a vote for conservatism, and against the experimentalism of Barbara Hammer and others who were upset by my locally-published reviews which suggested not all lesbians want to watch incoherent images which mean nothing except to their makers.

So many films and videos, so little space. With so much crammed into ten days we can't mention everything. I was impressed enough with Richard Kwientniowski after *Alfalfa*, *Ballad of Reading Goal*, a novel adaptation of Oscar Wilde's poem, and his other contributions to *Out on Four* that I've resolved to learn to spell his name. This man could revolutionize foreign language in-

struction if he set his skills to it.

San Francisco's Michael Wallin made Decodings, one of the few experimental films I liked. My thumbs were also up for Matt Hayes' Chaero, in which an obnoxious homophobe catches two Irish youths together and blackmails them; Cross Body Ride, a Venezuela-filmed ballet with two attractive men doing sensuous and sensual things; Song from an Angel, David Weissman's moving record of Rodney Price's final performance; Sonya Roth's Interior Decorator from Hell, a campy affair about a woman who sells her soul to turn her apartment into a mantrap; Barbara Jabaily's souvenir of the 1987 March on Washington, Half a Million Strong; "Out" Takes, John Goss' riotous compilation of scenes from Japanese and American television; John Canalli's One in Seven:

True Confessons of a Gay Fleshpounder, an amusing look at a masseur servicing his clients; and *Derek Jarman*, *Know What I Mean* by Laurens C. Postma, which lets England's leading gay filmmaker explain himself with words, something he often does

better than with images.
Suzie Bright, who was featured in *The Virgin Machine*, sold out the Castro for an illustrated lecture, "All Girl Action: The History of Lesbian Erotica." Dutch film historian Annette Forster drew far fewer to the smaller Roxie Cinema for her less interesting talk, "New Lesbian Cinema." The ever-popular Vito Russo brought a package of "Nelly Toons," old cartoons with some startingly effeminate stereotypes, including The Reluctant Dragon and Bugs Bunny in drag marrying Elmer Fudd and receiving a gay "Oscar" that gets excited when he says, "I'll take you to bed with me every night." Most frightening was a 1930 "Flip the Frog'' cartoon, Soda Squirt, that seemed to promote fag bashing.

The annual award from Frameline, the Festival's sponsoring organization, was

presented to Cinevista/Promovision, a New York distributor that imports major lesbian/gay films from abroad.

Overall it was a lucky 13th edition for the Festival. Production values were higher

than ever before, and thanks in part to higher ticket prices the boxoffice topped \$100,000 for the first time. Without videos and films made for television, the report would have been a lot grimmer.



What money Dante made was either spent foolishly or invested unwisely as managers and agents helped themselves without helping him. He tried writing again but without success. "I didn't feel I had to top myself, but I felt I had to get past A Chorus Line," he says. "I was trying to prove I could write something alone, and it really did me in. I got hurt and lost confidence. I got such writer's block I would have killed just to be able to fake it."

He was also taking care of his mother, who had moved in with him after his father died. Watching her mind deteriorate -"She didn't know if it was Monday or Tuesday, and she didn't give a shit" - gave Dante a new perspective on his own problems and led him to seek help through an extreme therapy that included the use of Ecstasy, LSD and other drugs.

That therapy worked, he believes. "I'm writing now and healthy. I have things to say

One of the things Nicholas Dante has to say is a variation on something he said in A Chorus Line: "Who am I anyway? Am I my resume?" As he puts it now, "In America you're only as good as what you did last week, and I was buying into that.
